<u>HB 313</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CORRECTIONS. Establishes a program within the Department of Public Safety that assigns select, non-violent inmates on a work detail that restores historical sites selected by the Office of Hawaiian Affairs.	PBM, HAW, FIN
<u>HB 1086</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CORRECTIONS. This measure amends Section 353-10, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to separate the intake service centers and reentry services within the department of public safety.	PBM, FIN
<u>HB 1088</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CORRECTIONS. Adds a section to chapter 353, Hawaii Revised Statutes, relating to the mental health treatment of inmates and detainees in the custody of the Department of Public Safety.	PBM, HLT, FIN
<u>HB 142</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES. Directs the attorney general to coordinate a review of the impact of diverting marijuana and certain felony drug offenders out of the criminal justice system into treatment.	PBM, JUD, FIN
<u>HB 1085</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO CONTROLLED SUBSTANCES. This measure amends chapter 329, Hawaii Revised Statutes, to bring the Hawaii statutes on controlled substances to be consistent with the federal laws on controlled substances, and increases the fee for the registration certificate for qualifying patients for medical marijuana. <u>HB 1217</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO BATH SALTS. Defines "dangerous drugs" in the penal code to include mephedrone and methylenedioxypropylone, also known as MDPV.	PBM, HLT, JUD



<u>HB 966</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO FIRE PROTECTION. Requires new building plans to be submitted to the authority having jurisdiction, rather than the county fire chief, before construction commences. Defines the term "authority having jurisdiction."	PBM, WLO, FIN
<u>HB 604</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO FIRE PROTECTION. Prohibits the sale or distribution of novelty lighters.	PBM, JUD
<u>HB 605</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY. Establishes the reduced ignition propensity cigarette program special fund to be funded by fees collected from cigarette manufacturers to administer and provide staff for the reduced ignition propensity cigarette program. Authorizes the state fire council to employ administrative staff.	PBM, FIN
<u>HB 532</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO IOLANI PALACE. Transfers law enforcement jurisdiction over Iolani Palace from the department of land and natural resources to the department of public safety.	PBM, WLO, FIN
<u>HB 1622</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO HISTORIC PRESERVATION. Requires the construction of a state law enforcement memorial in the capitol district.	PBM, WLO, FIN
<u>HB 318</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO VOG. Establishes a volcanic activity task force to discuss the impact of Vog on the people of Hawaii and find ways to address these issues.	PBM, FIN
<u>HB 1614</u> <u>Status</u>	RELATING TO A SILVER ALERT FOR MISSING SENIOR CITIZENS. Creates and implements a silver alert program to be operated concurrently with the Maile Amber Alert program.	PBM, FIN

DECISION MAKING TO FOLLOW

- The Committee the comments are directed to;
- The date and time of the hearing;
- Measure number; and
- The number of copies the Committee is requesting.

While every effort will be made to copy, organize, and collate all testimony received, materials received on the day of the hearing or improperly identified or directed to the incorrect office, may be distributed to the Committee after the hearing.


