The Hawaii Farm Bureau Foundation for Agriculture (HFBFA) is a non-profit charitable organization created to further promote agriculture and farming, and to enhance environmental stewardship in State of Hawaii, through agricultural research, education, training, management and public outreach. Created in 2007, the HFBFA addresses the critical needs and services of farmers and the agricultural industry.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

The goal of the HFBFA is to sustain Hawaii's agricultural industry by connecting the farmers with the community and vice versa. Educational programs for the community and farmers, such as public awareness, marketing and technical support are necessary to sustain agriculture's viability in the future. Our primary goal is to create awareness about the importance of sustainability, self-sufficiency and food security in our Islands.

3. State the public purpose and need to be served;

Prior to Western contact, Hawaii was entirely self-sufficient in the production of food and supported a population as large as Hawaii's current population. As recently as 50 years ago, about half of our food was still produced locally. Today, it is estimated that 80 to 90 percent of our food is imported.

The continual importation of produce increases the changes of introducing harmful invasive species that could devastate our ecosystems and agricultural economy. Disruptions to our food supply lines, a natural disaster or labor dispute would leave us with food for less than one week. And, much of our "going out to eat" of about \$3 billion leaves our island economy. If we produced just 10 percent of that amount locally would keep \$300 million in our economy.

It is time for Hawaii to make a commitment to supporting local agriculture. We need to train our young people, build local markets, export more and create programs that allow all of us to meet the challenge before us.\*

- Dialogue, planning and shared commitment

The target populations to be served are the agricultural and farming communities, including ranchers, the general public and grade school students.

The grant will provide the needed funds to create the following programs that support the goals of the Administration to rebuild Hawaii's agricultural and farming industry. We will support the State goals through the following programs: "Branding and Public Awareness, "Ag in the Classroom," "Technical Assistance Farmer Educational Outreach, "Buy-Local Industry (Restaurant and Retailers) Certification," and "Promote Food Security and Sustainability Message." All programs promote the sustainability and revival of agriculture and farming in Hawaii through educational programs and messaging that benefit the community.

# II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The HFBFA Executive Director and Chairman of the Board will ensure the implementation of the programs.

The grant will provide funds to build capacity to create the following programs:

- a. Branding and Public Awareness Program will involve educating the general public of the importance of agriculture in Hawaii, the quality of local produce and environmental stewardship in the State. HFBFA will coordinate various educational workshops and events, including but not limited to programs at the Farm Fair and Farmers' Markets, for the general public. Workshop topics will include, among other things, understanding local products and produce and awareness of Hawaii grown plants and crops. In addition, the program will educate farmers and agricultural community by about branding and marketing their products. Specialized educational workshops and seminars will include how to effectively create a brand, how to take their product to market and the benefits of cooperatives.
- **b.** "Ag in the Classroom" will educate Hawaii's youth in the classrooms and schools, similar to the Agriculture in the Classroom program coordinated by the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It will establish an educational program that will include, among other things, excursions to farms, production of educational materials on agriculture, informing students of the careers available in the agricultural industry, and contests to promote agriculture.
- c. Technical Assistance and Farmer Educational Outreach will enhance and support the farmers and agricultural community by promoting and encouraging agriculture outreach, research, market development, and specialized agriculture education. The program will include coordination of specialized education workshops and seminars for farmers regarding business financing, insurance, loans etc., food safety, and the best agricultural practices to improve efficiencies and other farming methodologies and techniques. The Kunia Agricultural Park, in partnership with Actus Lend Lease (Army Family Housing Hawaii) and Monsanto, is providing 180 acres of farm land to 8 10 farmers with at least two being new farmers. The Ag Park is part of this program.
- **d. Buy-Local Industry Certification Program** will reward restaurants, grocery markets, and other industry-related entities that purchase a percentage of its

produce from local farmers. The program will also encourage and promote these other companies and organizations to buy local and create awareness of their commitment to supporting the local agricultural industry.

#### e. Sustainability and Food Security Message

HFBFA will create the programs in July of 2011 and provide results of the program in June 2012.

For all programs, HFBFA will create an evaluation survey that will ask participants for feedback on the effectiveness of the programs. HFBFA will also track the number of participants and attendees. HFBFA will generate quarterly reports for the board of directors to ensure delivery and evaluation of programs.

- ➤ The Public Agriculture Promotion and Awareness program will develop and deliver a Hawaii Food & Wine Festival that will promote local agriculture to the residents and visitors through a three-day event to be held on September 29, 30 and October 1.
- ➤ The Ag in the Classroom program will implement this program in at least four different grade schools.
- ➤ The Technical Assistance and Farmer Educational Outreach will help and assist at least 50 farmers through one-on-one assistance and through workshops and educational programs. In addition, the program will assist at least two farmers it selects for its Kunia Agricultural Park.
- Fresh which will reward retailers and restaurants that sell local produce and products. Lei Fresh is a social media campaign that promotes buying local and sustainability in Hawaii by connecting farmers to the community through innovative technologies. A "charity-check-in" mobile application will be the core technology giving consumers real-time, geo-targeted access to *fresh*, *local* products and will leverage networks of farmers, retailers and consumers. In addition to encouraging local buying, check-ins will take social responsibility to another level with sponsors donating funds for every check-in to agricultural programs.

It should be noted that the HFBFA will sustain this program in future years through funding from private grants, corporate sponsors and through individual contributions.
