
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO CRIMINAL HISTORY RECORD CHECKS FOR COUNTY EMPLOYEES.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 378-2.5, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended by amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
3 "(d) Notwithstanding subsections (b) and (c), the
4 requirement that inquiry into and consideration of a prospective
5 employee's conviction record may take place only after the
6 individual has received a conditional job offer, and the
7 limitation to the most recent [~~ten-year~~] fifteen-year period,
8 excluding the period of incarceration, shall not apply to
9 employers who are expressly permitted to inquire into an
10 individual's criminal history for employment purposes pursuant
11 to any federal or state law other than subsection (a),
12 including:

- 13 (1) The State or any of its branches, political
14 subdivisions, or agencies pursuant to sections 78-2.7
15 and 831-3.1;
- 16 (2) The department of education pursuant to section 302A-
17 601.5;

1 SECTION 2. Section 846-2.7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
2 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:

3 "(b) Criminal history record checks may be conducted by:

4 (1) The department of health on operators of adult foster
5 homes or developmental disabilities domiciliary homes
6 and their employees, as provided by section 333F-22;

7 (2) The department of health on prospective employees,
8 persons seeking to serve as providers, or
9 subcontractors in positions that place them in direct
10 contact with clients when providing non-witnessed
11 direct mental health services as provided by section
12 321-171.5;

13 (3) The department of health on all applicants for
14 licensure for, operators for, prospective employees,
15 and volunteers at one or more of the following:
16 skilled nursing facility, intermediate care facility,
17 adult residential care home, expanded adult
18 residential care home, assisted living facility, home
19 health agency, hospice, adult day health center,
20 special treatment facility, therapeutic living
21 program, intermediate care facility for individuals
22 with intellectual disabilities, hospital, rural health



1 center and rehabilitation agency, and, in the case of
2 any of the above facilities operating in a private
3 residence, on any adult living in the facility other
4 than the client as provided by section 321-15.2;

5 (4) The department of education on employees, prospective
6 employees, and teacher trainees in any public school
7 in positions that necessitate close proximity to
8 children as provided by section 302A-601.5;

9 (5) The counties on employees and prospective employees
10 who may be in positions that place them in close
11 proximity to children in recreation or child care
12 programs and services;

13 (6) The county liquor commissions on applicants for liquor
14 licenses as provided by section 281-53.5;

15 (7) The county liquor commissions on employees and
16 prospective employees involved in liquor
17 administration, law enforcement, and liquor control
18 investigations;

20 employees of child caring institutions, child placing
21 organizations, and foster boarding homes as provided
22 by section 346-17;

9 classified meetings and assisting vulnerable and
10 disabled citizens during emergencies or crises; and

12 its branches, political subdivisions, or agencies as
13 may be authorized by state law."

14 SECTION 3. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
15 and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.

16 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.

Criminal History Record Checks for County Employees; City and County of Honolulu Package

Description:

Allows counties to conduct criminal history checks on prospective liquor commission employees. Allows counties to conduct criminal history checks on prospective employees working with vulnerable adults or seniors, employees for fire department and emergency medical services positions, and emergency management employees with certain additional requirements. Allows for criminal history record checks to be conducted on an employee's most recent fifteen year period. (HB1765 HD1)
