#### I. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Palolo Chinese Home (PCH) is a 501 (c) (3) not-for profit organization. Its origins date back to 1896 and it is Hawaii's largest and second oldest Adult Residential Care Home (ARCH II – Expanded Care). PCH has 111 nursing home and residential care beds; PCH also has an adult day care program for 30 senior participants and an adult respite care program that provides short-term overnight stays for community seniors. Completing a full continuum of care services for elders, PCH provides hospice care on premises through arrangements with all local hospice providers, including Hospice Hawaii, St. Francis Hospice, and Bristol Hospice.

PCH's innovative community-based Hawaii Neighborhood to the Aged (HiNOA) program provides services to assist elders who wish to remain in their homes and are in need of various support service such as physician home visits, home delivered meals and chore services.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

In 2003, PCH embarked on a phased campus redevelopment project to update and modernize its aging facilities and to increase its capacity to provide much needed services to the growing numbers of elderly in Hawaii. PCH has completed Phases I and II of its Master Plan – renovations to an existing nursing home building and

the construction of a three-story Skilled Nursing / Food Service Complex and improvements to supporting infrastructure. The Long Range Planning Committee of the PCH Board of Directors is currently working with an architectural firm to update the Home's 2002 Master Plan.

Phase III includes assessment and design services and the planned renovation of two existing and aging buildings – the dining hall (Farm Hall, built in 1957) and the care home building (Victoria Ward Hall, built in 1967) which houses 50 PCH residents. Renovation expenses are estimated at \$2,000,000 and will include structural, plumbing and electrical upgrades. In addition, the care home building needs major repairs to its roof and a fire sprinkler system to meet current code. For the dining room facility that also needs a new roof, and with the relocation of the kitchen to the new building, plans are to create a community center and office space for the expanding HiNOA (outreach to the aged) program. PCH will be launching a new capital campaign and use the GIA funds as "seed money" for the new campaign.

#### 3. State the public purpose and need to be served;

Hawaii has the nation's longest average lifespan of 80.8 years<sup>1</sup>. Hawaii also leads the nation in a shortage of skilled nursing beds, lack of affordable housing for seniors and the highest number of extended family households due to the high cost of living. The percentage of individuals (65 years and above) in Hawaii who live 200% below poverty is 26.3.<sup>2</sup> In the greater Kaimuki area alone, approximately 5,600 individuals age 65 years and older are living at or below the poverty level.<sup>3</sup>

Within PCH's immediate neighborhood is one of Hawaii's highest concentrations of senior citizens. The total population of seniors in the greater Palolo area is approximately 36,000 people aged 60 years and older or about 25 percent of the population. Of these, over 14,000 reside in the communities of Kaimuki,

Kapahulu and Palolo Valley. Another 22,000 live directly to the east and west of Palolo. These numbers are projected to steadily increase as Hawaii has the fastest growing rate of senior citizens per capita in the nation with the 60+ years population growing 2.5 times faster than the national average.

The nursing bed ratio in Hawaii is 23 beds per 1,000 people compared to the national average of 47 beds per 1,000 people making Hawaii 48<sup>th</sup> in the nation.

According to a report by Genworth Financial, the median annual cost for a nursing home bed starts at \$123,005; nationally the annual cost is \$74,208.

To alleviate this growing concern, PCH seeks to:

- Increase availability of resources for long-term care services
- Optimize seniors' physical and mental health and well-being
- Provide assistance and support of basic needs for seniors living in their homes
- Maximize the independence of frail elders in our communities
- Be a resource and support service to families and reduce their stress of caring for elderly family members.

The addition of new PCH nursing home beds and residences will help to alleviate these growing needs. In addition, PCH proposes to expand its services to the neighboring community through its HiNOA (Hawaii Neighborhood Outreach to the Aged) program which provides services for seniors in their homes such as physician home visits, chore services, and in-home meals, will also serve to address the needs and desires of families and their elders who wish to keep their elder parents at home. On average, PCH receives 150 calls per month from seniors and family members seeking assistance and outreach services. Currently, PCH is only able to provide support to a small fraction of these inquiries due to program and facility limitations.

#### 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The target population to be served are senior citizens age 60 years and older. In June 2010, PCH commissioned SMS Research and Marketing Services, Inc. to conduct a study of the Hawaii market and assess its geriatric needs. Study results

indicated the following: 1) seniors wish to remain in their home as long as possible; services that can extend this time at home are highly desirable; 2) by offering a continuum of care starting with in-home services, seniors will become familiar with PCH and will seriously consider utilizing its residential care service when the time is right; and 3) the majority of seniors desire modern facilities with privacy both in bedrooms and bathrooms but do not wish to pay a premium fee. PCH has targeted its programs, services and the redevelopment of its campus to meet the desires of the seniors and their families as reported in the market study.

#### 5. Describe the geographic coverage.

PCH serves residents and clients from throughout the island of Oahu. In addition, as part of the HiNOA program, PCH focuses on serving the elderly in the surrounding communities of Palolo, St. Louis Heights, Wilhelmina Rise, Kaimuki and Kapahulu.

The planning for Phase III is being conducted by the Obayashi Design Group that also worked on Phase I. The firm is working with the Long Range Planning Committee to update the current Master Plan. The plan projection will be for ten years and will maximize the use of the site based on the current and future needs of Hawaii's elderly and the availability of PCH facilities and resources. The PCH Building Committee, comprised of the CEO, Administrator, Board members, architects, construction manager, and contractor will provide oversight and management of the project. Annual inspections by the State Office of Healthcare Assurance provide an external review of PCH and its facilities. Inspections ensure compliance with State licensure rules, Medicare and Medicaid regulations, patient and resident safety and State and national fire codes.

The PCH Building Committee, comprised of the CEO, Administrator, Board member, architects, construction manager, and contractor will provide oversight and management of the project.

Quality assurance monitoring of resident and participant services is provided by a facility-wide quality assurance program. This program monitors key indicators that include falls, skin tears and bruising, pressure ulcers, facility acquired infections, weight loss and dehydration, drug use, and employee injuries. All departments attend a quarterly meeting to review data collected in their reports, identify areas for improvement, and follow up actions to determine effectiveness.

PCH has provided services at its present site for 94 years and from its origins as the Chinese Hospital for 115 years. It is Hawaii's largest Adult Residential Care Home (ARCH) with Expanded Care. It will continue to provide and increase its capacities for adult

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day care, overnight respite and hot meals to seniors in the community and services to elders in their homes through its HiNOA program.

PCH has successfully completed two major building projects (Phases I and II) on its campus: renovation of an existing nursing home building, the construction of a three-story Skilled Nursing / Food Service Complex and improvements to the supporting infrastructure. In addition, PCH has the expertise through its CEO, Hawaii licensed architects and contractors, and skilled volunteers to oversee and manage complex planning, development and construction projects.

The Palolo Chinese Home is located on 15-acres in Palolo valley – the property is fully-owned by the Home. Its campus presently has four major buildings:

- the recently completed three-story Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Hall that provides rooms for 44 nursing beds and houses the Home's commercial kitchen, the Wellness Center and a meeting / conference and community room
- the one-story Victoria Ward building was built in 1967 and houses 50
   Adult Residential Care Home residents
- the two-story Harry Wong Building, which was renovated in 2004,
   provides rooms for 17 nursing home beds and the 30 participant adult
   day care program
- the residents' dining room is located in Farm Hall, the fourth building,
   which was built in 1957

A small two-story house provides offices for the CEO, Business office, and support staff. Residential hospice care for up to five patients is provided in a house adjacent to the main campus.

The Palolo Chinese Home currently has one (1) matter pending with a former resident, seeking recovery of past due sums due and owing for her time with the Home. This former resident is fairly incapacitated, and has been moved from one

home to another by her son. When the collection matter against his mother finally reached the point of a court proceeding, the son filed a "Counterclaim" alleging abuse and other indiscretions on the part of the Home. That and the fee collection matter are now ongoing in the Honolulu District Court, with insurance coverage counsel representing the Home on the claimed tort actions.

#### B. Licensure or Accreditation

The Palolo Chinese Home is presently licensed with the Hawaii State Department of Health as an Adult Residential Care Home Type II – Expanded Care, ICF/SNF, Adult Day Care and a commercial kitchen.
