

My name is Dayton M. Nakanelua and I am the State Director of the United Public Workers, AFSCME, Local 646, AFL-CIO (UPW). The UPW is the exclusive bargaining representative for approximately 11,000 public employees, which include blue collar, non-supervisory employees in Bargaining Unit 1 and institutional, health and correctional employees in Bargaining Unit 10, in the State of Hawaii and various counties. The UPW also represents about 1,500 members of the private sector.

James Wataru has been serving as State President of UPW, AFSCME, LOCAL 646, AFL-CIO and presiding over our State Executive Board since October 2009. Previously, he served as a Division Vice President overseeing the administration of the UPW Oahu Division Executive Board. James also served two terms as Delegate to the Oahu Division Board. He has remained actively involved as a member of UPW for nearly 13 years, having served

several terms as a union representative and Chief Steward at his place of employment. Concurrently, James has continued to serve as a member of our Executive and Full Negotiating Committees.

In his roles representing this union, James has demonstrated himself to be an individual capable of working with the whole; unafraid to ask the difficult questions in an effort to realize the collective vision of contributing to our community by improving conditions for our members in the workplace and the home. James has illustrated his understanding of our goals for a better community, not only as a member of this union and his participation in events benefitting the community; but also by participating – upon his own volition - in community projects, events and activities that are important to him as a citizen of the City and County of Honolulu and the State of Hawaii.

As it is clear that James understands the importance of an individual's contribution to society, he embodies the ideals necessary of a commissioner.

After your full consideration, I ask that the Committee on Public Safety, Government Operations, and Military Affairs find James Wataru qualified and recommend that the State Senate advise and consent his nomination.
