Title of Bill:

SB 2613 RELATING TO ENERGY.

Purpose of Bill:

Requires the department of education to incorporate alternative energy designs into the construction of new schools and major renovations at existing schools for which planning and design begins on or after July 1, 2010.

Department's Position:

The Department of Education (DOE) agrees it is desirable to reduce Hawaii's dependence on imported fossil fuels. However, the DOE does not believe this bill mandating the incorporation of alternative energy designs is necessary or desirable. Act 96 (2006) already mandates energy efficient design. Requiring a specific percentage of a building's energy to come from alternative energy sources is not an efficient use of state resources. The most practical sources of alternative energy for school campuses are solar and wind. However, the wind and solar regimes, and therefore the economic efficiency, are so variable among the various school campus that a one-size-fits-all approach would not be appropriate.

Currently, the DOE is in the last phase of a request for proposals process to award a photo-voltaic power purchase agreement (PV-PPA) at four school sites on Oahu. Next in line will be to work with our Kauai schools and the Kauai Island Utility Company on a much larger PV-PPA project for the entire district. As we learn from these projects we will expand with similar programs both on Oahu and the other neighbor islands. One

benefit of the PV-PPA model is the leverage the DOE has as a statewide system to attract large scale alternative energy providers. By pursuing alternative energy delivery methods such as this, where the provider designs, installs, and maintains the system and sells the power back to the DOE for a set time period, the DOE is able to keep our focus on providing and maintaining safe, healthy environments for students while doing our part to reduce Hawaii's use of fossil fuels.

In addition to these system wide plans, the DOE has implemented pilot programs including an energy neutral classroom portable pilot and various energy conserving projects for our existing buildings. As we continue to increase our use of alternative energies where feasible, the DOE is also implementing energy-saving technologies in our new building projects and renovation projects on existing campuses, and we are making headway with our effort to increase energy conserving behavior. We feel this multi-strategy approach is a preferred method to reduce the DOE's reliance on imported fossil fuel.
