
HOUSE CONCURRENT RESOLUTION

URGING THE STATE OF HAWAII TO RECOGNIZE MOKAUEA ISLAND AS A
CULTURAL AND EDUCATIONAL RESOURCE AND INCLUDE MOKAUEA
ISLAND ON THE REGISTER OF HISTORIC PLACES.

1 WHEREAS, Mokauea Island is a group of islands located in
2 Keehi Lagoon, Kalihi Ahupuaa, Mokauea ili, Honolulu (Kona)
3 District, island of Oahu, State of Hawaii; and
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5 WHEREAS, Mokauea Island is the site of Oahu's last Hawaiian
6 fishing village and one of only two remaining in Hawaii; and
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8 WHEREAS, Keehi Lagoon was once a thriving fishing community
9 with over thirteen fishponds, seven fisheries, and home to alii;
10 and
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12 WHEREAS, in pre-European times, Hawaii had hundreds of
13 fishing villages which were a repository of maritime skills
14 including knowledge of the sea, currents, tides, seasonalities,
15 and the building and handling of canoes and fishing equipment.
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17 WHEREAS, Mokauea Island's fishing community was once
18 entirely self-sufficient due to a functional fishpond,
19 cultivation of vegetable and medicinal plants, as well as limu,
20 and a healthy supply of reef fish in the surrounding area; and
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22 WHEREAS, descendents and family members of the Mokauea
23 fishing village residents can trace their genealogy back nine-
24 hundred years to the second migration of Polynesians to Hawaii;
25 and
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27 WHEREAS, references to one of the Mokauea islands are
28 included in Ka Mo'olelo O Hi'iakaikapoliopole (The Epic Tale of
29 Hi'iakaikapoliopole) and in Namakalehu, which describes the
30 story of when the second wave of Polynesians first stepped foot
31 in Hawaii on a reef near one of the Mokauea islands; and



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2 WHEREAS, in 1839, Kamehameha III's Constitution and code of
3 laws assigned Keehi Lagoon to be the royal fishing grounds and
4 placed as kapu, recognizing the abundance of fish in the area
5 and the need to preserve and protect the natural resource; and
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7 WHEREAS, the 1902 Federal Fish Commission Report revealed
8 that by 1900, half of the Hawaiian fishponds either had been
9 destroyed or were inoperable, but that the remaining half
10 produced over 560,000 pounds of fresh fish annually; and
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12 WHEREAS, from 1900 to 1972, the fishponds and islands of
13 the Keehi Lagoon area were drastically altered or destroyed by
14 dredging to the extent that none of the fishponds recorded by
15 the 1900 Commission remain in existence today; and
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17 WHEREAS, in 1972, the State attempted to evict the
18 seventeen families living on Mokauea Island to build an airport
19 runway extension, but several fishers refused to leave and were
20 arrested for trespassing on the same land their families had
21 lived on for generations; and
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23 WHEREAS, in June of 1975, as a final eviction attempt and
24 without due process, government agents burned down the homes of
25 five fishers, destroying both their means of livelihood and
26 their personal belongings; and
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28 WHEREAS, important cultural artifacts have been found on
29 the island, including an unfinished, pre-1900, near shore koa
30 fishing canoe that narrowly escaped destruction in the 1975
31 fires; and
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33 WHEREAS, eviction of the fishers was publicized and the
34 fishers formed the Mokauea Fishermen's Association to pressure
35 the state and federal agencies to negotiate; and
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37 WHEREAS, Governor George Ariyoshi, in response to public
38 pressure, ordered a formal historical study of the area and its
39 fishing community by the State Historic Preservation Officer;
40 and
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42 WHEREAS, the State Historic Preservation Officer issued a
43 report in response to the Governor's order and found Mokauea to
44 be "an area of important historic concern", which qualified the



1 island community for preservation status under federal and state
2 law; and

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4 WHEREAS, as a result of the preservation status, the
5 Mokauea Fisherman's Association negotiated a sixty-five-year
6 lease with the State; provided that they rebuild their homes
7 according to the building code and establish an educational
8 program for local students to learn about traditional fishing
9 and the reef environment; and

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11 WHEREAS, the fishers and their families then rebuilt their
12 homes, and the Mokauea Fishermen's Association began restoring
13 and reviving the fishing village with the cooperation of the
14 United States Army and groups of students, teachers, scholars,
15 and scientists; and

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17 WHEREAS, the United States Navy provided labor and
18 machinery to construct a fishpond on the eastern side of the
19 island and consultants from the University of Hawaii helped the
20 residents stock it with resources; and

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22 WHEREAS, over time, the fishpond on the island faced
23 challenges ranging from invasive species to pollution and was
24 ultimately abandoned; and

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26 WHEREAS, only a handful of families remain on the island
27 and none possess the resources needed to establish an
28 educational program or the necessary facilities without
29 significant assistance; and

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31 WHEREAS, since 2005, significant progress has been made
32 toward achieving the goal set by the Mokauea Fisherman's
33 Association to recreate a living example of a traditional
34 Hawaiian subsistence fishing village such that it becomes a
35 learning center allowing for scientific studies and the
36 perpetuation and practice of Hawaii fishing and seafaring
37 culture; and

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39 WHEREAS, many school groups and community organizations
40 have participated in restorative efforts and free-choice
41 learning experiences on the island, helping to ensure the
42 transmission of Hawaiian traditional ecological knowledge; and

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1 WHEREAS, to allow for the continuation of the educational
2 and cultural programs associated with Mokauea Island and the
3 families of the Mokauea Fisherman's Association, formal
4 recognition of its importance by state and federal agencies is
5 essential; now, therefore,

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7 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the
8 Twenty-sixth Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session
9 of 2012, the Senate concurring, that the United States National
10 Register of Historic Places and the State Historic Preservation
11 Division are urged to recognize Mokauea Island as a cultural and
12 educational resource and include Mokauea Island on the Hawaii
13 and National Register of Historic Places; and

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15 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that formal recognition of the
16 cultural and educational importance of Mokauea Island is in
17 keeping with State Historic Preservation Officer's 1975 report
18 noting the island's historic importance; and

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20 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that formal recognition of the
21 cultural and educational importance of Mokauea Island is in
22 keeping with the Hawaii State Legislature's goal to protect
23 Hawaii's distinctive cultural heritage; and

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25 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this
26 Concurrent Resolution be transmitted to the United States
27 Secretary of the Interior, Chief of the National Register of
28 Historic Places, the Governor, the Chairperson of the Board of
29 Land and Natural Resources, and the Administrator of the State
30 Historic Preservation Division.
