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## HOUSE RESOLUTION

URGING CONGRESS TO SUPPORT FEDERAL LEGISLATION PROHIBITING HEALTH INSURERS FROM DENYING COVERAGE TO VICTIMS OF DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ON THE GROUNDS THAT IT IS A PRE-EXISTING CONDITION.

WHEREAS, anyone of any race, age, sexual orientation, 1 2 religion, or gender can be subject to domestic violence; and 3 WHEREAS, domestic violence can occur between couples who 4 5 are married, living together, or who are dating; and 6 7 WHEREAS, domestic violence affects people of all socioeconomic backgrounds and education levels; and 8 9 WHEREAS, about one out of every four women in the country 10 will be physically assaulted or raped by an intimate partner at 11 some point in their lives and are more likely to be assaulted, 12 injured, raped, or killed by a male partner than by any other 13 type of assailant; and 14 15 WHEREAS, estimates of assaults on women by partners range 16 from approximately two to four million annually in the United 17 States; and 18 19 WHEREAS, the majority of women killed at work are murdered 20 by a current or former intimate partner; and 21 22 WHEREAS, it has been a common practice among health 23 insurers to deny coverage to victims of domestic abuse on the 24 grounds that domestic violence is a "pre-existing condition"; 25 26 and 27 WHEREAS, it is not uncommon for victims of domestic 28 violence to not report incidents of domestic violence for fear 29 of losing their health insurance coverage; and 30 31 WHEREAS, according to the National Women's Law Center, 32 although forty-two states have enacted laws to prohibit health 33 insurers from classifying domestic violence as a "pre-existing 34 HR LRB 11-0391.doc

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condition", Idaho, Mississippi, North Carolina, North Dakota,
Oklahoma, South Carolina, South Dakota, Wyoming, and the
District of Columbia have not; and

5 WHEREAS, a more comprehensive solution requires federal 6 legislation to ban this unfair practice to provide victims of 7 domestic violence with health care coverage; now, therefore, 8

9 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 10 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session 11 of 2011, that Congress is urged to support federal legislation 12 prohibiting health insurers from denying coverage to victims of 13 domestic violence by classifying domestic violence as a pre-14 existing condition; and

16 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 17 Resolution be transmitted to the President of the United States, 18 the Majority Leader of the United States Senate, the Speaker of 19 the United States House of Representatives, and the members of 20 Hawaii's congressional delegation.
