TESTIMONY IN OPPOSITION TO GM 755 (TED YAMAMURA

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

The Sierra Club, Hawaii Chapter, with 10,000 dues paying members and supporters statewide, *opposes* the appointment of Ted Yamamura to the Commission on Water Resource Management (GM 755). It is difficult to come forward and state opposition to an appointment because the appearance of a personal assailing is inevitable. We want to be completely clear that our objection to this appointment has absolutely nothing to do with the personal integrity or character of Mr Yamamura. This opposition is based solely on whether Mr. Yamamura meets the qualifications necessary to serve on the water commission.

Mr. Yamamura's background as a land appraiser -- while a valuable skill -- does not appear to met the high standard required to serve on the water commission. The State Water Code specifically requires appointees to have "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." Haw. Rev. Stat. § 174C-7(b). There is no evidence to establish Mr. Yamamura meets the bar of "substantial experience," much less any experience in "water resource management."

A background in appraising land or, possibly, the value of water is not the same as knowing how to manage water resources for future generations as required under Hawai'i's constitution.

While the Governor retains the capacity to nominate appointees, it is up to the Senate to advise and consent as to whether these individuals meet the constitutional and statutory requirements. Given the important mandate of the water commission to safeguard Hawaii's water resources, having balanced, knowledgeable administrators is critical. The Senate should respectfully require the executive branch to nominate someone that has a background in planning, conservation, or water management that meets the statutory prerequisite.

The ILWU Local 142 supports the confirmation of Ted Yamamura to serve on the Commission on Water Resource Management.

Mr. Yamamura is Executive Vice President and Senior Appraiser for ACM Consultants, Inc., a real estate valuation and advisory group. He has 32 years of experience in land issues and land valuation. He has served the community as an officer or board member of a number of organizations and public boards, including the Board of Water Supply for the County of Maui.

We believe that Mr. Yamamura is well qualified and will bring to the Commission his integrity and ability to be fair and impartial in his deliberations. As a real estate appraiser, Mr. Yamamura must consider the facts before him in assessing the value of a piece of property. He will do the same as a member of the Water Commission, making his decisions based on the facts.

Mr. Yamamura is familiar with water issues and, through his career and experience in the community, has developed the necessary skills to make reasoned decisions. His critics may argue that he lacks legal, technical and specific knowledge of water resource issues, but Mr. Yamamura was not selected to serve on the Commission as a technical expert. Instead, he is being asked to represent the public's interests, to make decisions based on sound evaluation of the facts, and to consider all factors in protecting water resources for the public in general. Setting the criteria to serve unreasonably high would virtually eliminate citizen participation on the Commission on Water Resource Management.

There are clearly many who are firmly of one opinion or another with regard to water resource management. None of them, regardless of their technical expertise or experience, should be considered for the Commission. The Senate should confirm someone who has not prejudged the issue or comes with an "agenda" or has already made a decision before being presented with the facts. The Senate should confirm someone like Ted Yamamura who will consider the facts in an unbiased manner and make a decision that will, rather than polarize the community, strike a necessary balance that will help to bring the community together.

The ILWU urges the confirmation of Ted Yamamura for the Commission on Water Resource Management. Thank you for considering our views.

I oppose the appointment of Ted Yamamura to the Commission on Water Resources Management because the law provides for an individual with substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian resource management techniques and usage and in the 25 years since the law was passed, a native Hawaiian practitioner who meets these qualifications has never been appointed.

Hawaii law, HRS sec. 174C-7(b) states:

Five members shall be appointed by the governor subject to confirmation by the senate, ... provided that at least one member shall have substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage

But instead, CWRM has been stacked with Maui Commissioners, opponents of Native Hawaiian water rights, specifically friends and allies of Alexander & Baldwin, and its subsidiary East Maui Irrigation. Every single CWRM decision denying Native Hawaiians has been overturned by appellate courts. These opponents of Native Hawaiians have been making bad decisions and forcing parties into decades' long costly litigation to appeal their decisions. After 25 years of ignoring Native Hawaiians, it's time to stop the collusion between A&B, EMI and the state. Please do not confirm Mr. Yamamura to CWRM as he is not knowledgable about Native Hawaiian water resource management and traditional usage.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

My name is Harold Vidinha and I am testifying in strong opposition to GM 755, nominating Ted Yamamura to the State Water Commission.

I am a US military veteran and my family has lived here on Kaua'i for many generations. We hunt, we fish, we farm kalo. Our lives are interdependent with the water of our river, the ocean and streams.

Our Hawaiian community understands fully that water is a public trust. Ahupua'a principles do not allow for the privatization of water or the idea of water as a commodity to be bought and sold for money. Water sustains us. It is the basic component to all life now and always.

I believe very deeply that our state leadership on water rights must be strong, qualified, and committed to defending the public trust doctrine for Hawaii's water.

Your nominee, Mr. Yamamura, fails to meet the standard of an acceptable nominee to the Water Commission. The nomination is especially troubling because others who are more qualified have been passed over. Mr. Yamamura's expertise is in real estate and land valuation, with 30 years as a monetary appraiser of land. Yet, according to the Hawaii Revised Statutes, substantial experience in the area of water resource management is required in order to make sound judgments as a steward of this valued resource.

In the past we have seen poorly-made decisions affecting Hawaiian waters in the case of private sector-sponsored "experts." (See testimony GM543_WTL_03-24-08_Late_.pdf) In such cases, taro farmers and others who derive their sustenance from the land and water are often given the burden to demonstrate their need for water, contrary to the fundamental legal burden on all diverters to justify the taking of water for their off stream use.

Substantial experience and expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and traditional Hawaiian riparian usage are required capabilities of the Water Commission. Mr. Yamamura does not seem to have such expertise.

Political nominations like these make the people lose hope that government is there to

serve the people's interest. It causes frustration, anger, and lack of faith in the democratic process. That should not be the legacy of your Committee – by moving forward with this nomination, you will have taken one more step for having made Hawaii's people less hopeful, less protected, in the name of private sector interests.

The water rights of Hawaiians occupy too high a priority to simply confirm this appointment without greater consideration of alternative candidates.

I ask that you consider water rights expert representation for our island as well. Kaua'i has good advocates that can defend the public trust doctrine both on our island as well as across the state, and they should also be considered in this nomination process.

Please vote to deny Mr. Yamamura's nomination.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Solomon, and Committee Members:

I write to strongly oppose the appointment of Ted Yamamura to the Commission on Water Resource Management ("Commission"). I do not know Mr. Yamamura, and my opposition to his nomination is not personal. My opposition is based on the integrity of the nomination process, the over-representation of Maui on the Commission, and the rejection of applicants who are unquestionably qualified to guide Hawai's water future in favor of an applicant who does not appear to have even the minimum statutory qualifications. Hawai's fragile water resources are simply too critical to select those who serve as trustees based purely on political considerations, without regard to expertise. Indeed, given the decline in rainfall over the past decade, and the prospect of further decline due to climate change, the role of the Commission is even more important today than it than it was a quarter of a century ago when the legislature determined that a Commissioner must have "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." HRS § 174C-7(b).

The seat Mr. Yamamura was nominated to fill has been vacant since June 30, 2011, when Commissioner Kiyosake completed her term. Anticipating the vacancy, the Commission staff began soliciting applications for her replacement in October 2010. It is far from obvious why it has taken well over a year to fill this seat, the only thing that **is** abundantly clear is that the delay was **not** caused by an extended search to find the most qualified person. Indeed, just days before Mr. Yamamura's nomination was announced, Glenn Hong, the prior nominee, stepped down after candidly admitting that he did not possess the statutory qualifications to serve on the Commission. Moreover, unlike Mr. Hong, and now Mr. Yamamura, several of the applicants not only had substantial experience and expertise in managing water resources, but also a demonstrated and long-standing commitment to preserving these resources for future generations.

Moreover, if the two pending nominees are confirmed, a majority of the Commission, i.e., four out of seven (and four out of the five appointed Commissioners), will be from Maui. The only justification that has been provided for this extreme imbalance is that there are major pending water disputes on Maui. While that is certainly the case, it is not a reason to stack the Commission with Maui residents to the exclusion

of any other Neighbor Islanders. Indeed, quite the opposite is true. The enactment of the Water Code was mandated by the 1978 amendments to the Hawai'i constitution, in which the people of Hawai'i decided that our water resources were too crucial to continue being managed strictly on a local level. Thus, the constitution was amended to provide, among other things, that "[t]he State has an obligation to protect, control and regulate the use of Hawai'i's water resources for the benefit of its people." Article XI, section 7. Appointing Commissioners based on their residence in an area where there are pending water disputes, rather than on their experience and expertise in water management, harkens back to a pre-1978 mentality and is antithetical to the central tenet of Article XI, section 7, that water is a public trust resource and the **State** is the trustee of the water resources trust.

Finally, not only was Mr. Yamamura not the most qualified applicant, it is not at all clear that he even meets the statutory qualification. Mr. Yamamura has spent his career as an appraiser, which has nothing to do with water resource management. The only qualifications made public are his service on the Maui County Board of Water Supply, which is an advisory board that does not manage water resources and does require that its members have any particular qualifications, and his work on an appraisal of the East Maui irrigation system while on the Board of Land and Natural Resources, which also does not manage water resources. However, while it may be true, as Mr. Yamamura apparently claimed in a recent newspaper article, that water is often a critical factor in determining land values, the Hawai'i Supreme Court pointed out in its seminal *Waiāhole* decision that financial valuation of water "is inapposite to any analysis under either the police power or the public trust." 94 Hawai'i 97, 180 n.96, 9 P.3d 409, 492, n.96 (2000). While Mr. Yamamura may be an excellent appraiser, that experience simply does not qualify him to manage Hawai'i's precious water resources, particularly if his perspective on those resources is focused solely on the monetary value that water adds to land.

I am thankful that this Committee has requested a briefing on the process that has taken well over a year only to produce two unqualified nominees (one admittedly so), while allowing a seat on the Commission to remain vacant since June. While I hope that the briefing will shed light on why unquestionably qualified candidates were overlooked, I suspect it will instead confirm that this nomination was simply made with no regard whatsoever for the "level of openness, diligence, and foresight commensurate with the high priority these [public trust] rights command under the laws of our state." *Waiāhole*, 94 Hawai`i at 143, 9 P.3d at 445.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify, and please vote to **not** to confirm Mr. Yamamura.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz, Vice Chair Solomon, and Committee Members:

I write to strongly oppose the appointment of Ted Yamamura to the Commission on Water Resource Management ("Commission"). I do not know Mr. Yamamura, and my opposition to his nomination is not personal. My opposition is based on the integrity of the nomination process, the over-representation of Maui on the Commission, and the rejection of applicants who are unquestionably qualified to guide Hawai'i's water future in favor of an applicant who does not appear to have even the minimum statutory qualifications. Hawai'i's fragile water resources are simply too critical to select those who serve as trustees based purely on political considerations, without regard to expertise. Indeed, given the decline in rainfall over the past decade, and the prospect of further decline due to climate change, the role of the Commission is even more important today than it than it was a quarter of a century ago when the legislature determined that a Commissioner must have "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." HRS § 174C-7(b).

The seat Mr. Yamamura was nominated to fill has been vacant since June 30, 2011, when Commissioner Kiyosake completed her term. Anticipating the vacancy, the Commission staff began soliciting applications for her replacement in October 2010. It is far from obvious why it has taken well over a year to fill this seat, the only thing that **is** abundantly clear is that the delay was **not** caused by an extended search to find the most qualified person. Indeed, just days before Mr. Yamamura's nomination was announced, Glenn Hong, the prior nominee, stepped down after candidly admitting that he did not possess the statutory qualifications to serve on the Commission. Moreover, unlike Mr. Hong, and now Mr. Yamamura, several of the applicants not only had substantial experience and expertise in managing water resources, but also a demonstrated and long-standing commitment to preserving these resources for future generations.

Moreover, if the two pending nominees are confirmed, a majority of the Commission, i.e., four out of seven (and four out of the five appointed Commissioners), will be from Maui. The only justification that has been provided for this extreme imbalance is that there are major pending water disputes on Maui. While that is certainly the case, it is not a reason to stack the Commission with Maui residents to the exclusion

of any other Neighbor Islanders. Indeed, quite the opposite is true. The enactment of the Water Code was mandated by the 1978 amendments to the Hawai'i constitution, in which the people of Hawai'i decided that our water resources were too crucial to continue being managed strictly on a local level. Thus, the constitution was amended to provide, among other things, that "[t]he State has an obligation to protect, control and regulate the use of Hawai'i's water resources for the benefit of its people." Article XI, section 7. Appointing Commissioners based on their residence in an area where there are pending water disputes, rather than on their experience and expertise in water management, harkens back to a pre-1978 mentality and is antithetical to the central tenet of Article XI, section 7, that water is a public trust resource and the **State** is the trustee of the water resources trust.

Finally, not only was Mr. Yamamura not the most qualified applicant, it is not at all clear that he even meets the statutory qualification. Mr. Yamamura has spent his career as an appraiser, which has nothing to do with water resource management. The only qualifications made public are his service on the Maui County Board of Water Supply, which is an advisory board that does not manage water resources and does require that its members have any particular qualifications, and his work on an appraisal of the East Maui irrigation system while on the Board of Land and Natural Resources, which also does not manage water resources. However, while it may be true, as Mr. Yamamura apparently claimed in a recent newspaper article, that water is often a critical factor in determining land values, the Hawai'i Supreme Court pointed out in its seminal Waiāhole decision that financial valuation of water "is inapposite to any analysis under either the police power or the public trust." 94 Hawai'i 97, 180 n.96, 9 P.3d 409, 492, n.96 (2000). While Mr. Yamamura may be an excellent appraiser, that experience simply does not qualify him to manage Hawai'i's precious water resources, particularly if his perspective on those resources is focused solely on the monetary value that water adds to land.

I am thankful that this Committee has requested a briefing on the process that has taken well over a year only to produce two unqualified nominees (one admittedly so), while allowing a seat on the Commission to remain vacant since June. While I hope that the briefing will shed light on why unquestionably qualified candidates were overlooked, I suspect it will instead confirm that this nomination was simply made with no regard whatsoever for the "level of openness, diligence, and foresight commensurate with the high priority these [public trust] rights command under the laws of our state." *Waiāhole*, 94 Hawai'i at 143, 9 P.3d at 445.

Thank you for this opportunity to testify, and please vote to **not** to confirm Mr. Yamamura.

Aloha Chair Dela Cruz and Members of the Committee:

My name is Penny Levin, I am a restoration ecologist/planner and grow wetland taro in Waihe'e, Maui. I am also a member of the Taro Security and Purity Task Force. I am not involved in the Na Wai Eha water case, although I have followed water law to some degree since the Waiahole Water Case. I am testifying as an individual today and I am in strong opposition to GM 755, nominating Ted Yamamura to the State Water Commission.

This year's legislative session has been one that has filled many of us in the public with disgust for the blatant disregard for the process and intent of the state's laws by our legislators and the Governor. The sudden and short-noticed nomination and consideration of appointment of Mr. Yamamura to the Water Commission is no different. It represents a failure of duty by the State to uphold transparency under the law and to understand Hawai'i's Water Code and water law, as well as the important duties of its Commissioners.

The Water Commission's public trust obligations extend throughout the state. As such other islands require representation. Including the pending nominees, four of the five appointed Water Commissioners will be from the island of Maui. Perhaps if this were a electoral body, I might be happy that Maui was well-represented; however, it is not. As a Maui water user, I do not support the make up of a Commission primarily of Maui members.

Further, the Water Code mandates, the Commission is supposed to be a panel of experts with a requirement of "substantial experience in the area of water resource management." HRS § 174C-7(b).

Two nominees from past and present seats on the Maui County Board of Water Supply are before this Committee. Mr. Yamamura is senior member and vice-president for a company, ACM Appraisers that boasts "the oldest and largest real estate appraisal company on Maui."

Unfortunately, the term "land management" has come to mean "assets management" (economic value) and not stewardship for many within state government and business; a stockbroker-like way of thinking. Water management is not about managing a portfolio of "assets." Just as with land, it is and must be unequivocally about care (stewardship) if we are to have a bright future for water resources. One of the intents of the Public Trust

Doctrine established during the Waiahole Water Case was to make certain this aspect of water management was included in decision-making. This necessitates an understanding of island ecology, hydrology, concepts of carrying capacity, and traditional and customary practice and rights, as well as an upholding of water law, among Commission members.

The ability to conduct <u>land</u> appraisals is neither a fundamental, nor suitable qualification for water resources management. In fact, it runs counter to the laws purpose. In the Waiahole Water Case, the Supreme Court ruled that any financial value of water for eminent domain purposes "is inapposite to any analysis under either the police power or the public trust." Moreover, Mr. Yamamura's comment to Civil Beat (2/22/2012) that his value to the purely ministerial Maui Board of Water Supply was in recognizing that water is connected to land values indicates clearly that he does not understand the role of the Commission. The requirement of "substantial experience" is vital to ensure that the trustees of one of Hawai'i's most precious resources are qualified to serve in this expert, objective, and fiduciary role. Mr. Yamamura does not meet this basic prerequisite under Hawai'i's Water Code.

But, let us consider further whether the skills of a land appraiser may be brought to bear on water management in some useful measure? Two critical questions must be asked. First, what is the basis of knowledge for a land appraiser? And second, what is the necessary basis of knowledge for determining the true (holistic) value of land or water (the underlying premise of the Code)? The former requires study in real estate valuation, markets and real estate law which informs only decisions regarding the trading or sale of assets. The latter requires study in a broad range of subjects, including ecology and systems modeling, as well as indepth review of environmental economics and may be used to inform some aspects of long term water allocation. Both however, stem from an exercise in financial valuation, which as stated above, is an inappropriate position of analysis of public trust resources. More so, expertise in the valuation of water resources vs land resources (or the two together) is complicated further by the understanding that ground, surface and air water cycles are connected and touch every biotic (living; ie. plants, animals) and abiotic (soils, rocks etc) part of island ecology and human survival. To date, peer-reviewed literature clearly indicates that natural resource economists struggle to accurately value public trust resources because of the complex environmental services they provide and incomplete knowledge of what repercussions occur when elements in the system are diminished or go missing. If such expertise is needed to inform Commission decisions, it should be sought through outside advisory by qualified, rigorous, independent research experts or groups of experts such as UHERO at the University of Hawai'i. Mr. Yamamura does not meet these qualifications.

Additionally, because the Commission has been consistently dominated by the largest agricultural water diverters, the Code was amended in 2003 to reserve a seat for someone with "substantial experience or expertise in traditional Hawaiian water resource management techniques and in traditional Hawaiian riparian usage such as those preserved by section 174C-101." HRS § 174C-7(b). Since 2003, not one single person has been nominated or made it through the selection process of the Water Commission

who has held such first-hand expertise, despite consistent application of highly qualified practitioners of traditional Hawaiian water resource management, including in this year. No Native Hawaiian practitioners have been nominated or appointed.

The nomination of Mr. Yamamura has the appearance that the Water Code's qualifications were given insufficient consideration and that far more qualified applicants were passed over for this seat. This action also calls into question the transparency of the selection and nomination process. Despite this and many other concerns, it appears that the Committee on Water, Land and Housing may be poised to confirm Mr. Yamamura without time for a thorough consideration of his qualifications. I would ask that the Committee reschedule the confirmation hearing until after the public has had adequate opportunity to review and respond to the informational briefing scheduled just ten minutes prior to the hearing.

The management of water resources goes far beyond the valuation of land or even water connected with land. As a restoration ecologist who works with severely degraded landscapes, I can speak from experience that it is far more difficult to recover degraded natural resources than to protect and manage wisely what we still have. This is doubly true of water resources as they depend on an extended and connected array of conditions and actions, including the far reaching decisions of the Water Commission.

How we manage water resources now will seal the fate of our grandchildren's children – and these islands - for a better or worse future. As the Hawai'i Supreme Court explained, the duty of a trustee over water resources is much more than the role of a "business manager," or a mere "umpire calling balls and strikes." This trustee role is too important to be handed to political appointees lacking the necessary expertise.

Please vote to deny Mr. Yamamura's nomination.
