
A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO PUBLIC SAFETY.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

1 SECTION 1. The legislature finds that the most recent
2 information on the use of drugs, alcohol, and tobacco reveals a
3 disturbing rise in the use of these substances among the native
4 Hawaiian population. Many studies conducted both nationally and
5 statewide show native Hawaiians to be at particularly high risk
6 for substance abuse. Among students in the eighth and tenth
7 grades, native Hawaiian children rank highest among all ethnic
8 groups in the use of these substances. The studies also show
9 that substance abuse starts at an early age, and if not
10 addressed:

11 (1) Leads to more serious offenses, which erode family
12 structures spiritually, psychologically, socially, and
13 economically;

14 (2) Creates many health hazards and problems for and with
15 the individual; and

16 (3) Leads to other serious problems, such as poverty,
17 homelessness, and a growing dependence on both legal
18 and illegal drugs that in turn may lead to child



1 abuse, family abuse, sexual abuse, and other serious
2 life-threatening crimes.

3 The legislature finds that a pu'uhonua, or wellness center,
4 based on Hawaiian cultural practice will help the native
5 Hawaiian community and the community at-large. Unquestionably,
6 many high risk individuals need to be cared for in a much more
7 sensitive intervention program that will address solutions to
8 alleviate their problems. The greatest potential to stem the
9 tide of this horrific situation lies in the creation of a
10 pu'uhonua that comprises a culturally-based substance abuse
11 treatment and intervention program that takes a holistic
12 approach, based on cultural identity and strength to get to the
13 core, the why, of substance abuse. The cultural practices of
14 pule, ho'oponopono, aloha 'aina, mahi'ai, la'au lapa'au, and aloha
15 will help create a sensitive setting. These cultural practices
16 have been successful in the past, possessing the optimal
17 potential to heal an individual. A culturally-based pu'uhonua
18 will restore and maintain a better atmosphere and relationship
19 among family, friends, community, and society.

20 The goal of the wellness center is to reduce recidivism,
21 prevent crime, and ensure long-term positive change by
22 reestablishing highly-recognized native Hawaiian cultural



1 practices that restore the overall well-being of individuals,
2 families, and the native Hawaiian community.

3 The legislature further finds that the site formerly used
4 as the Kulani correctional facility in east Hawaii would be an
5 ideal site for such a wellness center. It is a place of deep
6 spirituality for the Hawaiian people and, pragmatically, it has
7 the infrastructure and historical precedent for use in
8 sustainable living. However, there may be other locations that
9 can serve as options in determining a viable and ideal site for
10 such a wellness center.

11 The purpose of this Act is to create the legislative
12 wellness center task force to move forward with the concept of
13 pu'uhonua, or wellness center, and to recommend a location for
14 the wellness center on lands owned or controlled by the State
15 with preference given to the site formerly used as the Kulani
16 correctional facility in east Hawaii.

17 SECTION 2. (a) There shall be established within the
18 legislature for administrative purposes a legislative wellness
19 center task force. The task force shall develop a plan and make
20 recommendations to move forward with the concept of pu'uhonua, or
21 wellness center, and to recommend a location for



1 the wellness center on lands owned or controlled by the State
2 with preference given to the site formerly used as the Kulani
3 correctional facility in east Hawaii.

4 (b) The legislative reference bureau shall provide
5 administrative support to the legislative wellness center task
6 force.

7 (c) The co-chairs of the legislative wellness center task
8 force shall be the chairs of the senate committee on Hawaiian
9 affairs and public safety, government operations, and military
10 affairs, and the chairs of the house committee on Hawaiian
11 affairs and public safety and military affairs. The task force
12 may include representatives from the following departments,
13 agencies, and organizations to be appointed jointly by the
14 president of the senate and the speaker of the house of
15 representatives:

- 16 (1) Office of Hawaiian affairs;
- 17 (2) Department of Hawaiian home lands;
- 18 (3) Department of public safety;
- 19 (4) Department of land and natural resources;
- 20 (5) Department of health;
- 21 (6) Department of human services;



1 (7) Four representatives from 'Ohana Ho'opakele and other
2 restorative justice groups; and

3 (8) Four representatives from wellness center advocate
4 groups.

5 (d) The legislative wellness center task force shall
6 submit a preliminary plan and recommendation report
7 including any necessary proposed legislation, to the
8 legislature no later than January 10, 2013.

9 (e) The legislative wellness center task force shall cease
10 to exist on June 30, 2013.

11 The members of the task force shall serve without
12 compensation, and all necessary expenses, including travel
13 expenses, shall be paid by the agency, organization, or
14 department to which the member belongs. No member shall be made
15 subject to chapter 84, Hawaii Revised Statutes, solely because
16 of that member's participation as a member of the task force.

17 SECTION 3. This Act shall take effect on July 1, 2030.
