<u>HB 2129</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO GRAFFITI. Requires a person convicted of criminal property damage involving graffiti to remove the graffiti within 30 days of sentencing, to perform community service for 2 years removing graffiti from within 100 yards of the site of the offense, and to reimburse property owners for two years for costs incurred in removing graffiti within 100 yards of the site of the offense.	JUD
<u>HB 1756</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CRIMINAL PROCEDURE. Allows for expungement of convictions for non-violent offenses that are over 5 years old.	JUD
<u>HB 2904</u> <u>(HSCR130-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO COUNTY GENERAL PLANS. Prohibits the use of county general and development plans from serving as, or replacing the county regulatory powers.	WLO, JUD
<u>HB 2796</u> <u>(HSCR74-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO DOMESTIC ABUSE ORDERS. Authorizes a temporary restraining order to remain in effect for 90 days or until service of a protection order, whichever occurs first. Provides for protective orders issued orally in court to be effective upon service of the respondent.	HUS, JUD
<u>HB 2271</u> <u>(HSCR224-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO EXPLOSIVES. Prohibits dry ice bombs.	PBS, JUD

<u>HB 2724</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO OFFENSES AGAINST PUBLIC ORDER. Permits tethering of an unattended dog if the tether meets certain specifications and the dog is at least 6 months old. Establishes mandatory fines.	JUD

<u>HB 2725</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO ANIMALS. Amends the definition of necessary sustenance to include a primary pet enclosure that provides shelter; safe construction to prevent injury; room to stand, sit, or lie down; and safe interactions with other animals.	JUD

<u>HB 2383</u> <u>(HSCR255-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO FLAGS. Recognizes and requires the prisoner of war/missing in action flag to be flown with the U.S. and Hawaiian flags.	EBM, JUD

<u>HB 2349</u> <u>(HSCR181-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO VIOLENCE AGAINST HEALTH CARE PERSONNEL. Extends protection from assault and terroristic threatening to emergency room personnel.	HLT, JUD

<u>HB 2020, HD1</u> <u>(HSCR9-10)</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO COUNTIES. Expands county enforcement of traffic regulations on public streets, roads, or highways whose ownership is in dispute between the State and the county, and on private streets, highways, or thoroughfares, to include laws relating to county vehicular taxes, motor vehicle safety responsibility, traffic violations, use of intoxicants while operating a vehicle, motor vehicle insurance, motorcycle and motor scooter insurance, and odometers. (HB2020 HD1)	TRN, JUD
