Three-fourths of all goats in the world are located in the developing regions of the world.


Our goats come from a huge island ranch and are fed grass, shrubberies, and trees.

My name is Tim Johnston, Operations Manager of Ka'anapali Kai Charters. We have two commercial sailing catamarans, Teralani 2 & Teralani 3 that operate and beach load on Ka'anapali, Maui. We have been in business since 1994 and currently employ 26 people.

We appreciate the efforts being made by the Legislature in addressing swimmer vessel safety issues. We request that you also support the need for Kaanapali ORMA Permitted Vessel access to nearby state boating facilities when wind and sea conditions make beach loading either impossible or quite dangerous.

We would like to see language like this put into SB 2933 that would guide DLNR to adopt rules to allow for the use of nearby State boating facilities on the island of Maui by the vessels with Kaanapali ORMA permits when wind and sea conditions make Kaanapali Beach untenable and accommodate their regular provisioning at nearby State Boating facilities for safety, and economic development.

Currently, when surf conditions prevent us from safely loading, we have no other option but to cancel our trips – even if conditions on the ocean are ideal. Having this option would allow us to operate in a safe manner and continue to keep the economy going strong.

We humbly ask you to please pass SB 2933 with amendments.
