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# A BILL FOR AN ACT

MAKING AN APPROPRIATION FOR THE EMERGENCY ENVIRONMENTAL  
WORKFORCE.

**BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:**

1           SECTION 1. Act 4, Third Special Session Laws of Hawaii  
2 2001, is amended by amending sections 1, 2, 3, and 4 to read as  
3 follows:

4           ~~["SECTION 1. The September 11, 2001, tragedy, resulting~~  
5 ~~from terrorist attacks in New York, Virginia, and Pennsylvania,~~  
6 ~~has changed the lives of Americans and the way government~~  
7 ~~responds to acts of terrorism. Today, all levels of government~~  
8 ~~across the nation are facing challenges to meet the needs of all~~  
9 ~~constituents.~~

10           ~~The federal government faces the monumental task of~~  
11 ~~developing and implementing America's response to violent acts~~  
12 ~~of terrorism and preparing an extensive network of security and~~  
13 ~~intelligence to meet national and international needs. While~~  
14 ~~New York faces the enormous tasks of rebuilding and restoring~~  
15 ~~disrupted services to its people, other state and local~~  
16 ~~governments across the nation must deal with the "ripple effect"~~  
17 ~~of a disrupted world economy.~~



1       ~~Here in Hawaii, state and county leaders of executive and~~  
2 ~~legislative branches of government have begun to assess the~~  
3 ~~impact of September 11 on the local economy within the context~~  
4 ~~of broader national and international economies. While the~~  
5 ~~visitor industry has been the first segment of our local economy~~  
6 ~~to suffer the effects of decreased leisure travel, other~~  
7 ~~ancillary or related industries have been impacted as well.~~

8       ~~Analysis and research are still needed to provide a clearer~~  
9 ~~forecast as to the potential duration and depth of the visitor~~  
10 ~~downturn.~~

11       ~~While government assesses the State's long term needs and~~  
12 ~~continues its efforts to lessen negative economic impacts of~~  
13 ~~activities or undertakings beyond our control, immediate short-~~  
14 ~~term solutions are needed for Hawaii's people being negatively~~  
15 ~~impacted with reduced work schedules or layoffs. Immediate~~  
16 ~~solutions for immediate relief will require unprecedented levels~~  
17 ~~of cooperation between state and local government, and between~~  
18 ~~public and private entities, and bold yet productive proposals.~~

19       ~~The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds for the~~  
20 ~~establishment of an emergency environmental workforce for short-~~  
21 ~~term employment for individuals who have lost their jobs because~~  
22 ~~of Hawaii's recent economic downturn. Individuals willing to~~

- 3 ~~(1) Isolate the spread of dengue fever;~~

7 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the September 11,  
8 2001, terrorist attacks continue to have lasting impacts on the  
9 lives of Hawaii residents and other Americans. The ensuing wars  
10 in Afghanistan and Iraq are ongoing and have cost the United  
11 States over \$600,000,000,000 thus far. The exorbitant economic  
12 cost of these wars represents the opportunity cost of providing  
13 social safety nets and ultimately translates into lower  
14 resiliency in the face of economic downturns.

15 The legislature finds that the recent collapse of national  
16 credit, housing, financial, and other markets has culminated in  
17 the current national economic crisis, which continues to have  
18 severe consequences on the local economy, including significant  
19 losses in local air transportation, tourism, restaurant, and  
20 other industries. Moreover, the department of labor and  
21 industrial relations estimates that state employment has grown  
22 by just 0.07 per cent annually from 2007 to 2009.



1        During severe national and local economic downturns, the  
2 legislature finds cost efficiency to be an important principle  
3 in determining which state activities to pursue and prioritize.  
4 Activities that can accomplish multiple goals can help the state  
5 weather seasons of financial shortage. The legislature further  
6 finds that the emergency environmental workforce is a program  
7 that provides short-term employment to those who need it and  
8 provides a workforce to protect Hawaii's environment. The  
9 legislature also finds that the emergency environmental  
10 workforce program should be continued, especially during times  
11 of war or significant economic hardship that will likely occur  
12 in the future.

13        The purpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to continue  
14 the emergency environmental workforce program to provide short-  
15 term employment for individuals who have lost their jobs due to  
16 recent national and local economic downturns and to continue to  
17 provide emergency environmental workforce services during  
18 periods of warfare or significant economic hardship.

19        SECTION 2. There is established the emergency  
20 environmental workforce program to be attached to [~~The Research~~  
21 ~~Corporation~~] the research corporation of the University of



1 Hawaii for administrative purposes. The emergency environmental  
2 workforce program shall:

3 (1) Employ, as employees of the research corporation of  
4 the University of Hawaii for no fewer than twelve  
5 months, approximately [four hundred to four hundred  
6 fifty] \_\_\_\_\_ individuals who were terminated from  
7 their jobs [after the September 11 tragedy as]:

8 (A) As a result of [the] significant local economic  
9 downturn[. The individuals shall be employed as  
10 three month contract employees,]; or

11 (B) As a result of acts of war;  
12 provided that these employees shall be subject to the  
13 employment policies and procedures of the research  
14 corporation of the University of Hawaii, except for  
15 any applicable unemployment insurance coverage which  
16 shall be the responsibility of the State;

17 (2) Deploy contract employees to all island mayors  
18 certifying a need for environmental clearance and  
19 eradication services to supplement current services  
20 being provided for the isolation of dengue fever, the  
21 eradication of the miconia plant and other invasive



1 plants, and the reduction of coqui frog and fire ant  
2 populations; and

3 (3) Coordinate its efforts with the efforts of the  
4 invasive species committee on each island.

5 Any procurement actions related to the program shall be  
6 subject to the applicable policies of the research corporation  
7 of the University of Hawaii.

8 SECTION 3. The [~~Research Corporation~~] research corporation  
9 of the University of Hawaii shall:

10 (1) Together with the Pacific Cooperative Studies Unit,  
11 develop a planning, administration, implementation,  
12 and evaluation strategy, including a program duration  
13 plan and a budget for contract and administrative  
14 expenses for the sum appropriated;

15 (2) Consult with private employers with workforces, which  
16 have, or which may be, affected by layoffs [~~from the~~  
17 ~~economic downturn as a result of the September 11~~  
18 ~~tragedy~~] resulting from any of the events set forth in  
19 paragraph (1) of section 2 of this Act to develop a  
20 recruitment and public information plan;

21 (3) Develop a strategy for the interviewing and selection  
22 of program participants;



- 1 (4) Work with island mayors requesting cleaning and  
2 eradication services to administer physical  
3 examinations, as may be necessary, to qualifying  
4 applicants prior to final contract offers;
- 5 ~~[(5) Request that the attorneys employed or retained by the~~  
6 ~~University of Hawaii prepare the necessary employment~~  
7 ~~contracts to meet the objectives of the program on an~~  
8 ~~expedited basis;~~
- 9 ~~(6)]~~ (5) Submit review and assessment reports to the  
10 governor, the senate president, and the house speaker  
11 every sixty days for the duration of the program; and
- 12 ~~[(7)]~~ (6) Undertake all other necessary activities for  
13 program development and implementation.

14 SECTION 4. There is appropriated out of the general  
15 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$1,500,000 or so much  
16 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2001-2002 for the  
17 establishment of an emergency environmental workforce to be  
18 administered by ~~[The Research Corporation]~~ the research  
19 corporation of the University of Hawaii.

20 The sum appropriated shall be expended by ~~[The Research~~  
21 ~~Corporation]~~ the research corporation of the University of  
22 Hawaii for the purposes of this Act."



1 SECTION 2. There is appropriated out of the general  
2 revenues of the State of Hawaii the sum of \$ or so much  
3 thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year 2009-2010 and the  
4 same sum or so much thereof as may be necessary for fiscal year  
5 2010-2011 to continue the emergency environmental workforce  
6 program to be administered by the research corporation of the  
7 University of Hawaii.

8 The sums appropriated shall be expended by the research  
9 corporation of the University of Hawaii for the purposes of this  
10 Act.

11 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed  
12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

13 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2050.
