1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The **Palolo Chinese Home (PCH)** is a 501 (c) (3) not-for profit organization. Its origins date back to 1896 and it is Hawaii's largest and second oldest Adult Residential Care Home (ARCH II – Expanded Care). PCH has 111 nursing home and residential care beds; PCH also has an adult day care program for 30 senior participants and an adult respite care program that provides short-term overnight stays for community seniors. Completing a full continuum of care services for seniors, PCH provides hospice care on premises through arrangements with all local hospice providers, including Hospice Hawaii, St. Francis Hospice, and Bristol Hospice.

PCH's innovative community-based Hawaii Neighborhood to the Aged (HiNOA) program provides services to assist elders who wish to remain in their homes and are in need of various support service such as physician home visits, home delivered meals, frozen meals and chore services.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

In 2003, PCH embarked on a phased campus redevelopment project to update and modernize its aging facilities and to increase its capacity to provide much needed services to the growing numbers of elderly in Hawaii. PCH has completed Phases I and II of its Master Plan – renovations to an existing nursing home building and the construction of a three-story Skilled Nursing / Food Service Complex and improvements to supporting infrastructure. PCH is currently undertaking Phase

III which is the renovation and modernization of Farm Hall (built in 1957) to provide administrative office space in the former kitchen area and to create a meeting and gathering space for residents and their families. Phase III is scheduled to be completed in July 2012.

PCH is now prepared to launch **Phase IV** of its Master Plan which is the replacement of the aging Victoria Ward building (opened in 1965). The new facility's capacity will increase from 50 to 69 beds and create an updated and spacious residential environment. Project costs are estimated at \$7.5 million.

Plans call for a new building that will have double the square footage of the current building and increase the campus' overall capacity to 130 nursing home and care home beds. The new facility will also be designed to meet the wants and needs of tomorrow's baby boomer senior citizens. In addition to creating jobs in the construction industry, the completion of Phase IV will create an additional 75 healthcare jobs – including RNs, nursing aides, technicians and positions in food service and building and grounds maintenance.

3. State the public purpose and need to be served;

Hawaii has the nation's longest average life span of 79+ years, but ironically also leads the nation in a shortage of skilled nursing beds, lack of affordable housing for seniors and the highest number of extended families living in the same household due to our high cost of living.

According to the first report of the <u>Hawaii State Long Term Care Commission</u>, "Hawaii is home to the fastest aging population in the U.S." The report states that rapid growth in Hawaii's older population will put enormous pressure on families, on existing nursing and adult care facilities and on the state budget. Hawaii has the fewest long-term care beds in the nation: 43.4 beds per 1,000 residents – not even one-half that of the U.S. rate of 88.9 beds per 1,000. Hawaii also reports the

fastest growing rate of senior citizens per capita in the nation with our 60+ population growing 2.5 times faster than the national average.

Demand for long-term care beds continues to increase, yet Hawai'i's bed rate of 43.4 beds per 1,000 residents is not even one-half that of the U.S. rate of 88.9 beds per 1,000 and results in an extremely high occupancy rate for nursing homes – 92.8 percent in 2010 compared to the national average of 83.6 percent. The cost of institutional care in Hawai'i currently exceeds \$108,000 per. By 2020, this figure is projected to reach more than \$175,000 per year.

The addition of new PCH nursing home beds and residences will help to alleviate the State's growing demand for long-term care.

4. Describe the target population to be served

The target population to be served are senior citizens age 60 years and older. In June 2010, PCH commissioned SMS Research and Marketing Services, Inc. to conduct a study of the Hawaii market and assess its geriatric needs. Study results indicated the following: 1) seniors wish to remain in their home as long as possible; services that can extend this time at home are highly desirable; 2) by offering a continuum of care starting with in-home services, seniors will become familiar with PCH and will seriously consider utilizing its residential care service when the time is right; and 3) the majority of seniors desire modern facilities with privacy both in bedrooms and bathrooms but do not wish to pay a premium fee. PCH has targeted its programs, services and the redevelopment of its campus to meet the desires of the seniors and their families as reported in the market study.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

PCH serves residents and clients from throughout the State with the majority from the island of Oahu. In addition, as part of the HiNOA program, PCH focuses on

serving the elderly in the surrounding communities of Palolo, St. Louis Heights, Wilhelmina Rise, Kaimuki and Kapahulu.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

The planning for Phase IV is being conducted by the Obayashi Design Group that also worked on Phase I and III. The 46 year-old Victoria Ward Hall building has 7,530 sq. ft. of interior space and currently provides for 50 residents in a barracks style layout with four (4) beds in each room and 2 community shower and toilet rooms (one for men and one for women). The new one-story building will have 15,885 sq. ft. under the roof, providing 33 private and semi-private rooms each with its own toilet and shower facilities. The building will also include a large courtyard and adjacent activity area for group dining, activities and events.

The PCH Building Committee, comprised of the CEO, Administrator, Board members, architects, construction manager, and contractor will provide oversight and management of the project. The Home's CEO and a construction manager will provide the day-to-day project oversight.

Annual inspections by the State Office of Healthcare Assurance provide an external review of PCH and its facilities. Inspections ensure compliance with State licensure rules, Medicare and Medicaid regulations, patient and resident safety and State and national fire codes. The PCH Building Committee, comprised of the CEO, Administrator, Board member, architects, construction manager, and contractor will provide oversight and management of the project.

Quality assurance monitoring of resident and participant services is provided by a facility-wide quality assurance program. This program monitors key indicators that include falls, skin tears and bruising, pressure ulcers, facility acquired infections, weight loss and dehydration, drug use, and employee injuries. All departments attend a quarterly meeting to review data collected in their reports, identify areas for improvement, and follow up actions to determine effectiveness.

IV. Experience and Capability

The Palolo Chinese Home has extensive experience in caring for frail seniors both on its campus and in their homes in the community. PCH has provided services at its present site for 95 years and from its origins as the Chinese Hospital for 116 ears. It is Hawaii's largest Adult Residential Care Home (ARCH) with Expanded Care. It will continue to provide and increase its capacities for adult day care, overnight respite and hot meals to seniors in the community and services to elders in their homes through its HiNOA program.

PCH has successfully completed two major building projects (Phases I and II) on its campus: renovation of an existing nursing home building, the construction of a three-story Skilled Nursing / Food Service Complex and improvements to the supporting infrastructure. In addition, PCH has the expertise through its CEO, Hawaii licensed architects and contractors, and skilled volunteers to oversee and manage complex planning, development and construction projects.

B. Facilities

The Palolo Chinese Home is located on 15-acres in Palolo valley – the property is fully-owned by the Home. Its campus presently has four major buildings:

- the recently completed three-story Harry and Jeanette Weinberg Hall that provides rooms for 44 nursing beds and houses the Home's commercial kitchen, the Wellness Center and a meeting / conference and community room
- the two-story Harry Wong Building, which was renovated in 2004,
 provides rooms for 17 nursing home beds and the 30 participant adult
 day care program

- the residents' dining room is located in Farm Hall, which was built in 1957 and is currently under renovation
- the one-story Victoria Ward building was built in 1967 and houses 50 Adult Residential Care Home residents (this building will be demolished and rebuilt in Phase IV as described in this application)

A small two-story house provides offices for the CEO, Business office, and support staff. Residential hospice care for up to five patients is provided in a house adjacent to the main campus.

V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

Additional staffing of approximately 75 new employees, consisting of RNs, nursing aides, technicians, food service and building and grounds will be hired as PCH prepares to open the new building.


