SUBJECT: GM 636 – State Council on Developmental Disabilities

Gubernatorial Nominee April Mira

The State Council on Developmental Disabilities (DD) **STRONGLY SUPPORTS GM 636** to confirm the nomination of April Mira for a term to expire June 30, 2016.

The Council's Federal mandate (P.L.106-402) is clear in determining the composition of this body to ensure that all the players involved in the development, implementation, and use of DD supports are represented. The law specifically requires that 60 percent of the membership of the Council be comprised of individuals with DD, their parents, or family members. Additionally, the following are required to be on the Council: relevant State entities; State entities that administer funds provided under the Rehabilitation Act of 1973; the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act; the Older Americans Act of 1965; Titles V and XIX of the Social Security Act; the Protection and Advocacy Agency; the Centers for Excellence in DD Education, Research, and Service; local and non-governmental agencies, and private non-profit groups concerned with services for individuals with DD.

Ms. Mira's reappointment to the Council would continue to fulfill the Federal requirement for representatives of individuals with DD. She was first appointed to the Council in July 2008. She lives independently with supports in an apartment in Pearl City operated by the Arc in Hawaii. She is a graduate of the Council-sponsored Partners in Policymaking (PIP) Leadership Academy. The PIP Academy is an innovative program for individuals with DD and family members of individuals with DD. The program is designed to provide information, training, resources, and skills, which will develop productive partnerships between people who need and use services and those in position to make policy and law.

Ms. Mira desires to help other individuals with DD become independent like her and advocate for themselves. She is a member of the Self-Advocacy Advisory Council (SAAC) and has been actively involved in recruiting members for SAAC. She was involved with SAAC in getting legislation introduced and passed to remove the "R" (retarded) word from State Statutes. She also participated in the Governor's signing of the bill as Act 220/11. She is a current member of the Council's Community Supports, Employment and Education, and Health and Early Childhood Committees.

The Council is pleased with April Mira's nomination to serve a second term on the Council and looks forward to her continued participation on SAAC and other Council Committees as mentioned above.

Thank you for the opportunity to express our strong support for **GM 636** to confirm April Mirá to the State Council on Developmental Disabilities.
