A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO KALO APPRECIATION MONTH.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. Kalo ($Colocasia\ esculenta$), the Hawaiian word

2 for taro, is a culturally significant plant to the kanaka maoli,

3 Hawaii's indigenous peoples, and to the State. In 2008, the

4 legislature recognized kalo's role in the State's history and

5 well-being by designating kalo as the state plant. As Hawaiian

6 culture and the sustainability movement have flourished over the

7 past few decades, so has the resurrection of taro cultivation

8 and its popular byproduct: poi.

9 The legislature finds that while varieties of taro grow in

10 almost all tropical regions of the world, Hawaii seems to have

11 some of the strongest taro traditions. Taro is a plant of

12 unique and distinctive character which was brought to a higher

13 state of cultivation in old Hawaii than anywhere else in the

14 world. Native cultivation of taro in Hawaii created more

15 varieties adaptable to varying conditions of locale, soil, and

16 water than are to be found anywhere else in Polynesia or the

17 world.

- 4 SECTION 2. Chapter 8, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is amended

- 7 "§8- Kalo Appreciation Month. The month of October
- 8 shall be known and designated as "Kalo Appreciation Month". The
- 9 month of October shall celebrate the strong kalo tradition in
- 10 Hawaii and the cultural connection of kalo, the Hawaiian word
- 11 for taro, to native Hawaiians. This month is not and shall not
- 12 be construed as a state holiday."
- 13 SECTION 3. New statutory material is underscored.
- 14 SECTION 4. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
