TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF GM 754 (JONATHAN STARR)

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

The Sierra Club, Hawaii Chapter, with 10,000 dues paying members and supporters statewide, *supports* the appointment of Jonathan Starr to the Commission on Water Resource Management (GM 754).

Jonathan Starr is a highly respected, long-time advocate for a balanced approach to stewarding natural resources for a strong economy today *and* a prosperous future for tomorrow. He recently completed a five year term on the Maui Planning Commission and, demonstrating his capacity to work with others, was elected to serve two years as the Chair and one year as the Vice Chair of the Commission. Previously, he spent four years on the Maui Board of Water Supply. He served in a judiciary capacity as presiding officer on a number of contested case hearings before the planning commission, and in a technical capacity as Chair of the Operations and Investigative Committee of the Board of Water Supply.

As an active member of the Maui community, he served in a leadership capacity for several Maui community organizations and nonprofits. Mr. Starr is also a local bee farmer and has run several successful businesses.

The State Water Code specifically requires appointees to have "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 174C-7(b). Mr. Starr meets this standard, and his experience and passion for sustainability would be a welcome voice on the water commission.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Solomon, and Committee Members,

My name is Jonathan Likeke Scheuer. I was born and raised on the island of O'ahu and have studied and worked on water issues in Hawai'i for nearly two decades. My past and present work has been significantly focused on the how the CWRM, staff, and other players in water issues interact in the implementation of the 1987 Water Code.

As you and your Committee well know, implementation of the Code has been difficult, and multiple Commission decisions have been overturned by the Hawai'i Supreme Court. The Court has repeatedly found the Commission has failed to correctly interpret and implement the law in their decision making. Because of this, financial and human resources have been diverted from taking proactive steps to fulfill the Code's dual mandates of resource protection and use. As water is the critical resource for all people in our islands, the costs of these outcomes should not be overlooked.

Ultimately, this repeated pattern of overturning CWRM decisions has multiple causes. If one seeks to understand this dilemma in order to improve it (rather than to lay blame), it is extremely reasonable to state that there could have been better decisions made by the Commissioners who have served as Trustees of this public trust, the Executive Branch that has a role in appointing Commissioners, and the Senate who must confirm these appointments.

It is for these reasons that the Senate's role in confirmation of appointees to the CWRM is so critical. It is particularly crucial that the Senate consider whether or not the candidates have the affirmative statutory requirement of having "substantial experience in the area of water resource management" (HRS 174C-7(b)). Beyond that, it is essential for the Senate to consider the overall balance of the Commission and to ensure that the multiple groups and areas that have a stake in water decisions have a voice and representation on the Commission.

Jonathan Starr, who is now familiar to you as one of the two nominees to CWRM before you today, clearly meets these two tests. In my work on water and other issues, I have had the opportunity to interact with him multiple times, and to me he clearly meets the minimum qualifications outlined in the law and also would contribute an important perspective to the Commission in deliberations.

You have an opportunity today, by confirming Mr. Starr, to take a very positive step in implementing the state's Water Code, and I urge you to do so. Mahalo for your consideration of my mana'o.
