#### Monday, February 6, 2012

# ORDER OF THE DAY THIRD READING

S.B. No. 2205:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 2205, having been read thoughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President, I rise to speak in favor of the action before the Senate. This is not a new idea; in fact, it was proposed when I served as Judiciary Chairman in the Senate in 1987. What this does, basically, is it takes the politics out of selecting individuals by the Judicial Selection Commission prior to sending the names to the Governor. This proposal compels the Judicial Selection Commission to pick the very best three candidate applicants, as opposed to the best four or five or six. This is in keeping with trying to improve the Judiciary. I urge my colleagues to allow the people of Hawai't to consider a favorable vote at the next election. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2205, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VI, SECTION 3, OF THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION TO LOWER THE NUMBER OF NOMINEES PRESENTED BY THE JUDICIAL SELECTION COMMISSION TO FILL STATE COURT JUDICIAL VACANCIES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 23. Noes, none. Excused, 2 (Fukunaga, Kahele).

S.B. No. 2206:

Senator Hee moved that S.B. No. 2206, having been read throughout, pass Third Reading, seconded by Senator Shimabukuro.

Senator Hee rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. Again, this is a constitutional amendment for the electorate to consider. What it does is for prospective judges—none seated presently—it raises the retirement age from 70 to 80.

"As I believe all of you know, we will be considering the Governor's selection to be nominated to fill a vacancy on the Supreme Court for Justice Jim Duffy, who will turn 70 in June. Justice Duffy is perhaps the best example of someone who should remain on the Supreme Court. If any of you know, and I'm sure most of you know, his integrity and his character, the caliber of service that he has contributed to the Supreme Court of Hawai'i, and also to the people of Hawai'i.

"I would note here that, as all of you know, federal judges serve for life. The state judges, on the other hand, by the state's own choosing selected age 70 as the mandatory age of retirement. I was not here when that was done, but evidently I have concluded that there is very little that is magical about age 70

"So, I hope that all of you will consider allowing the electorate to consider this raising of the mandatory age for all judges prospectively. Thank you."

Senator Baker rose to speak in support of the measure as follows:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I, too, rise in support of this measure, with one caveat: I would hope that the chair of Judiciary might consider another constitutional amendment that would allow judges who have retired past the age of 70 but are still interested in serving as maybe a per diem capacity or on some specialty courts, to allow that because we will have a number of very fine judges who are meeting the threshold, even if this amendment were to be adopted by the voters, and we're losing a lot of talent because that barrier is in our Constitution. And even if judges want to serve in a volunteer or per diem capacity after they pass age 70, they're prohibited. Thank you."

Senator Hee rose in response and said:

"Thank you, Mr. President. I agree with the previous speaker. I invite her to write the con amendment and commit to her that I will hear the constitutional amendment. I will support the amendment, and I will do what I can to encourage the Judiciary Committee to also support it.

"I will note that a perfect example of the previous speaker's suggestion is a bill that the Committee on Judiciary heard regarding electronic TROs, primarily for domestic abuse cases, and primarily for women who get beat up by their drunk spouse on Friday night and cannot file for a TRO but wait until Monday during business hours to take time off to catch the bus to the courthouse in Kapolei to find out if a judge will hear it. The retired judge that the previous speaker spoke about is a perfect example, the perfect remedy, to engage the wisdom of someone who technically retires at age 70. So, we look forward to the proposal and we will do what we can to pass it. Thank you."

Senator Kim rose to speak in support of the measure with reservations as follows:

"This matter was put on the ballot before and the voters voted it down. And while I'm not sure what the magic age is, I am in favor of raising it, but I'm not sure that 80 might be the right age. At the same time, the fact that I'm not sure how often we're going to put it on the ballot until we get a positive vote on it, but the voters did in fact vote this measure down. Thank you."

The motion was put by the Chair and carried, S.B. No. 2206, entitled: "A BILL FOR AN ACT PROPOSING AN AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE VI, SECTION 3, OF THE HAWAII STATE CONSTITUTION TO INCREASE THE MANDATORY RETIREMENT AGE FOR STATE JUSTICES AND JUDGES," having been read throughout, passed Third Reading on the following showing of Ayes and Noes:

Ayes, 24; Ayes with Reservations (Kim, Solomon). Noes, none. Excused, 1 (Kahele).
