I. Background and Summary

1. A brief description of the applicant's background;

The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii (The Chamber) was established in 1850. During its formative years, The Chamber was instrumental in shaping the Kingdom of Hawaii's commerce and trade program. Since then, it has served as Hawaii's leading "Voice of Business" and advocate for establishing and growing Hawaii's business sector and creating jobs for the workforce.

In 1985, at the request of the Governor of Hawaii, The Chamber established its Military Affairs Council (MAC) to serve as the liaison for the state in matters relating to the military and act as an advocate for the military.

The MAC has succeeded in establishing an enduring and viable partnership with US military commanders and defense officials in Hawaii and Washington, DC, and has garnered the full support from the private sector to successfully accomplish its work over the past 26 years.

The defense industry didn't suffer any cutbacks from the congressionally mandated Base Realignment and Closure (BRAC) proceedings in 2005 due in large part to the MAC. The BRAC Commission proposed to close the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, but the MAC financed and coordinated a local effort that resulted in a one-vote margin that saved the shipyard from closure. The shipyard is a \$1.0 billion business and Hawaii's largest industrial center employing 4,300 local civilians in highly paid positions as engineers and skilled technicians. It remains under watchful oversight of the MAC as the US House Armed Services has launched a congressional review of the Navy's four remaining shipyards.

The MAC provides oversight for the \$12.2 billion defense industry, which is the second major source of revenues and jobs for the state.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

This request is submitted to protect Hawaii from cutbacks to the \$12.2 billion defense industry, which accounts for more than 100,500 meaningful jobs for our workforce.

A GIA will provide supplemental funding needed to step up MAC capability in protecting against any decreases in military presence. This is especially critical today as the Nation seeks to cut the defense budget by \$500 billion to possibly a trillion dollars over the next decade.

The Department of Defense (DOD) is currently considering actions to reduce ground, air, and maritime forces of the Army, Navy, Air Force, and Marine Corps; mothball US Navy ships, reduce the DOD civilian workforce, and reposition our forces overseas. Action has been proposed to seek Congressional approval to conduct base realignment and closure proceedings in 2013 and 2015.

The MAC meets regularly with the senior military commanders in Hawaii and has sent a delegation to Washington, DC annually for the past 26 consecutive years to meet with key defense officials and military chiefs in the Pentagon and congressional members and staffers on Capitol Hill. This effort has resulted in establishing strong ties with key officials, and maintaining high visibility for Hawaii as a premier defense community in the Pacific.

The Nation's budget crisis has forced states with significant military presence to step up efforts to protect against any base closures or cutbacks in defense programs. This is a high stakes inter-state competition, and Hawaii's defense industry is faced with critical survival challenges.

State funding is critical to enabling the MAC to better confront these challenges and protect against any significant cutbacks in defense programs.

3. State the public purpose and need to be served;

The bottom-line is to protect and grow Hawaii's second major source of state revenues, the defense industry.

On a macro scale, the military's presence in Hawaii and other strategic locations in the Pacific is the key to maintaining regional security and keeping the international waters of the South China Sea free and open for global commerce and trade. Any disruptions in security that prevail over the

shipment of goods through the South China Sea would have devastating impacts on the economies of Hawaii, the US, and the Asia Pacific.

Locally, a reduction in defense spending would have severe impacts on our economy. A large number of small businesses would face irrecoverable losses and closure. Thousands of jobs would be eliminated and unemployment would likely reach unprecedented levels.

An often overlooked benefit to Hawaii is the military's significant contribution to disaster relief, humanitarian assistance, and community service. Military units, organizations, and members provide valuable assistance during emergencies and natural disasters, are leaders in supporting Hawaii's charitable causes, and volunteer thousands of hours to improve Hawaii's public schools.

Another prominent contribution is the military's dedication in protecting Hawaii fragile environment and Native Hawaiian cultural sites and artifacts. No other agency in Hawaii spends as much funds and resources as does the military in this regard.

The state cannot afford to take a "wait and see" attitude with billions of dollars and thousands of jobs at stake.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

A broad segment of the business sector and workforce, primarily on O'ahu and Kauai, is served by the military's presence in Hawaii. While this includes the large prime defense contractors such as Northrop Grumman, BAE Systems, Lockheed Martin, Raytheon, General Dynamics, etc, there would be hundreds of local general contractors, suppliers, and other small businesses impacted by decreases in defense spending. The closure of the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard, currently under the watchful eye of Congress, would result in the loss of jobs for 4,300 engineers and skilled technicians, and millions of dollars in small business contracts.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Defense spending is primarily centered on O'ahu and Kauai.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities;

The MAC is comprised of Hawaii's business leaders, retired flag and general officers who chose to retire in Hawaii, and senior officials with the state and The City and County of Honolulu, and offices of Hawaii's congressional delegation serving on the US House and Senate Armed Services Committees.

The MAC is responsible for serving as the liaison for the state in matters relating to the military and providing oversight for the defense industry. In doing so, the MAC accomplishes the following work:

- Strives to protect and enhance military presence in Hawaii.
- Meets regularly with the senior commanders for the US Pacific Command, US Pacific Fleet, Pacific Air force, US Army Pacific, Marine Forces Pacific, 14TH Coast Guard District, and Hawaii's National Guard, and their subordinate commands
- Administers the affairs of the Armed Services Committee to ensure positive base-community relations in communities surrounding military bases, and promote federal contracting opportunities for small businesses.
- Conducts an annual conference to update Hawaii's government and business leaders on security issues in the Asia Pacific and status of military presence in Hawaii.
- Administers the affairs of the O'ahu Council that meets to ensure that the military commands are provided with the resources necessary to operate from Hawaii. The Council is co-chaired by the Governor of Hawaii and the Commander of the US Pacific Command, Membership includes the State Senate President; State House Speaker; Mayor of Honolulu; Commanders of the US Pacific Fleet, Pacific Air Forces, US Army Pacific, Marine Forces Pacific, 14th Coast Guard District, and Hawaii National Guard; Chair of the Hawaii Business Roundtable; Chair of the Board of Directors and President/CEO of The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii; Chair of the Hawaii Business Roundtable; Chair of the Armed Services Committee; and Vice President of Military Affairs for The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii.
- Conducts the annual Hawaii Military Appreciation Month to demonstrate Hawaii's appreciation for all that the military does to make Hawaii a safer and better place.
- Sends a delegation of members to Washington, DC annually to meet
 with senior defense officials, service secretaries, and military chiefs in
 the Pentagon; Hawaii's Congressional delegation; professional
 staffers on the US Senate and House Armed Services Committees; and
 other defense and security officials.

2. The applicant shall provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

The following is the timeline for accomplishing the MAC program:

- The Military Affairs Council and Armed Services Committee meet bimonthly on a regular basis, and at other times as required, in January, March, May, July, September, and November..
- January: Annual Hawaii Military Partnership Conference to update Hawaii's government and business leaders on security concerns in the Asia Pacific and status of military forces in Hawaii.
- April/May: Annual visits with senior commanders in Hawaii to prepare for the annual MAC delegation visit to Washington, DC in June.
- May: Annual Hawaii Military Appreciation Month
- June: Annual MAC delegation visit to Washington, DC
- October and March: Semi-annual meetings of the O'ahu Council, as required.

 - The work of the MAC is monitored and evaluated by its members that include the Lt Governor of Hawaii, City Managing Director of the City and County of Honolulu, President/CEO of The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii, Chair of The Chamber's Board, retired military generals/admirals, staff members of Hawaii's congressional delegation, and Hawaii's business leaders. Moreover, the MAC discusses concerns and issues with senior military commanders and defense officials in Hawaii and Washington, DC and Hawaii's congressional delegation.

These defense cutbacks would be permanent and impart serious consequences to Hawaii's economy and workforce.

The Chamber has successfully accomplished its work serving as the state liaison for matters relating to the military since 1985. It began by successfully competing against other US ports to have the decommissioned battleship USS Missouri home-ported at Pearl Harbor to complement the USS Arizona Memorial as fitting historic tributes that mark the beginning and ending of World War II.

More recently, the MAC successfully spearheaded a Hawaii delegation to save the Pearl Harbor Naval Shipyard from closure during the 2005 BRAC proceedings. This action resulted in keeping Hawaii's largest industrial center open, and saving 4,300 civilian engineering and skilled technical jobs.

The MAC remains the state's only liaison in helping the military secure the resources needed to maintain combat ready forces in Hawaii and protect against the loss of any military commands or programs to bases outside of Hawaii.

The work of the Chamber is monitored by key members of the MAC having exceptional background and experience in military affairs. They include retired US admirals and generals, senior business leaders, and key officials in state and county governments.

The military affairs program is adequately managed through leased facilities available at the offices of The Chamber of Commerce of Hawaii. No additional facilities are required. The facilities meet ADA requirements.

The incumbent is also a retired military officer and is currently the Chamber's Vice President for Military Affairs.

The military affairs function is a one person office due to limited funding, requiring the incumbent to work overtime on a regular basis. State funding in the form of a GIA would enable the hiring of an assistant to reduce the workload to a manageable level and provide for continuity.
