#### S.B. 1383 – RELATING TO SCHOOL REPAIR AND MAINTENANCE

Chair Tokuda, Vice Chair Kidani, and members of the committee:

I am Ryan Shigetani, Executive Director of Hawaii 3R's, and I am testifying in support of Senate Bill 1383, which appropriates a \$400,000 grant-in-aid to Hawaii 3R's.

For the past ten years, Hawaii 3R's has successfully put a dent in the public school repair and maintenance backlog by providing proactive schools with a way to complete needed repair and maintenance projects outside of the normal DOE process. Additionally, Hawaii 3R's provides community-minded businesses and organizations with a means to give back to the public schools through donations and volunteerism.

However, Hawaii 3R's faces an uncertain future due to the political climate in Washington, D.C. and may no longer be able to receive federal funds. This reality, coupled with the difficulties of raising private funds during this tough economic period, makes this a key point in determining the future viability of Hawaii 3R's.

If Hawaii 3R's were unable to continue, not only would public school facilities and the students suffer, but the community would lose a valuable partner. These community partners, including American Savings Bank, Central Pacific Bank, Hawaiian Electric Company, Prudential Locations, Grainger, Aloha Air Cargo, New Hope Christian Fellowship Church, and all branches of the military, utilize Hawaii 3R's to plan and coordinate projects with schools and to navigate the DOE bureaucracy.

Due to the State budget situation, it is not surprising that Hawaii 3R's has not received any State funds in the past two years to assist us in carrying out its mission. However, as time goes on, our reserves continue to diminish. Therefore, in spite of the continuing State budget woes, we hope that the Legislature believes that Hawaii 3R's is worth the investment for both the public schools and the community.

Dear Senator Tokuda and Members of the Education Committee:

Please support the Hawaii 3Rs program so that backlogged projects may be completed in the public schools where funds are sorely lacking to maintain and upgrade facilities.

When I first became the principal at Lehua Elementary School 8 years ago, the playground behind D building was mostly rocks and dirt with little grass. Students were hurt quite often. The kindergarten playground behind C building was often muddy due to an uneven ground and poor drainage. We were fortunate to receive a Hawaii 3Rs project and partner with Takano Nakamura Landscaping. Volunteers from the Navy and the community helped to clear the playgrounds, level the ground, plant grass and intall a sprinkler system with a timer that goes on at night to also discourage the homeless in the area. The children have enjoyed both playgrounds for many years and we have had less accidents. The project was completed at a third of the cost because of the Hawaii 3Rs guidelines to engage partners and volunteers.

Other Hawaii 3Rs projects that have also benefitted the school are: painting of the cafeteria dining room and installing new stage curtains, installation of a bicycle rack and school marquee. The projects have brought businesses to the school to assist, and the volunteers are proud to contribute and be part of a school community. All of the projects are great examples of win-win situations to benefit the students and schools.

Please support such projects that help the schools when the DOE funds are being decreased every year.
