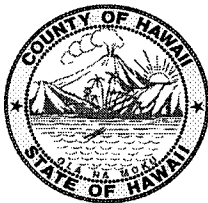
Senate Bill 2179, Relating to Counties

The Hawaii Council of Mayors supports Senate Bill 2179, which provides that the county liquor administrators be appointed and removed either by each county's liquor commission or as prescribed by their charters. The Bill also shifts the ancillary powers of the liquor administrator from H.R.S. §281-17 to H.R.S. §281-11.5.

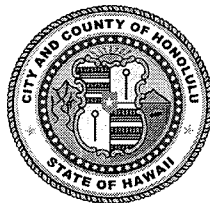
The Hawai'i State constitution, Article VIII, Section 2, authorizes the counties to frame and adopt a charter for their own self-government.

Current State law requires the liquor administrator of all counties be appointed and removed by the liquor commission of each county.

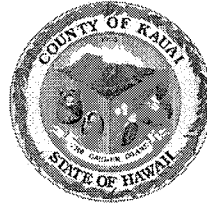
The charters of Hawai'i, Kaua'i and Maui counties each contain provisions for the establishment and functions of a liquor commission/department including the manner in which the director is hired and removed.



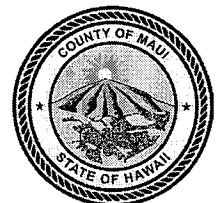

The charter of the City & County of Honolulu does not include the position of liquor administrator and therefore, the statutory provision requiring that the liquor administrator be hired by the liquor commission would apply. However in keeping with the principle of self-governance, the Bill would allow the City & County the ability to place a charter amendment for consideration by the voters that would define the process for hiring their liquor director.

For the reasons stated above, the Hawaii State Council of Mayors requests your favorable consideration and support of S.B. No. 2179.
