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A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGING AND DISABILITY RESOURCE CENTERS.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

The aging and disability resource center 1 SECTION 1. (a) initiative is a collaborative effort led by the United States 2 Department of Health and Human Services Administration on Aging 3 and the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services, and involves 4 the partnership of the federal Office on Disability, the 5 Administration for Developmental Disabilities, as well as the 6 United States Department of Education and the United States 7 Department of Veterans Affairs. This initiative seeks to 8 streamline access to long-term services and support for older 9 adults, persons with disabilities, family caregivers, and 10 11 providers. Aging and disability resource centers serve as a single 12 point of entry into the long-term support and service system for 13 older adults, people with disabilities, caregivers, and 14 families. Sometimes referred to as "one stop shops" or "no 15 wrong door" systems, aging and disability resource centers help 16 17 individuals and their families to identify their long-term support and service needs, understand their long-term support 18

1 options including publicly funded programs that are available to 2 them, and develop and activate a long-term support and service 3 plan. Aging and disability resource centers raise the awareness 4 about the full range of available options; provide objective 5 information, advice, counseling, and assistance; empower people to make informed decisions about their long-term support and 6 service needs; and help people access public and private 7 8 programs. Aging and disability resource centers are designed to 9 address the frustrations that many consumers and their families 10 experience when they need information and access to available 11 support and services. In many communities, long-term support 12 and services are administered by multiple agencies and have 13 complex, fragmented, and often duplicative intake, assessment, 14 and eligibility functions. Determining how to obtain services 15 can be difficult for consumers and their families, and a single, 16 coordinated system of information and access for all persons 17 seeking long-term support minimizes confusion, enhances 18 individual choice, and supports informed decision-making. Aging 19 and disability resource centers also improve the ability of the 20 State and counties to manage resources and monitor program 21

quality through centralized data collection and evaluation.

1 The legislature finds that aging and disability (b) 2 resource centers are an integral component of health care and 3 long-term care reform and essential in the development of effectively managed person-centered service systems. 4 These 5 person-centered systems are envisioned to: Optimize choice and independence; 6 (1) Be served by an adequate workforce; 7 (2) 8 (3) Be transparent; 9 (4)Encourage personal responsibility; 10 (5) Provide coordinated high quality care; 11 (6) Be financially sustainable; and 12 (7) Utilize health information technology. The aging and disability resource center initiative focuses on 13 improving access to long-term support and services so that an 14 individual may receive the right services at the right time and 15 16 in the right place. The legislature finds that aging and disability 17 resource centers use two broad strategies to divert individuals 18 from unnecessary long-term institutional care and ensure that 19 20 short-term institutional stays do not become permanent by:

- 3 For example, many aging and disability resource centers have
- 4 collaborated to support individuals who are transitioning across
- 5 long-term support and service settings such as hospitals and
- 6 nursing homes. This collaboration has included aging and
- 7 disability resource centers working to raise visibility about
- 8 home- and community-based service options within their
- 9 communities, providing options counseling to potential
- 10 participants and their families, conducting assessments, care
- 11 plan development, waiver enrollment, and service initiation and
- 12 follow-up. The legislature also finds that aging and disability
- 13 resource centers play a critical role in supporting this long-
- 14 term care reform by improving the ability of the State and
- 15 counties to effectively manage the system, monitoring program
- 16 quality, and measuring responsiveness of state and county
- 17 systems of care.
- 18 (d) The purpose of this Act is to create a single point of
- 19 entry into Hawaii's long-term support and service system by:
- 20 (1) Establishing the aging and disability resource center
- 21 program and placing it under the authority of the
- 22 executive office on aging; and

(2) Appropriacing moneys for the establishment of aging
and disability resource centers statewide.
SECTION 2. Chapter 349, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
amended by adding a new section to be appropriately designated
and to read as follows:
"§349- Aging and disability resource centers;
established. (a) There is established the aging and disability
resource center program within the executive office on aging to
streamline access to long-term support and services by
integrating the full range of long-term support and services
into a single coordinated system.
(b) Aging and disability resource centers shall be located
in each county in areas that are easily accessed by all county
residents. Aging and disability resource centers shall make
long-term care information available to persons regardless of
age, income, or disability. Information shall be provided in a
patient-specific manner and shall include comprehensive
information on long-term support options, including but not
limited to:
(1) Medicaid, medicare, federal Older Americans Act

programs, United States Department of Veterans Affairs

1		programs, and other federal, state, and county
2		revenue-funded programs and services;
3	(2)	Privately administered programs and services;
4	(3)	Application processes for publicly funded programs;
5	(4)	Services and support for people with Alzheimer's

16	<u>(c)</u>	Aging and disability resource centers shall direct

12	as may be necessary for fiscal year 2012-2013 for the						
13	developme	development of the aging and disability resource center program					
14	and the e	stablishment of aging and disability resource centers,

16	The	sum appropriated shall be expended by the executive					
17	office on aging for the purposes of this Act.						
18	SECT	ION 4. The allocation of moneys made to the counties					
19	under sec	tion 3 shall constitute the State's share of funding					
20	required	under article XIII, section 5 of the state					

constitution.
