WOMEN'S CAUCUS

The Hawai'i Democratic Women's Caucus writes in support of SCR 37 and SR26 which urge the Governor of Hawai'i to use and consider gender equity when appointing judges and justices to Hawai'i courts.

The Hawai'i State Democratic Women's Caucus is a catalyst for progressive, social, economic, and political change through action on critical issues facing Hawaii's women and girls. It is because of this mission, the Women's Caucus strongly supports this measure which encourages gender equity in our courts.

Concerned that seven women announced their retirements from the judiciary in 2009; and that only 5 of 19 appointments by the governor were women; the Women's Caucus, on January 21, 2010 wrote to Governor Linda Lingle. In the letter, the caucus expressed its concern over the gender imbalance of the courts. Namely:

- Ed Nacino and Ed Kubo were nominated to fill two circuit level judicial vacancies. In both cases, there were equally qualified or superior women candidates.
- An Intermediate Court of Appeals vacancy was filled by Larry Reifurth, Director of Department of Consumer Affairs. A well-qualified woman, Judge Sabrina McKenna, was on that list and not selected.
- Currently only 34-40% of sitting judges are women. Every time a woman judge leaves, and is not replaced, the percentage drops.

During this legislative session, Lisa Ginoza was confirmed to the Intermediate Court of Appeals and Robert Browning was confirmed to the Circuit Court of the First Circuit.

On February 22, 2010, the Judicial Selection Commission announced a notice of anticipated judicial vacancies. The commission is currently accepting nominations and applications for district (2), circuit (1), and supreme court (1) levels. We urge the governor to use these four judicial openings as an opportunity to redress decades of imbalance.

The Women's Caucus also wrote to the Judicial Selection Commission and to the governor, "since most women breaking into traditionally male-held territory must be better qualified than their male counterparts we know that you will have no trouble finding over-qualified women. On behalf of the women and girls of Hawai`i we ask you to consider doing your part in redressing this inequity."

We urge the committee to pass these measures on behalf of the women and girls of Hawai'i. Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony.

The Hawai'i Women's Coalition writes in support of SCR37 and SR26. Gender imbalance in the courts results in inequity in judicial decisions. We'do not need a return to the bad old days when women and women's issues were considered of lesser importance in the predominantly male judiciary.

I recall a case in Michigan in the seventies where a male judge freed the rapist of a twelveyear-old girl because "she dressed provocatively."

We are concerned that seven women announced their retirements from the judiciary in 2009; and that only 5 of 19 appointments by the governor were women. Consider:

- Currently only 34-40% of sitting judges are women. Every time a woman judge leaves, and is not replaced, the percentage drops.

In 2009 seven female judges announced plans to retire. Governor Lingle could make several additional judicial appointments during the remainder of her term. To date Governor Lingle has made 19 judicial appointments; of those, only five have been females.

Nationally the percentage of female judges is roughly proportional to the percentage of female lawyers. The Hawaii State Bar Association reports that 40.6% of its membership is female. Therefore, Governor Lingle's appointment rate of 26% is alarmingly low.

There are many reasons why more women should be appointed as judges until gender equity is achieved:

- 1. Law schools are admitting women in greater numbers, so law students are accustomed to seeing men and women in roughly equal numbers;
- 2. The composition of the bench should reflect the diversity of population;
- 3. Since more cases are decided by judges than juries, a diverse bench creates the appearance that you will be judged by your peers;
- 4. Becoming a judge is generally seen by the legal profession as a crowning achievement of a legal career; women judges serve as role models for attorneys entering the profession;
- 5. The circuit court judges appointed in 2010 will become appellate judges and supreme court justices of the future.

I urge the committee to pass these resolutions.
