
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE GENERAL EXCISE TAX.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to expand the
2 general excise exemption for a common paymaster.

3 SECTION 2. Section 237-23.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended to read as follows:

5 "**§237-23.5 Related entities; common paymaster; certain**
6 **exempt transactions.** (a) This chapter shall not apply to
7 amounts received, charged, or attributable to services furnished
8 by one related entity to another related entity or to imputed or
9 stated interest attributable to loans, advances, or use of
10 capital between related entities.

11 As used in this subsection:

12 "Related entities" means:

13 (1) An affiliated group of corporations within the meaning
14 of section 1504 (with respect to affiliated group
15 defined) of the federal Internal Revenue Code of 1986,
16 as amended;

17 (2) A controlled group of corporations within the meaning
18 of section 1563 (with respect to definitions and



1 special rules) of the federal Internal Revenue Code of
2 1986, as amended;

3 (3) Those entities connected through ownership of at least
4 eighty per cent of the total value and at least eighty
5 per cent of the total voting power of each such entity
6 (or combination thereof), including partnerships,
7 associations, trusts, S corporations, nonprofit
8 corporations, limited liability partnerships, or
9 limited liability companies; and

10 (4) Any group or combination of the entities described in
11 paragraph (3) constituting a unitary business for
12 income tax purposes;

13 whether or not the entity is located within or without the State
14 or licensed under this chapter.

15 "Services" means legal and accounting services, maintenance
16 services, repairs, and maintenance expenses paid on behalf of
17 affiliates, the use of computer software and hardware,
18 information technology services, database management, and those
19 managerial and administrative services performed by an employee,
20 officer, partner, trustee, sole proprietor, member, or manager
21 in the person's capacity as an employee, officer, partner,
22 trustee, sole proprietor, member, or manager of one of the



1 related entities and shall include overhead costs attributable
2 to those services.

3 (b) This chapter shall not apply to amounts received by
4 common paymasters which are disbursed as remuneration to
5 employees of two or more related corporations where the common
6 paymaster is making such remunerations on behalf of such
7 corporations. Such amounts received or disbursed by the common
8 paymaster shall include payments of payroll taxes and employee
9 benefits which the common paymaster is making on behalf of
10 related corporations and which payments are related to the
11 employees being remunerated. [~~The~~] For this subsection only,
12 the definitions of related corporations, common paymaster,
13 multiple common paymasters, and concurrent employment contained
14 in 26 Code of Federal Regulations, section 31.3121(s)-1(b) are
15 incorporated and made a part of this subsection.

16 To the extent not covered by subsection (a), the exemption
17 allowed by this subsection shall not apply to the cost of
18 services, or reimbursements of such cost by one corporation to
19 another corporation, of an employee disbursing the amounts
20 exempted under this subsection. Each related corporation using
21 a common paymaster or multiple common paymaster shall keep
22 separate payroll records and other documentation required to



1 prove the existence of concurrent employment. Such records and
2 documents shall be available for inspection by the director of
3 taxation during normal business hours.

4 (c) This chapter shall not apply to amounts received by a
5 common paymaster that are disbursed as remuneration to employees
6 of two or more related persons where the common paymaster is
7 making the remunerations on behalf of the related persons. The
8 amounts received or disbursed by the common paymaster shall
9 include payments of payroll taxes and employee benefits that the
10 common paymaster is making on behalf of the related persons and
11 which payments are for the employees being remunerated.

12 To the extent not covered by subsection (a), the exemption
13 allowed by this subsection shall not apply to the cost of
14 services or reimbursements of the cost by one related person to
15 another related person, of an employee disbursing the amounts
16 exempted under this subsection.

17 Each related person using a common paymaster or multiple
18 common paymaster shall keep separate payroll records and other
19 documentation required to prove the existence of concurrent
20 employment. The records and documents shall be available for
21 inspection by the director of taxation during normal business
22 hours.



1 For the purpose of this subsection only:

2 "Common paymaster" means a person that disburses
3 remuneration to employees of two or more related persons to the
4 common paymaster on their behalf and that is responsible for
5 keeping books and records for the payroll with respect to those
6 employees.

7 "Related persons" mean persons related to a common
8 paymaster within a relationship under section 267 (with respect
9 to losses, expenses, and interest with respect to transactions
10 between related taxpayers) of the Internal Revenue Code."

11 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
12 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

13 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2112.
