
HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THAT A LO'I BE ESTABLISHED ON THE GROUNDS OF THE
STATE CAPITOL.

1 WHEREAS, kalo (colocasias esculenta), Hawaiian for taro, is
2 considered sacred and is also a central part of Hawaiian
3 genealogy and culture; and

4
5 WHEREAS, a lo'i, Hawaiian for taro paddy, is the
6 traditional method of planting kalo; and

7
8 WHEREAS, kalo is also an important source of food in
9 Hawaiian culture; and

10
11 WHEREAS, the State Capitol grounds are a gathering place
12 for visitors as well as residents from across the State; and

13
14 WHEREAS, the architectural design of the State Capitol
15 building symbolizes unique aspects of the State: the eight
16 columns along the front and back of the building represent the
17 State's major islands, the sloping walls of the House of
18 Representatives and Senate chambers represent volcanoes, and the
19 columns rising out of the reflecting pools represent palm trees;

22 WHEREAS, in 2007, the Legislature designated kalo as the
23 State's official plant; and

25 WHEREAS, despite its cultural importance and the abundance
26 of other symbolic representations at the State Capitol building,
27 kalo is not present; now, therefore,

29 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
30 Twenty-fifth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
31 of 2010, that the Historic Preservation Division of the
32 Department of Land and Natural Resources is requested to oversee
33 the establishment of a lo'i on the grounds of the State Capitol;

1 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Historic Preservation
2 Division is requested to work with native Hawaiian preservation
3 and education groups to ensure the success of the program by:

- 5 (1) Securing funds from private donations for the
- 6 materials needed to establish the lo'i;

- 8 (2) Allowing Onipa'a Na Hui Kalo to provide the labor to
- 9 establish and maintain the lo'i; and

- 11 (3) Working with Oahu Hawaiian immersion and Hawaiian
- 12 cultural focused charter schools to provide education,
- 13 cultural activities, and research; and




15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Historic Preservation


