
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO FELONIES FOR WHICH CRIMINAL CHARGES MAY BE
INSTITUTED BY WRITTEN INFORMATION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Section 806-83, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is

4 information for a felony when the charge is a class B felony
5 under section 134-7(b) (ownership or possession prohibited,

7 pistols and revolvers; penalties); section 134-25 (place to keep
8 pistol or revolver; penalty); section 134-26 (carrying or
9 possessing a loaded firearm on a public highway; penalty);

1 SECTION 2. This Act does not affect rights and duties that
2 matured, penalties that were incurred, and proceedings that were
3 begun before its effective date.

4 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.

5 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2012.
