The Department of Transportation appreciates the intent of HB 1759; however, we would recommend that mopeds be prohibited at all times from traveling upon any bicycle path. Mopeds can travel at speeds up to 35 miles per hour. Thus, allowing the mix of mopeds in with pedestrians and bicyclists on bicycle paths will only increase the potential for events to occur that result in significant injury to pedestrians, bicyclists, and the moped operators.

Therefore, we believe that prohibiting mopeds from bicycle paths at all times will create a safer environment for the pedestrians and bicyclists using such paths.

Aloha Chair Souki, Vice Chair Ichiyama and Transportation Committee Members;

The Maui Bicycle Alliance is a grassroots bicycling advocacy organization committed to improving conditions for bicycling in Maui County. We promote bicycling and advocate bicycle use in Maui County for health, recreation, sport and transportation purposes.

I am writing on behalf of the 400+ Maui bicyclists who currently utilize the State DOT Highway's Mokulele Bikepath in Maui County. We respectfully ask for your support of this measure with the following changes:

Page 1, Line 9.

- 8 (b) No person shall drive any vehicle other than a bicycle
- 9 or moped upon a bicycle path, except upon a permanent or
- 10 authorized temporary driveway, or park any vehicle upon a
- bicycle path; provided that a moped driver shall be required to
- use a bicycle lane where available, pursuant to section
- 13 29IC—I97 (a)

Delete the words "or moped". This will allow ONLY *bicycles* and NOT *mopeds* to be used on bikepaths. Because of the potential negative interaction between mopeds and bicyclists (and pedestrians who also use these bikepaths), banning mopeds from bikepaths will help create safer conditions for ALL non motorized users of this type of facility.

This is the intent of this measure as we have been dealing with the issue of speeding mopeds on the Mokulele Bikepath since it was built in 2007.

Maui County has banned the use of mopeds on their bikepaths effective last year. This measure would also provide needed consistency between County and State bikepath facilities.

Page 3. Line 2

- 1 "(a) Wherever bicycle lanes are provided on the roadway,
- 2 moped drivers shall use such bicycle lanes[-r] and shall not use
- 3 bicycle paths. Signs clearly visible to an ordinarily observant
- 4 person indicating the prohibition shall be placed along bicycle
- 5 paths so designated and every moped driver shall obey the
- 6 directions thereof."

This section should be changed to more clearly state:

- 1 (a) Wherever bicycle lanes are provided on the roadway,

- 4 person indicating the prohibition shall be placed along bicycle
- 5 paths so designated and every moped driver shall obey the

RE: In Support of an amended HB 1759, banning mopeds from independent bike paths.

I am Dave DeLeon, representing the Maui Nutrition and Physical Fitness Coalition, in support of the proposed bill if it bans mopeds from state-owned bike paths. As someone who has spent the last 20 years working for the development of non-motorized trails in Maui County, I wholeheartedly support the proposed measure.

The purpose of facilities like Maui's state-owned Mokulele Path is to provide safe, non-motorized rights-of-way for those who want to get around by using their own power. This facility is designed to be multi-use: bikes, skaters, runners, walkers, wheelchairs. As long as everyone is moving less than 15 mph and no heavy machinery is involved, this mix is a safe mix. Introducing vehicles that can go faster than 15 mph makes these facilities unsafe. Current law allows for mopeds — motor scooters — on these paths. That is an unsafe practice. That is why the Maui County Council passed legislation banning mopeds from the County's bikepaths last year.

Public opinion surveys conducted by the State Department of Transportation showed that a large majority of Maui residents say they would only think about using their bodies to get around if they have a safe place to walk, run or ride. They naturally do not want to mix with traffic because of the risk injury or death.

I would suggest that the bill should be more general in its reference to the banned vehicles. Yes, mopeds are a problem on bike paths. But so are motorcycles. And golf carts and motorized bicycles. In my opinion the only motorized vehicles that should be exempted from this ban would be wheelchairs and emergency vehicles. A more generalized ban would also preclude new technologies that we can not now imagine. If it can go faster than 15 mph and is not powered by a human body, then it does not belong on a non-motorized bike path. Likewise, instead of the limited term "Bike Path," I would propose using the phrase Non-Motorized Trails and Bike Paths. State law should allow for these paths should be signed for "No Motorized Vehicles."

The Maui Nutrition and Physical Fitness Coalition is an alliance of Maui organizations working with the State Department of Health and UH School of Public Health to raise awareness of the epidemic of health problems caused by poor nutrition and our increasingly sedentary life style. Providing safe ways to move around our communities without using a car has been identified as a key to combating this epidemic. The proposed bill is an important step in keeping these facilities safe.

Last thought: Burn calories, not fossil fuels.

This bill is flawed because it expressly permits mopeds to be driven on bicycle paths. As a disabled person whose only means of exercise consists of regular use of bicycle paths with a recumbent tricycle, I want to assure you that motor driven mopeds should not be permitted on paths dedicated to pedestrians, bicyclists, skaters, strollers, and wheelchairs. The combination is both dangerous and disruptive. Furthermore, moped drivers are unlicensed and uninsured. So when the inevitable occurs and they hurt someone on a bicycle path, they are not likely to be financially responsible for the harm they cause.

RELATING TO TRAFFIC SAFETY

The purposes of this measure are: (1) to prohibit motor vehicles from driving and parking in designated bike lanes and bike paths; and (2) to limit the use of bike paths by moped users when a bike lane is available.

The use of bicycles as a mode of transportation is increasing as bikeway infrastructure improves and fuel prices lessen the feasibility of driving motor vehicles. I support this bill because precautions are necessary to protect and promote safety as bicycle use becomes more prevalent.

However, the language of the bill as it currently reads allows for the use of mopeds on bike paths. I feel that bike paths should be designated for the exclusive use of bicycles. Subsection 291C-1, Hawaii Revised Statues (HRS) defines a bike path to be "any facility set aside for the preferential or exclusive use of bicycles and physically separated from a highway." The use of mopeds on roadways is already allowed and regulated under subsection 291C-196, HRS.

Mopeds, as motor vehicles, are completely capable of utilizing highways and bike routes on highways, and do not require the use of bike paths. Seeing as how bike paths are separate and independent from a highway, and the only type of bikeway not directly impacted by motor vehicle traffic, I believe that bike paths should be kept clear of unnecessary moped traffic.

Therefore, I am proposing that the follow amendments be made to HB 1759 for the purpose of restricting the use of mopeds on bike paths.

Amendment 1: HB 1759, page 1, lines 8-13

- 8 (b) No person shall drive any vehicle other than a bicycle
- 9 [or moped] upon a bicycle path, except upon a permanent or
- 10 authorized temporary driveway, or park any vehicle upon a
- 11 bicycle path; provided that a moped driver shall be required to
- 12 <u>use a bicycle lane where available; pursuant to section</u>
- 13 291C-197 (a).

The language "or moped" should be removed. This amendment will only allow bicycles and not mopeds to be used on bike paths. This change will provide consistency between State law and the current County of Maui ordinance banning mopeds on bike paths.

Amendment 2: HB 1759, page 3, lines 1 - 6

- 1 "(a) Wherever bicycle lanes are provided on the roadway
- 2 Moped drivers shall use such bicycle lanes[-]. Mopeds[and] shall not use
- 3 bicycle paths. Signs clearly visible to an ordinarily observant
- 4 person indicating the prohibition shall be placed along bicycle
- 5 paths so designated and every moped driver shall obey the
- 6 directions thereof."

In Maui County, there are no bike paths located adjacent to bike lanes. This amendment will establish clear restrictions for the use of mopeds on bike paths.

Thank you for the opportunity to testify in support this important measure. The purpose of this measure is to prohibit moped drivers from using bicycle paths wherever bicycle lanes are provided.

This measure is in the Maui County's Legislative Package; therefore, I offer this testimony on behalf of the Maui County Council.

The County Council supports this measure for the following reasons:

- 1. Section 291C-197(a), Hawaii Revised Statutes ("HRS"), currently requires moped drivers to use bicycle lanes wherever they are provided on the roadway. HRS Section 291C-123(a) allows moped drivers to use bicycle lanes or bicycle paths, with certain exceptions, but does not specifically address the circumstance where both a bicycle lane and a bicycle path are provided.
- 2. A bicycle path, in contrast to a bicycle lane, is physically separate from the roadway. A bicycle path is primarily intended to provide a safe venue for pedestrians and bicyclists. Thus, when moped users have the option of using a bicycle lane, they should be required to do so, leaving the bicycle path free for the exclusive use of pedestrians and bicyclists.
- 3. The Maui County Department of Police has indicated it is unclear whether officers have the authority to cite moped drivers using bicycle paths when bicycle lanes are available. Enactment of State legislation prohibiting moped drivers from using bicycle paths wherever bicycle lanes are provided will supply needed clarification. This will also enhance the safety and welfare of pedestrians and bicyclists on bicycle paths by preventing potentially hazardous interactions between mopeds and such users. Moped users will be able to continue to use bicycle paths where bicycle lanes are not an option.

For the foregoing reasons, the Maui County Council supports this measure.

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
