A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO LONG TERM CARE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

SECT	ION 1. The legislature finds the following:
(1)	Americans are living longer today than in the past
	with multiple, chronic health conditions and greater
	rates of disability in old age;
(2)	The aging of the population in Hawaii guarantees that
	there will be a greater need for long term care in the
	future than there is currently. Between 2007 and
	2030, the population aged eighty-five and older, which
	has the greatest need for long term care, will
	increase by almost two-thirds;
(3)	Despite the fact that long term care is not covered by
	medicare or regular private health insurance,
	according to a recent 2011 survey of Association of
	American Retired Persons members in Hawaii, twenty-
	nine per cent of respondents said they expected
	medicare to pay for their long term care, if needed;
(4)	Most people in Hawaii have limited knowledge on long
	term care issues, which can affect their motivation to
	(1)

1		spend time and resources establishing their future
2		long term care plans; and
3	(5)	A long term care education campaign will create
4		awareness among the next generation of long term care
5		recipients, those between the ages of forty-five and
6		sixty-four, about the risks of not planning for long
7		term care, available resources, and maximizing the
8		length of independent living.
9	The p	ourpose of this Act is to appropriate funds to the
10	executive	office on aging of the department of health to
11	administe	r a public education and awareness campaign on long
12	term care	and obtain an evaluation of the campaign.
13	SECT:	ION 2. (a) The department of health's executive
14	office on	aging shall conduct a long term care education and
15	awareness	campaign.
16	(b)	The campaign shall:
17	(1)	Inform the public on the likelihood of needing long
18		term care at some point in life;
19	(2)	Educate the public on the cost of long term care,
20		including the limits of medicaid eligibility and the
21		limits of medicaid benefits;

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1	(3)	Inform the public on the value and availability of
2		current financing and delivery options to obtain long
3		term care; and
4	(4)	Provide the public with resources to navigate the
5		complexities of planning for long term care and the
6		agencies that provide these services.
7	(c)	The director of the executive office on aging shall
8	have the	impact of the campaign independently evaluated for its
9	effective	ness.
10	(d)	The director of the executive office on aging shall

submit the report of the evaluation's findings and

SECTION 3.
