Testimony With Comments Concerning GM 646 Nominating Kim Iwamoto to the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission

Honorable Chair, Vice Chair and members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor, this testimony comments on the Governor's nomination of Kim Iwamoto to the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission pursuant to GM 646.

My name is Jim Hochberg and I have been an attorney in Honolulu since 1984, during most of which time I have included in my practice a pro bono project protecting the 1st Amendment rights of religious folks in Hawaii. I also served as one of seven members on the Governor's Commission of Sexual Orientation and the Law in 1995. I testify and lobby on my own behalf as part of that pro bono service.

Please ask these questions of Kim Iwamoto in connection with the nomination to the Civil Rights Commission:

- 1. The HCRC's jurisdiction is limited to discrimination in employment (HRS 378) and real estate transactions (HRS 515) and public accommodations (HRS 489).
 - a. Have you read those statutes?
 - b. If not, why not? When do you plan on reviewing them?

- c. HRS 489 prohibits discrimination, among other reasons, on the basis of sex. The Catholic Churches does not allow women to be ordained as priests, the required initial stepping stone to Bishop, ArchBishop, Cardinal and Pope.
 - Should a woman be able to bring a claim before the HRCR against the Catholic Church because of that under any of the statutes the HCRC enforces?
 - ii) HRS 489 also prohibits discrimination on the basis of religion. Don't churches discriminate on the basis of religion? Should a non-believer be permitted to bring a claim at the HCRC against a church for discriminating on the basis of religion?
 - iii) If a person rents out a room in his/her home, should the HCRC have jurisdiction?
 - If yes, under which of the 3 subject matter jurisdiction statutes mentioned above?
 - iv) Are you aware of the Hosana Tabor opinion under Title 7 claim that Supreme Court of the United States issued? (It was a unanimous decision protecting religious freedom for religious institutions. Issued Jan 2012).
 - v) Should a private Christian school be compelled by the HCRC to hire a non-Christian teacher, or a teacher who fails to meet the standard of conduct required for its employees?
 - vi) If there is a case before the HCRC involving a conflict between the statutory rights of LBGT people and the constitutional rights afforded to religious institutions, which do you think should prevail?
- d. As an attorney, are you familiar with the common law history of public accommodations?
 - (1) What historically were considered to be public accommodations?
 - (2) What role do public accommodation statutes play in that history?

- 2. Many Christians believe that same sex civil unions and marriages are morally wrong according to their faith. Would you, as a member of the HCRC, support the right of churches, holding such views, to deny same sex couples the use of the church sanctuary, facilities, and other property to solemnize or celebrate their same sex union?
- 3. When you served on the Board of Education, you used BOE stationery to testify in support of civil unions. Did the BOE vote to support the passage of a civil union law?

As was stated in January, 2012 by the a three judge panel of the Sixth Circuit Court of Appeals:

"Tolerance is a two-way street. Otherwise, the rule mandates orthodoxy, not anti-discrimination." JULEA WARD v. VERNON POLITE; United States Court of Appeals, Sixth Circuit. Decided and Filed: Jan. 27, 2012.

Thank you for your consideration of my testimony and I remain available to assist in any way that I can to resolve this issue to protect the religious freedom of the churches in Hawaii with respect to the use of their properties concerning civil unions.
