

A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CIVIL IDENTIFICATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the United States
2 enacted the REAL ID Act of 2005, P.L. 109-13. The REAL ID Act
3 sets forth in title II, specifically sections 201 and 202, the
4 kind of documentation required and procedures to be followed in
5 issuing driver's licenses and non-driver's, or civil,
6 identification cards. Pursuant to section 37.51 of title 6 of
7 the Code of Federal Regulations, as amended, volume 76 issue 44
8 Federal Register pages 12269-12271 (March 7, 2011), the REAL ID
9 Act must be implemented by January 15, 2013.

10 The legislature further finds that driver's licenses and
11 non-driver's identification cards that do not comply with the
12 REAL ID Act on or after January 15, 2013, will not be recognized
13 by federal agencies, such as the Transportation Security
14 Administration, and may not be recognized by other states. The
15 REAL ID Act must be implemented on a timely basis in order to
16 permit Hawaii's people to travel and to do business with the
17 federal government and other states.



1 The legislature also finds that Hawaii is unique in that
2 the counties, under the general supervision of the director of
3 transportation, have been delegated the function of implementing
4 the state driver's license program since 1937. Under current
5 law, the department of the attorney general issues non-driver's,
6 or civil, identification cards. It is imperative that the two
7 functions be combined in order to comply with the REAL ID Act.

8 The purpose of this Act is to:

- 9 (1) Consolidate the driver's license and civil
10 identification programs for the State of Hawaii under
11 the director of transportation;
- 12 (2) Allow county examiners of drivers to issue civil
13 identification cards; and
- 14 (3) Ensure this consolidation effort and full
15 implementation of this Act to be accomplished by
16 January 15, 2013.

17 SECTION 2. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
18 amended by adding a new subpart to part VI to be appropriately
19 designated and to read as follows:

20 "B. CIVIL IDENTIFICATION CARDS

21 **§286-A Issuance of identification card or temporary card.**

22 (a) To obtain an identification card from the examiner of



1 drivers, an individual shall complete an application pursuant to
2 section 286-C.

3 (b) The examiner of drivers, upon receipt of the
4 application by any individual who is a resident or a temporary
5 resident of this State, shall issue an identification card to
6 that individual upon receipt of any appropriate fee established
7 pursuant to section 286-I.

8 (c) The identification card shall be similar in size,
9 shape, and design to a driver's license, but shall not entitle
10 the individual to whom it is issued to operate a motor vehicle.

11 (d) The issuance of an identification card pursuant to
12 this section shall not place upon the State of Hawaii or any
13 agency any liability for the misuse or the acceptance of the
14 identification card as valid identification, which shall be left
15 entirely to the discretion of any individual to whom such card
16 is presented.

17 **§286-B Oaths and investigations.** The examiner of drivers
18 and each authorized subordinate may administer oaths and require
19 and take oral or written statements under oath of any individual
20 in connection with any information required under this subpart
21 or any rule under this part.



1 **§286-C Application for identification card. (a)**

2 Application for the identification card shall be made in person
3 by any adult or minor. The minimum age for minors to obtain an
4 identification card shall be ten years of age. In the case of a
5 minor under the age of fourteen years, the application shall be
6 made on the minor's behalf by the parent, or by another
7 individual in loco parentis of the minor who can provide proof
8 of guardianship. In the case of an incompetent individual, the
9 application shall be made by the individual having the custody
10 or control of or maintaining the incompetent individual.

11 (b) Application for renewal of an identification card
12 issued after November 1, 1998, for an individual eighty years of
13 age or older may be done by mailing in a completed application
14 and fee, if there is no change in name and citizenship status.
15 The director shall adopt rules to allow for renewal by mail for
16 individuals with physical or intellectual disabilities for whom
17 application in person presents a serious burden.

18 (c) Every application for an identification card or
19 duplicate of an identification card shall be made on a form
20 developed by the director and furnished by the examiner of
21 drivers, signed by the applicant, and signed by the applicant's



1 parent or guardian if the applicant is under eighteen years of
2 age. The application shall contain the following information:

3 (1) Name and complete address, including the number and
4 street name, of the applicant's permanent residence;

5 (2) The applicant's occupation and any pertinent data
6 relating thereto;

7 (3) The applicant's citizenship status;

8 (4) The applicant's date and place of birth;

9 (5) General description of the applicant, including the
10 applicant's gender, height, weight, hair color, and
11 eye color;

12 (6) The applicant's left and right index fingerprints or,
13 if clear impressions cannot be obtained, other
14 identifying imprints as specified by rules of the
15 director;

16 (7) The social security number of the applicant; and

17 (8) A digitized frontal photograph of the applicant's full
18 face.

19 Each applicant shall present documentary evidence as required by
20 the examiner of drivers of the applicant's age and identity, and
21 the applicant shall swear or affirm that all information given
22 is true and correct.



1 (d) The application also shall state whether the applicant
2 has an advance health-care directive. If the applicant has an
3 advance health-care directive, the identification card shall
4 bear the designation "AHCD".

5 (e) The examiner of drivers, in accordance with section
6 11-15, at the time of application, shall make available an
7 application for voter registration to every applicant for an
8 identification card who is eligible to register to vote.

9 (f) The examiner of drivers shall maintain a suitable,
10 indexed record of all applications.

11 (g) For the purpose of this section, "AHCD", which stands
12 for "advance health-care directive", means an individual
13 instruction in writing, a living will, or a durable power of
14 attorney for health care decisions.

15 **§286-D Procedure.** (a) All information required by
16 section 286-C shall be obtained by employees of the examiner of
17 drivers as provided for by rules of the director and by
18 individual interviews with the applicant for the identification
19 card or parent, individual in loco parentis, or guardian, as
20 shown by letters of guardianship. Every applicant or individual
21 providing information on behalf of any applicant under this part
22 shall answer truthfully all questions, furnish all information



1 within the possession or knowledge of the individual that may be
2 asked or required by the employee within the scope of the
3 requirements of this subpart, and submit to the examiner of
4 drivers all information and supporting documentation required by
5 rules of the director.

6 (b) Special provisions may be made by rules adopted by the
7 director.

8 (c) The examiner of drivers may require an applicant, or
9 any individual providing information on behalf of an applicant,
10 to furnish original or certified copies of documents to
11 establish or corroborate the information required to establish
12 identity under this subpart and may, by rules, set forth what
13 documents will be required to support or corroborate certain
14 information.

15 **§286-E Contents and characteristics; form.** (a) Each
16 identification card issued by the examiner of drivers shall
17 display a distinguishing number assigned to the cardholder, and
18 shall display the following inscription:

19 "STATE OF HAWAII IDENTIFICATION CARD"

20 (b) The examiner of drivers, after obtaining the
21 fingerprint of the applicant as provided in this subpart and
22 after obtaining the information required by or pursuant to this



1 subpart, shall issue to each applicant an identification card in
2 a form and with identifying information that the director deems
3 necessary and appropriate.

4 (c) The identification card shall not display the
5 cardholder's social security number.

6 (d) The identification card shall be designed to prevent
7 its reproduction or alteration without ready detection.

8 (e) The identification card for individuals under twenty-
9 one years of age shall have characteristics prescribed by the
10 examiner distinguishing it from that issued to a individual who
11 is twenty-one years of age or older.

12 **§286-F Expiration; renewal; replacement.** (a) Every
13 identification card issued under this subpart, whether an
14 original or a renewal, shall bear an expiration date that shall
15 be the date and month of the individual's birthday eight years
16 after the year of issuance; provided that if the individual is a
17 legal nonimmigrant, the certificate shall bear an expiration
18 date that is the same as the expiration date on the individual's
19 arrival-departure record, CBP Form I-94. A cardholder may renew
20 the cardholder's identification card within six months before
21 the day on which it expires by filing an application in



1 accordance with section 286-C and paying the prescribed fee
2 establish by rules of the director.

3 (b) If an identification card is lost, destroyed, stolen,
4 or mutilated, the individual to whom the identification card was
5 issued may obtain a duplicate by paying the fee established by
6 rules of the director and by:

7 (1) Furnishing suitable proof of the loss, destruction, or
8 mutilation to the examiner; and

9 (2) Filing an application and presenting documentary
10 evidence under section 286-C.

11 Any individual who loses an identification card and, after
12 obtaining a duplicate, finds the original, shall immediately
13 surrender the original to the examiner.

14 (c) The examiner of drivers shall cancel any
15 identification card upon determining that the identification
16 card was obtained unlawfully, issued in error, or altered. The
17 examiner also shall cancel a REAL ID compliant identification
18 card that is surrendered to the examiner of drivers after the
19 cardholder has obtained a duplicate or replacement REAL ID
20 compliant identification card, or if a REAL ID-compliant
21 driver's license has been previously issued.



1 (d) No agent of the State or its political subdivisions
2 shall condition the granting of any benefit, service, right, or
3 privilege upon the possession by any individual of an
4 identification card. Nothing in this section shall preclude any
5 publicly operated or franchised transit system from using an
6 identification card for the purpose of granting benefits or
7 services of the system. No individual shall be required to
8 apply for, carry, or possess an identification card.

9 **§286-G Identification cards not to be altered; duties of**
10 **holder; lost certificates.** (a) No individual, except agents of
11 the examiner acting pursuant to the authority of law, shall
12 alter, deface, or destroy any identification card. Except as
13 specifically authorized by this section or the rules of the
14 director, no cardholder shall loan or give the individual's
15 identification card to any other individual, and no individual
16 shall use the identification card of any other individual.

17 (b) Any individual whose identification card is stolen or
18 otherwise lost, altered, defaced, or destroyed, may at any time
19 apply for a duplicate identification card. The duplicate shall
20 be issued by the examiner of drivers upon being satisfied as to
21 the loss, alteration, defacing, or destruction. In the case of
22 an altered or defaced identification card, the identification



1 card, if available, shall be surrendered by the cardholder and
2 canceled by the examiner.

3 (c) Any individual finding or coming into possession of
4 the identification card of any other individual shall promptly
5 return or deliver the same to the owner thereof, the examiner of
6 drivers that issued it, or any law enforcement officer.

7 **§286-H. Correction or alteration of records and**
8 **identification cards in cases of error or subsequent changes**
9 **concerning names, citizenship, description, etc. (a) A**
10 cardholder who, after receiving an identification card, has a
11 change in one or more of the following:

- 12 (1) Name, legally changed by marriage, divorce, adoption,
13 legitimization, order of the lieutenant governor, or
14 other legal means;
15 (2) Citizenship status;
16 (3) Address; or
17 (4) Individual in charge of the cardholder (in the case of
18 a minor or incompetent individual),

19 within thirty days after the change, shall report the change,
20 submit supporting documents, and present the cardholder's
21 identification card to the examiner. The examiner of drivers,
22 upon being furnished with satisfactory proof as to the change,



1 and receiving payment of the fee, shall cancel the
2 identification card and issue a new identification card bearing
3 the new name, citizenship status, or address of the cardholder,
4 making appropriate notation of the facts upon the records of the
5 examiner.

6 (b) If any error has been made in any item of information
7 contained in the records of the examiner of drivers or on the
8 identification card concerning any cardholder, the examiner of
9 drivers or the cardholder, upon application and upon provision
10 of evidence satisfactory to the examiner that an error has been
11 committed, may correct the error and, in such case, shall make
12 appropriate changes or notations stating the error and the
13 correct information in the records of the examiner of drivers
14 and on the identification card.

15 (c) If any item of the cardholder's personal information
16 was originally correct, but will change after issuance of the
17 identification card and the examiner of drivers finds the change
18 material, the examiner of drivers may register the change and
19 alter the records and identification card to conform thereto,
20 upon receipt of satisfactory evidence of the change and approval
21 of the examiner.



1 **§286-I Rules.** For the purpose of carrying out this
2 subpart, the director, pursuant to chapter 91, shall adopt rules
3 including rules assessing reasonable fees for the services
4 provided under this subpart. The rules shall authorize the
5 examiner of drivers to waive any fee in cases of extreme
6 hardship and provide criteria for determining whether a waiver
7 is warranted.

8 **§286-J Forms.** The director may prepare, prescribe, and
9 furnish, in conformity with this subpart, forms for
10 questionnaires, notices, fingerprint cards or forms,
11 certificates of identification, instructions, and all other
12 forms necessary or proper for the prompt, efficient, and
13 adequate execution of the functions of the examiner of drivers
14 set forth in this subpart.

15 **§286-K Custody and use of records; confidential**
16 **information.** (a) All information and records acquired by the
17 examiner of drivers under this subpart shall be confidential.
18 All information and records shall be maintained in an
19 appropriate form and in an appropriate office in the custody and
20 under the control of the examiner. The information shall be
21 available only to authorized individuals under such restrictions
22 as the director shall prescribe. The examiner may dispose of



1 any application or identification card, or information or record
2 relating to the application or identification card, which does
3 not include a social security number, without regard to chapter
4 94, whenever, in the examiner's discretion, retention of the
5 information or record is no longer required or practicable.

6 (b) No officer or employee of the examiner of drivers
7 shall divulge any information concerning any cardholder acquired
8 from the records of the examiner or acquired in the performance
9 of any of the officer's or employee's duties under this part to
10 any individual not authorized to receive the same pursuant to
11 this part. No individual acquiring from the records any
12 information concerning any cardholder shall divulge the
13 information to any individual not so authorized to receive the
14 same.

15 **§286-L Civil identification card fee special fund.** There
16 is established in the state treasury a special fund to be known
17 as the civil identification card fee special fund. The fund
18 shall consist of all fees assessed for the processing and
19 issuance of identification cards. The fund shall be used for
20 the purposes of the identification card program. The fund shall
21 be administered by the director. The fund shall be held
22 separate and apart from all other moneys, funds, and accounts in



1 the state treasury. Interest and investment earnings credited
2 to the assets of the fund shall become a part of the fund. Any
3 balance remaining in the fund at the end of any fiscal year
4 shall be carried over to the next fiscal year.

5 **§286-M Reimbursement to counties.** The counties shall be
6 reimbursed the incremental costs incurred in the administration
7 of this subpart. The amount of reimbursement shall be
8 determined by the director of transportation."

9 SECTION 3. Section 286-2, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
10 amended by adding a new definition to be appropriately inserted
11 and to read as follows:

12 "Identification card" means a document made or issued
13 under part VI that, when completed with information concerning a
14 particular individual, is intended solely for the purposes of
15 civil identification."

16 SECTION 4. Section 128-6, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
17 amended to read as follows:

18 **"§128-6 Civil defense powers, in general.** The governor
19 may:

20 (1) Plans and programs. Prepare comprehensive plans and
21 programs for the civil defense of this State, the
22 plans and programs to be integrated into and



- 1 coordinated with the civil defense plans of the
2 federal government and of other states to the fullest
3 possible extent; and coordinate the preparation of
4 plans and programs for civil defense by the political
5 subdivisions of the State, the plans to be integrated
6 into and coordinated with the civil defense plans and
7 programs of the State to the fullest possible extent;
- 8 (2) Training, public information. Institute training
9 programs and public information programs;
- 10 (3) Direct operational control, when. In the event of
11 disaster or emergency beyond local control, or which
12 in the opinion of the governor is such as to make
13 state operational control necessary, assume direct
14 operational control over all or any part of the civil
15 defense functions within this State;
- 16 (4) Insignia. Provide or authorize suitable insignia of
17 authority for all authorized personnel;
- 18 (5) Registration and blood typing. Provide for:
- 19 (A) Compulsory registration and identification to the
20 extent that voluntary registration and
21 identification has not been accomplished under



1 chapter [~~846, part II;~~] 286, part VI, subpart B;

2 and

3 (B) Compulsory RHo blood typing on females of child
4 bearing age or younger, and such other compulsory
5 blood typing as may be approved by competent
6 medical authority;

7 (6) Protection of facilities. Require each public
8 utility, or any person owning, controlling, or
9 operating a vital facility, to protect and safeguard
10 its or the person's property, or to provide for the
11 protection and safeguarding; and provide for the
12 protection and safeguarding of all public properties,
13 or such other properties as the governor may consider
14 advisable; provided that without prejudice to the
15 generality of the foregoing two clauses, the
16 protecting and safeguarding may include the regulation
17 or prohibition of public entry thereon, or the
18 permission of the entry upon such terms and conditions
19 as the governor may prescribe;

20 (7) Explosives, etc. Except as provided in section 134-
21 7.2, whenever in the governor's opinion the laws of
22 the State do not adequately provide for the common



1 defense, public health, safety, and welfare,
2 investigate, regulate, or prohibit the storage,
3 transportation, use, possession, maintenance,
4 furnishing, sale, or distribution of, as well as any
5 transaction related to, explosives, firearms, and
6 ammunition, inflammable materials and other objects,
7 implements, substances, businesses, or services of a
8 hazardous or dangerous character, or particularly
9 capable of misuse by disloyal persons or the enemy, or
10 obstructive of or tending to obstruct military
11 operations or civil defense, including, without
12 limitation, intoxicating liquor and the liquor
13 business; and authorize the seizure and forfeiture of
14 any such objects, implements, or substances unlawfully
15 possessed, as provided in section 128-28; and

16 (8) Air raid drills, etc. Direct or control, as may be
17 necessary for civil defense:

18 (A) Air raid drills, and other alerts, tests, and
19 exercises;

20 (B) Blackouts and practice blackouts;

21 (C) Partial or full mobilization of civil defense
22 organizations in advance of actual disaster;



- 1 (D) Warnings and signals for drills, alerts, or
- 2 attacks, and the mechanical devices to be used in
- 3 connection therewith;
- 4 (E) Shutting off water mains, gas mains, electric
- 5 power connections, or suspension of other
- 6 services; and to the extent permitted by or under
- 7 federal law, suspension of radio transmission;
- 8 (F) The conduct of civilians and the movement and
- 9 cessation of movement of pedestrians and
- 10 vehicular traffic during, before, and after
- 11 blackouts, drills, alerts, or attacks;
- 12 (G) Traffic control;
- 13 (H) The congregation of the public in stricken or
- 14 danger areas or under dangerous conditions; and
- 15 (I) The evacuation and reception of the civilian
- 16 population; provided that only during a civil
- 17 defense emergency period shall there be
- 18 instituted under this paragraph mandatory or
- 19 prohibitory requirements having the force and
- 20 effect of law."

21 SECTION 5. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
 22 amended by amending the title of part VI to read as follows:



1 "PART VI. MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVER LICENSING AND CIVIL
2 IDENTIFICATION CARDS"

3 SECTION 6. Chapter 286, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
4 amended by designating sections 286-101 to 286-140, as subpart A
5 and inserting a title before section 286-101, to read as
6 follows:

7 "A. MOTOR VEHICLE DRIVER LICENSING"

8 SECTION 7. Section 286-102, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
9 amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:

10 "(c) No person shall receive a driver's license without
11 surrendering to the examiner of drivers all valid driver's
12 licenses and all valid identification cards in the person's
13 possession. All licenses and identification cards so
14 surrendered shall be returned to the issuing authority, together
15 with information that the person is licensed in this State;
16 provided that with the exception of driver's licenses issued by
17 any Canadian province, a foreign driver's license may be
18 returned to the owner after being invalidated pursuant to
19 issuance of a Hawaii license; and provided further that the
20 examiner of drivers shall notify the authority that issued the
21 foreign license that the license has been invalidated and
22 returned because the owner is now licensed in this State. No



1 person shall be permitted to hold more than one valid driver's
2 license at any time."

3 SECTION 8. Sections 286-101, 286-102(e), 286-104, 286-106,
4 286-107(c), 286-108(a), 286-110(a), 286-112(a) and (c), 286-113,
5 286-114, 286-122(a), 286-123, 286-125, 286-134, 286-136(a), and
6 286-137, Hawaii Revised Statutes, are amended by substituting
7 the phrase "this subpart" wherever the phrase "this part"
8 appears.

9 SECTION 9. Chapter 846, part II, Hawaii Revised Statutes,
10 is repealed.

11 SECTION 10. To provide for the transition to issuance of
12 civil identification cards by the examiner of drivers, all valid
13 and unexpired civil identification cards issued by the
14 department of the attorney general up to and including December
15 31, 2012, shall remain valid for all purposes until their stated
16 expiration date.

17 SECTION 11. All rights, powers, functions, and duties of
18 the department of the attorney general as they relate to the
19 civil identification program are transferred to the department
20 of transportation; provided that the department of the attorney
21 general shall retain such authority as necessary to ensure
22 uniformity in the issuance of identification cards.



1 All officers and employees whose functions are transferred
2 by this Act shall be transferred with their functions and shall
3 continue to perform their regular duties upon their transfer,
4 subject to the state personnel laws and this Act.

5 All employees who occupy civil service positions and whose
6 functions are transferred to the department of transportation or
7 the examiners of drivers of the respective counties, pursuant to
8 a plan approved by the State and the counties, shall retain
9 their civil service status (permanent or temporary). Employees
10 shall be transferred without loss of salary, seniority,
11 retention points, prior service credit, any vacation and sick
12 leave credits previously earned, and other rights, benefits, and
13 privileges, in accordance with state personnel laws and this
14 Act, provided that the employees possess the minimum
15 qualifications and public employment requirements for the class
16 and/or position to which transferred or appointed, as
17 applicable, provided further that subsequent changes in status
18 may be made pursuant to applicable civil service and
19 compensation laws.

20 Any employee who, prior to this Act, is exempt from civil
21 service and is transferred as a consequence of this Act, may
22 continue to retain the employee's exempt status, but shall not



1 be appointed to a civil service position because of this Act.
2 An exempt employee who is transferred by this Act shall not
3 suffer any loss of prior service credit, any vacation and sick
4 leave credits previously earned, or other employee benefits or
5 privileges as a consequence of this Act, provided that the
6 employees possess legal and public employment requirements for
7 the position to which transferred or appointed, as applicable;
8 provided that subsequent changes in status may be made pursuant
9 to applicable employment and compensation laws. The director of
10 transportation or the examiners of drivers of the respective
11 counties, pursuant to a plan approved by the State and counties,
12 may prescribe the duties and qualifications of such employees and
13 fix their salaries without regard to chapter 76, Hawaii Revised
14 Statutes.

15 SECTION 12. All rules adopted by the attorney general to
16 implement the provisions of part II, chapter 846, Hawaii Revised
17 Statutes, the substance of which is made applicable to the
18 director of transportation under this Act, shall remain in full
19 force and effect until amended or replaced by the director of
20 transportation pursuant to rules adopted pursuant to chapter 91,
21 Hawaii Revised Statutes.



1 All rules adopted by the attorney general, deeds, leases,
2 contracts, loans, agreements, permits, or other documents
3 executed or entered into by or on behalf of the department of
4 the attorney general or the attorney general pursuant to the
5 provisions of the Hawaii Revised Statutes that are reenacted or
6 made applicable to the department of transportation or director
7 of transportation by this Act, shall remain in full force and
8 effect. From January 1, 2013, every reference to the department
9 of the attorney general or the attorney general shall be
10 construed as a reference to the department of transportation or
11 the director of transportation, as appropriate.

12 SECTION 13. All appropriations, records, equipment,
13 machines, files, supplies, contracts, books, papers, documents,
14 maps, balances in the state identification revolving fund, and
15 other personal property heretofore made, used, acquired, or held
16 by the department of the attorney general relating to the
17 functions transferred to the department of transportation shall
18 be transferred with the functions to which they relate.

19 SECTION 14. The balance of all unexpended or unencumbered
20 moneys in the state identification revolving fund, established
21 by section 846-27, Hawaii Revised Statutes, as of the effective
22 date of this Act shall be transferred to the civil



1 identification card fee special fund, established by section
2 286-L, Hawaii Revised Statutes, on the effective date of this
3 Act.

4 SECTION 15. This Act shall be liberally construed to
5 accomplish the purposes set forth in section 1 of this Act.

6 SECTION 16. This Act does not affect rights and duties
7 that matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that
8 were begun before its effective date.

9 SECTION 17. If any provision of this Act, or the
10 application thereof to any person or circumstance, is held
11 invalid, the invalidity does not affect other provisions or
12 applications of the Act that can be given effect without the
13 invalid provision or application, and to this end the provisions
14 of this Act are severable.


15 SECTION 18. All laws and parts of laws heretofore enacted
16 that are in conflict with the provisions of this Act are hereby
17 amended to conform herewith.

18 SECTION 19. In codifying the new sections added by section
19 2 of this Act, the revisor of statutes shall substitute
20 appropriate section numbers for the letters used in designating
21 the new sections in this Act.
