RELATING TO COFFEE

House Bill No. 1827 imposes a one cent fee on each pound of green coffee beans grown in or imported into the State to be deposited into a special fund to control and eradicate the coffee borer beetle and creates a coffee borer beetle control special fund to administer the program.

While the Department of Budget and Finance does not take any position on the policy of government charging a fee on import or production to support pest eradication efforts, the Department must point out concerns with the concept as it applies to House Bill No. 1827. As a matter of general policy, the department does not support the creation of special funds which do not meet the requirements of Section 37-52.3, Hawaii Revised Statutes. Special or revolving funds should:

1) reflect a clear nexus between the benefits sought and charges made upon the users or beneficiaries of the program; 2) provide an appropriate means of financing for the program or activity; and 3) demonstrate the capacity to be financially self-sustaining. In regards to House Bill No. 1827, it is difficult to determine whether the fund will be self-sustaining.

INTRODUCED BY: Say by request

BRIEF SUMMARY: Adds a new part to HRS chapter 150A to provide for the imposition of a fee of 1 cent on each pound of green coffee beans: (1) processed in the state provided the fee shall be paid by the person who owns the green coffee beans after the processing from Hawaii-grown coffee cherries and shall be due at the time the beans are sold or roasted; or (2) imported into the state provided that the green coffee beans are sold or roasted in the state. The fee shall be paid only once on each pound of green coffee beans provided that: (1) if the green coffee beans are grown in the state before being roasted in the state, the fee shall be paid by the person who sells the green coffee beans; or (2) if the green coffee beans are not sold in the state before being roasted in the state, the fee shall be paid by the person who roasts the green coffee beans.

Establishes a coffee borer beetle control special fund into which shall be deposited: (1) revenues from the coffee borer control fee; (2) legislative appropriations; (3) federal funds identified for deposit into the special fund; (4) donations for the control or eradication of the coffee borer beetle; (5) interest earned on moneys in the special fund; and (6) other moneys made available to the special fund or to control or eradicate the coffee borer beetle.

The special fund may be used for programs and projects to eradicate the coffee borer beetle in the state, including destruction of feral coffee plants; provided that, if the fund receives revenues in excess of \$180,000 during a fiscal year, the excess may be expended for: (1) research and development programs and projects to control or eradicate the coffee borer beetle; (2) programs to inspect and treat coffee cherries or beans for the purpose of controlling or eradicating the coffee borer beetle or preventing the spread of the coffee borer beetle within the state; and (3) other programs and projects for the control or eradication of the coffee borer beetle. Establishes provisions relating to the administration of the fund, penalty provisions, and directs the department of agriculture to adopt rules, procedures, and forms to implement the fee on October 1, 2012. The special fund shall terminate on June 30, 2018 and any remaining balances in the fund will be transferred to the general fund on July 1, 2018.

Appropriates \$90,000 out of the coffee borer control special fund for fiscal 2013 for the control or eradication of coffee borer beetles.

Adds a new chapter to the law to relating to coffee pests and diseases to establish provisions to eradicate and control pests and infections on coffee trees.

HRS sections 36-27 and 36-30 shall be reenacted in the form in which they read on September 30, 2012; provided further that the amendments made to HRS sections 36-27 and 36-30 by this act shall not be repealed when those sections are reenacted on July 1, 2015, by Act 79, SLH 2009.

EFFECTIVE DATE: Upon approval

STAFF COMMENTS: This measure proposes to impose a fee of 1 cent on each pound of green coffee beans grown in or imported into the state. It also establishes the coffee borer beetle control special fund and provisions that delineate the eradication, control and infection on coffee beans.

While the fee is deposited into the coffee borer beetle control special fund, it represents yet another "tax" to fund a special fund program as opposed to using general funds to fund such a program. Thus, in one sense, attacking this problem with a fee is an indication that this is not a problem of high priority so as to garner general fund financing. It is also a way for lawmakers to avoid being held accountable for growing government even larger and allowing government to grow beyond its means and the ability of the taxpayer to afford government in Hawaii. The marked propensity of the legislature to resort to user fees for programs that are of a general benefit and should be funded with general funds is an indication that this program is not of a high priority to most lawmakers.

It should be noted that while the fee will expand the use of non-general fund financing for this program, if the legislature deems this program of great importance, the program should be funded with general funds rather than buried in the gamut of special funds out of view of the general public.

Rather than using special funds, this program should be funded by the general fund appropriation process so lawmakers can evaluate the needs of the program and give it the resources the program needs to carry out its mission and objectives, which will never happen if special fund financing is utilized such as proposed by this measure.

TESTIMONY OF DAVID S. CASE ON BEHALF OF KONA COFFEE FARMERS ASSOCIATION (KCFA) ON HB 1827 (RELATING TO COFFEE) BEFORE THE HAWAIIAN HOUSE AGRICULTURE COMMITTEE FEBRUARY 3, 2012 AT 8 IS

CHAIRMAN TSUJI AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE

KCFA HAS OVER 325 MEMBERS, REPRESENTING MORE THAN 200 GENARALLY SMALL FARMS IN THE HISTORC KONA COFFEE DISTRICT OF WEST HAWAII. KCFA OPPOSES HB 1827. It is poorly written and manages to do both too little and too much badly. We hope your committee will at least deferr action until the following issues can be adequately addressed.

A. BACKGROUND

THERE IS NO QUESTION THAT CBB IS A DIRE EMERGENCY, SO THE MONEY RAISED BY THE BILL SHOULD AS LEAST APPROACH WHAT IS NEEDED TO DEAL WITH THE PROBLEM. HB 1827 SIMPLY DOESN'T GO FAR ENOUGH TO RAISE ENOUGH REVENUE TO BEGIN TO DEAL WITH THE PROBLEM. THE REVENUE THAT IS RAISED SHOULD ALSO BE USED TO TRULY MITIGATE THE PROBLEM ON THE BIG ISLAND WHERE IT EXISTS, RATHER THEN FUND "FUMIGATION" EFFORTS AFTER PROCESSING COFFEE TO GREEN. THE TAX SHOULD ALSO BE COLLECTED IN A MORE REALISTIC MANNER, RATHER THAN AS PROPOSED IN THE BILL. FINALLY HB 1827 (IN SECTION 7) IMPOSES A TRULY DRACONIAN "SOUTION" THAT IS NOT WELL DEFINED AND HAS THE POTENTIAL OF DRASTIC CONSEQUENCES FOR THE KONA SMALL FARM COFFEE ECONOMY.

B. DISCUSSION

- (1) THE TAX SHOULD BE AT LEAST 10 CENTS PER POUND IN ORDER TO RAISE ENOUGH MONEY TO DEAL WITH THE CBB ISSUE. ONE CENT WILL ONLY RAISE ABOUT \$150,000. TEN CENTS WOULD RAISE ABOUT \$1.5 MILLION.
- (2) COLLECTING THE TAX ON "COFFEE GROWN IN HAWAII" WILL BE CUMBERSOME AT BEST. IT SHOULD BE COLLECTED ON ALL GREEN COFFEE AT THE TIME OF HDOA INSPECTION. THE TAX SHOULD BE COLLECTED ON IMPORTED GREEN COFFEE ALSO AT THE TIME OF HDOA CERTIFICATION. THE BILL IS NOT CLEAR ON THIS POINT.
- (3) THE FUNDS RAISED FROM THE TAX SHOULD BE DEDICATED TO CBB <u>MITIGATION</u> IN CONSULTATION WITH THE FARMERS IN THE AFFECTED AREA. AS WRITTEN WE ARE CONCERNED THAT THE MONEY IS GOING TO BE SIPHONED OFF TO THE BIG

BLENDERS AND LARGE PRODUCERS ON OTHER ISLANDS TO FUMIGATE COFFEE RATHER THAN TO TRY TO REDUCE THE EFFECT OF CBB ON THE MOST AFFECTED SMALL FARMS ON THE BIG ISLAND.

(4) KCFA HAS GREAT CONCERNS ABOUT SECTION 7 ("COFFEE PESTS AND DISEASES"). IT GRANTS POWER TO HDOA TO INVADE AN "INFESTED" FARM, CONFISCATE COFFEE AND EVEN CUT DOWN THE COFFEE TREES THEN PUT A LIEN ON THE FARM AND FORECLOSE ON THE LIEN FOR THE COST OF HDOA'S ACTIONS. IT IS NOT CLEAR WHAT WILL BE CONSIDERED "INFESTED" AND IT SEEMS LIKE A DRACONIAN "SHOOT FIRST AND ASK QUESTIONS LATER" POLICY. AT LEAST THIS PROVISION NEEDS TO BE REVISED TO LESSEN THE POTENTIAL FOR ABUSE. AS WRITTEN IT COULD DRASTICALLY AFFECT SMALL FARMERS THE MOST-- AS WELL AS THE BISHOP ESTATE TRUST, THAT LEASES AND OVERSEES MUCH OF THE COFFEE PRODUCTION ON SMALL FARMS IN KONA.

C. CONCLUSION

THANK YOU, MR. CHAIRMAN AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE. KCFA REQUESTS THAT THE COMMITTEE DEFER ACTION ON THIS BILL UNTIL THESE ISSUES CAN BE ADDRESSED.
