HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

STRONGLY URGING THE UNITED STATES DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR AND THE UNITED STATES CONGRESS TO PROVIDE ADDITIONAL FEDERAL AID TO THE STATE OF HAWAII FOR THE PROVISION OF VARIOUS STATE SERVICES TO MIGRANTS FROM THE COMPACT OF FREE ASSOCIATION NATIONS; DEEM MIGRANTS ELIGIBLE TO RECEIVE FEDERALLY FUNDED FINANCIAL AND MEDICAL ASSISTANCE; AND PROVIDE DIALYSIS AND CHEMOTHERAPY CENTERS IN MICRONESIA AND ALL AREAS WITHIN THE COMPACT OF FREE ASSOCIATION NATIONS.

WHEREAS, migrants from the Federated States of Micronesia, 1 the Republic of the Marshall Islands, and the Republic of Palau, 2 are allowed to enter the State of Hawaii under the Compact of 3 4 Free Association; and 5 WHEREAS, the cost to the State to provide various state 6 7 services to the Compact of Free Association migrants continues to increase each year; and 8 9 WHEREAS, for example, in 2006, the State spent \$91,443,066 10 to provide services for these migrants and in 2007, the State 11 12 spent an estimated \$101,163,113 in state funds; and 13 WHEREAS, many state agencies provide a broad range of 14 health and social services to migrants from the Compact of Free 15 Association who have moved to Hawaii; and 16 17 18 WHEREAS, for example, in 2007, various state agencies spent a total of \$101,163,113 as follows to provide services to the 19 Compact of Free Association migrants in Hawaii: 20 21 Department of Human Services -- \$37,116,012 to provide 22 (1)services including, among other things, financial 23 assistance, medical assistance, and emergency housing 24 and outreach for homeless persons; 25 26

- (2)Department of Labor and Industrial Relations, Office 1 of Community Services -- \$717,360 to provide social 2 services, including employment readiness training and 3 4 cultural awareness education, to 503 Compact of Free 5 Association migrants; 6 7 (3)Department of Health -- \$6,829,020 to provide a 8 variety of community-based and direct health care and 9 health-related education, most notably related to 10 tuberculosis, Hansen's disease, and other communicable diseases, which are over-represented within the 11 populations making up the Compact of Free Association; 12 13 14 (4)Department of Defense -- \$21,130 to provide educational 15 and intervention services directed at children and young adults who are considered at risk for becoming juvenile 16 offenders, who come from needy families, or who receive 17 18 services from the State's Department of Human Services; 19 (5)Department of Education -- \$53,586,418 to educate 20 21 students from the Compact of Free Association nations who typically require specialized language services that 22 23 utilize extra resources of the Department of Education; 24 (6) The University of Hawaii -- \$1,958,627 in foregone 25 revenue due to the practice of allowing all students 26 from the Compact of Free Association nations to pay the 27 28 lower state resident tuition, regardless of the date of 29 their initial residence in Hawaii (discontinued 30 beginning with the 2008 fall semester due to budget restrictions); 31 32 (7)Department of Public Safety -- \$839,500 for costs of 33 34 1,425 arrests on 2,509 charges resulting in 613 35 convictions and 224 incarcerations of Compact of Free Association migrants. Costs are exacerbated by a 36 shortage of qualified and reliable interpreters that 37 can result in delayed hearings and additional cost; 38 39 (8)Judiciary -- \$82,796 for interpreter services; and 40 41 Office of the Public Defender -- \$12,250 for 42 (9)interpretation services necessary to provide legal 43 defense; and

1 WHEREAS, migrants from the Compact of Free Association 2 nations are proportionally over-represented in the population of 3 4 persons who receive various state social services in Hawaii; and 5 WHEREAS, the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunities 6 7 Reconciliation Act of 1996 prevents needy persons from the Compact of Free Association nations from receiving federally 8 9 funded financial and medical assistance; and 10 WHEREAS, when that law went into effect in 1997, Hawaii 11 continued to provide equivalent services for the Compact of Free 12 Association migrants using state funds; and 13 14 WHEREAS, if the Personal Responsibility and Work 15 Opportunities Reconciliation Act of 1996 is amended to allow the 16 17 Compact of Free Association migrants to receive federally funded financial and medical assistance, the State would not have to 18 expend state funds to provide the equivalent services, thus 19 allowing more of the State's general funds to be used for 20 services and programs for which federal funding is not 21 22 available; and 23 24 WHEREAS, there is a need for dialysis and chemotherapy 25 centers in Micronesia and all areas within the Compact of Free Association nations; and 26 27 28 WHEREAS, the federal government must address the issue of additional federal support for the State to continue providing 29 state services arising from the unique federally created 30 relationship the United States has with the Compact of Free 31 Association nations; now, therefore, 32 33 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 34 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 35 36 of 2010, the Senate concurring, that the United States Department of the Interior and the Congress of the United States 37 are strongly urged to provide additional federal aid to the 38 39 State of Hawaii for the provision of various state services to migrants from the Compact of Free Association nations; and 40 41 42 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of the Interior, Office of Insular Affairs, is strongly urged to 43 review the funding of the Compact Impact Assistance grant and to 44 HCR LRB 10-0302 3

make every effort to increase the amount of direct assistance 1 available to Hawaii to offset costs incurred by the State; and 2 3 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Congress is 4 5 strongly urged to support federal legislation to amend the Personal Responsibility and Work Opportunity Reconciliation Act 6 7 of 1996 to render Compact of Free Association migrants eligible to receive federally funded financial and medical assistance; 8 9 and 10 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of 11 the Interior is strongly urged to provide dialysis and 12 chemotherapy centers in Micronesia and all areas within the 13 Compact of Free Association nations; and 14 15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the United States Department of 16 the Interior is strongly urged to identify and secure other 17 forms of direct assistance to the State and the Compact of Free 18 19 Association population in the United States, including grants 20 from other sources and federal programs; and 21 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 22 23 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, the United States Secretary of the Interior, the 24 Director of the Office of Insular Affairs, the Majority Leader 25 26 of the United States Senate, the Speaker of the United States House of Representatives, the members of Hawaii's congressional 27 delegation, the Chairperson of the Board of Education, the 28 Chairperson of the Board of Regents of the University of Hawaii, 29 the Adjutant General, and the Directors of Human Services, Labor 30 and Industrial Relations, Health, and Public Safety, the Chief 31 Justice of the Hawaii Supreme Court, and the Public Defender. 32 33 34 35 OFFERED BY: 10-0302 HC
