

Promoting Lifelong Health and Wellness

The additional general funds requested of \$500,000 for the Family Health Services Division (FHSD) are to support the Governor's initiative to develop a program for early childhood (0-5) obesity and diabetes prevention. Child obesity is one of the health issues FHSD tracks, although currently most of this focus is on Women, Infant and Children (WIC) clients. These additional funds will allow the Department of Health to expand the scope of the program development for child obesity prevention to extend beyond the WIC population to include other at-risk groups not currently receiving the needed attention because of lack of resources.

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9 The additional general funds requested of \$1.4 million for the Executive Office on Aging (EOA) are to support the development of Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs). ADRCs provide a single, coordinated system of information and access for all persons seeking long-term care support which minimizes confusion, enhances individual choice and supports informed decision-making. ADRCs also improve the ability of State and county governments to manage resources and monitor program quality through centralized data collection and services.

The Department of Health remains cognizant that the State is still recovering financially and its budget reflects a conscious effort to effectively manage program resources to continue deliver quality health related services to the public.

SUBJECT: Grant and Subsidy Applications for Fiscal Year 2013

In response to your memorandum dated February 21, 2012, requesting the department to review grant-in-aid applications from the Hawaii Agricultural Foundation and the Pacific Gateway Center, we offer the following comments:

Hawaii Agricultural Foundation (Log No. 29-O)

Request is for \$484,000 in FY 13 for a public education campaign that makes "Buy Local" a priority for Hawaii consumers. The department supports the intent of the grant-in-aid as their objectives are consistent with the Hawaii State Constitution to promote diversified agriculture and to increase agricultural self-sufficiency. A strong and competitive agricultural sector in Hawaii is good public policy since it satisfies the goal of a diversified state economy and strengthens the State's efforts towards self-sufficiency, food security and sustainability. Any effort to support the continuing growth of local agriculture serves a greater public purpose. However, there seems to be a degree of duplication in the services proposed in the grant application and programs/services offered by the Department of Agriculture. The Department's "Buy Local, It Matters" campaign targets a similar demographic and the Department is currently funding Farm to School programs as well as Kapiolani Community College Applied Nutrition Education projects.

Pacific Gateway Center (Log No. 75-0)

Application is for \$466,300 grant-in-aid to acquire farmland, build infrastructure for aquaculture and hydroponics, and to train farmers. The proposed project would primarily serve disadvantaged farmers and farm workers who are interested in beginning farms.

We believe consumers will benefit from being able to purchase more fresh local produce if the grant successfully trains new farmers and provides technical assistance on land designated for aquaculture and hydroponics systems. The potential for food security and sustainability with respect to local food production increases whenever new farmers can be recruited and educated.

HB 2012: Relating to the State Budget

Thank you for this opportunity to testify in support of HB 2012, relating to the state budget.

Annual state funding for Bishop Museum in its role as the State's Museum of Natural and Cultural history is critically important to the ongoing operation of the Museum. We have been in close contact with legislators and administration representatives who have considered alternate funding mechanisms, but at this point it remains essential to have the legislature's support for the Museum.

Funding directly supports Bishop Museum's vital role in preserving Hawaii's cultural and biological collections and resources while educating residents and visitors to the Islands of Hawaii's history.

Currently, the efficacy with which Bishop Museum fulfills its charge as the State of Hawai'i's Museum of Natural and Cultural History is compromised by the economic challenges of our times. The loss of federal earmarks has severely compounded an already difficult situation. Funding in the state budget will contribute to ensuring Bishop Museum can fulfill its charge in caring for the valuable, historic, irreplaceable cultural treasurers in its collections.

Bishop Museum was founded in 1889 by Charles Reed Bishop in honor of his late wife, Princess Bernice Pauahi Bishop, the last descendent of the royal Kamehameha family. Bishop Museum is designated the State Museum of Cultural and Natural History and is a non-profit organization with the mission to engage people in the presentation, exploration and preservation of Hawaii's cultural heritage and natural history.

Good morning Chair Oshiro, Vice-Chair Lee, and members of the House Committee on Finance. As a statewide coalition of domestic violence service providers, our mission is to engage communities and organizations to end domestic violence through education, advocacy, and action for social justice.

On behalf of our member agencies, we submit this testimony in support of HB2012, specifically in support of the Department of Human Services' request for \$1.5 million additional funds for domestic violence shelter and support.

The nine emergency shelters statewide and domestic violence programs continue to see an increased demand for their services while funding has decreased. On one day in 2011, domestic violence shelters and programs served 485 victims across Hawaii. Unfortunately, on the very same day, programs reported a critical shortage of funds and staff that kept them from assisting 23 victims in need of services. When fewer community resources are available, victims become more isolated, risking their safety and recovery. Funding shortages have created greater and greater vulnerabilities in the network of services survivors need for their safety, escape, and self-sufficiency.

The DHS has recognized the dire need of providing domestic violence survivors protection and services so that they are safe, supported and self-sufficient. We respectfully request that the committee include DHS' request for \$1.5 additional funds for domestic violence shelter and support in HB2012.

Aloha Chair Oshiro, Vice Chair Lee and members of the House Committee on Finance:

I am writing today to STRONGLY support HB 2012, which in part, increases funding for domestic violence emergency shelters, including Women Helping Women shelter on Maui. Our State shelter funding was cut by nearly 50% last year, forcing us to lay off staff and operate our emergency shelter with only one staff on duty many days and most shifts. Shelters statewide were seriously affected and have struggled to keep our doors open this year. During this same time period we have sheltered record numbers of women and children in our shelter and thankfully have been able to maintain their safety and meet their basic needs. However, services including transportation to important appointments and meetings have been stopped because we simply do not have enough staff to make that happen.

Imagine if you will that you are working alone with 29 women and children who are fleeing for their safety and you are the lone person responsible to keep them safe (thank goodness for our security system). In addition to this you are also responsible for answering the 24 hour hotline that answers nearly 2,000 crisis calls each year. You can imagine we are quite busy every day, evening and overnight.

Women Helping Women is extremely grateful to DHS Director Pat McManaman for seeing our distress and taking action to create additional funds to help the 9 shelters statewide. We recognize that these are tough times and we know that it was very difficult to "find" additional funding, but we truly need these funds to provide life-saving emergency domestic violence shelter to women and children.

On behalf of the Community School Administrators and adult learners of past and present, I would like to express our support in favor of H.B. 2012, relating to the State Budget. The Community School for Adults offers many educational services to adults in an effort to improve their personal well-being and employment opportunities, which in turn, allows them to contribute positively to the communities in which they reside.

Under the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS) 302A-433 identifies four core functions of the adult community education program, they are:

- 1) Basic elementary education
- 2) Advanced elementary education
- 3) Secondary education
- 4) Adult literacy.

These core functions are provided through academic programs such as the English as a Second Language (ESL) program; Adult Basic Education (ABE); and Adult Secondary Education (ASE), which includes two diploma-track programs – the Competency-Based High School Diploma Program (CBHSDP) and the GED preparation program. In addition to these programs, the Community Schools provide additional value-added services to the Department of Education such as the Substitute Teacher Certification and Recertification courses, PRAXIS preparation courses for teachers who are not highly qualified, credit-recovery courses for high school students, and test-preparation courses for students who plan to take the SAT, COMPASS, or ASVAB tests.

In consideration of H.B. 2012 RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET.

The HHFDC *supports Governor Abercrombie's Executive Supplemental Budget request,* which includes Capital Improvement Project (CIP) appropriations to address the shortage of affordable housing statewide. HHFDC's CIP requests are as follows:

<u>Rental Housing Trust Fund Infusion, Statewide</u> FY2013 \$5,000,000 (C) (*in addition to the existing* \$5,000,000 appropriation for FY2013 provided in Act 164, Session Laws of Hawaii 2011).

The additional funds will be leveraged with other funding sources to finance affordable housing development to respond to the high demand of affordable rentals statewide. While \$15,000,000 has been appropriated for FY12 and FY13, without an additional infusion of funds, the HHFDC will be limited in the funding of new affordable rental housing project applicants in the FY2012 and FY2013 competitive funding rounds. Rental Housing Trust Fund demand remains high. HHFDC received 9 applications requesting a total of \$37,224,388 from the Trust Fund to assist in the development or preservation of affordable rental projects located on Oahu, Hilo and Kona on February 29, 2012.

Dwelling Unit Revolving Fund Infusion, Statewide FY2013 \$10,000,000 (C)


An infusion is needed to meet the demand for interim and permanent financing needed to partner with private developers and other government agencies to produce affordable housing statewide. HHFDC anticipates the following imminent affordable development housing activities: \$16,103,000 interim construction loan for the Halekauwila Place affordable rentals project and \$25,000,000 bridge loan for Hale Mohalu II affordable rental project.

We applaud the House for advancing funding for the Broadband Initiative, which includes \$1.5 million for planning for transpacific cable landing sites. We view the creation of a high speed broadband network between the islands as a crucial foundation for economic development, opportunities and prosperity in the context of this 21st Century.

We also applaud your support for giving Hawaii Businesses more foreign trade opportunities – and for the many housing development initiatives that are crucial to restoration of construction jobs.

In our creative industries, we appreciate the consistent level of funding and for recognizing that the CIP request for the Hawaii Film Studio complex will provide necessary repairs, maintenance and refurbishing to support our growing film and television industry.

Any additional work will need to be at least partially outsourced by qualified parties.

TESTIMONY IN SUPPORT OF HB 2012: RELATING TO THE STATE BUDGET

TO THE HONORABLE MARCUS R. OSHIRO, CHAIR; THE HONORABLE MARILYN B. LEE, VICE CHAIR; AND MEMBERS OF THE COMMITTEE ON FINANCE:

I, John Vannatta, Principal of Waipahu Community School for Adults, am testifying on behalf of my school in support of the appropriation for the Adult and Community Education Program stated in HB 2012. We believe appropriations made by the legislature for the adult and community education program is vital for the survival of the community schools in Hawai'i. The appropriation will allow the community schools to continue to service our communities.

As you are well aware, the Hawai'i Department of Education (HIDOE) is currently facing budget cuts and has not allocated any funds towards the community schools. We believe it is vital that we continue to provide adult and community education throughout the State of Hawai'i to continue to service the people of our community within our communities. The community schools are accredited schools that service a large population of students statewide. During the 2010-11 school year, the community schools serviced 9,055 students in their academic programs; 1,535 students were enrolled in Waipahu Community School. The community schools have helped community members earn a high school diploma in an effort to better their job opportunities and help them become eligible for college and the military. For the 2010-11 school year, 2,035 students received a high school diploma from the community schools; 539 of these students received their diploma from Waipahu Community School. The community schools have also provided classes to help community members improve their English Language skills and, through special interest offerings, improve their job-readiness skills. All services are provided within the community to remain as accessible as possible for our students and within a reasonable cost so that students from all economic backgrounds are able to access the services provided. We would like for the community schools to continue to provide these services within our communities; however, with a lack of state funds, the services provided will no longer be accessible to all members of the communities. To remain in existence without appropriations by the legislature, the adult and community education program will need to be restructured by closing sites, reducing services, and increasing fees and tuition, which will all, in turn, reduce the accessibility of the program for our students, physically and financially.

Restructuring the adult and community education program would deprive many of our communities of an alternative education that many community members have depended on.

In addition to providing adult and community education throughout the State, the community schools also provide value-added services to HIDOE. These services include substitute teacher certification and recertification courses, PRAXIS preparation courses for teachers who are not highly qualified or are currently in a teacher preparation program, credit-recovery courses for high school students, and test-preparation courses for students who plan to enroll in college or enlist in the military.

In addition to serving the DOE, the community schools serve a number of community organizations and state departments. We provide educational services for the National Guard Youth Challenge Program, the Honolulu Community Action Program, Goodwill Industries, Kamehameha Schools, Big Brothers/Big Sisters, Alu Like, Hale Kipa, Catholic Charities at Maililand, the Native Nations Education Foundation Pane'e Mua Program, businesses such as Monsanto and Pioneer Hybrid Seed Company, the Department of Vocational Rehabilitation, the Department of Human Services (DHS) First-to-Work program, and the Department of Public Safety at a number of correctional facilities. We support the efforts of DHS to help citizens become self-sufficient, the Hawaii Teacher Standards Board and the University of Hawaii to ensure teachers are highly qualified, the Department of Labor and Industrial Relation to decrease unemployment, and the Office of Hawaiian Affairs to improve the quality of life for people of Hawaiian ancestry (We currently serve approximately 2400 students of Hawaiian ancestry). We also assist the State's P-20 effort to increase the number of working adults achieving at least a two-year college degree by increasing student access to college through college preparatory courses, college and career counseling, and events that expose students to the postsecondary options available to them. Thus, the community schools are highly active in helping adults become college- and career-ready to better their station in life.

Without State general funds, the community schools and the adult education program may also lose federal funds. Thus, appropriations by the legislature is essential in meeting the Maintenance of Effort (MOE) threshold required to maintain the funds the community schools currently receive through the Adult Education Family Literacy Act (AEFLA) grant. The United States Department of Education (USDOE) determines the MOE threshold by looking at the total dollar amount of state funding and the per-student amount of state funding allocated to the adult education program in relation to the amount allocated through the grant. The community schools rely on the AEFLA grant to fund their courses (instructors, materials, resources).

HB 2012 appropriates funds that are necessary to ensure the continued existence of the community schools and the adult and community education program in Hawai'i. I have been a part of Waipahu Community School for Adults for 17 years (4 years as principal) and have seen firsthand the positive impact we have had on our students and our communities. Closing the community schools and drastically decreasing the adult and community education services provided would have a negative impact on all communities within the State of Hawai'i, which could result in an increase in need for social services. The community schools help students understand how to fulfill their basic needs in society and how to become positively contributing citizens. Thus, the community schools not only provide adults with basic education, they also provide adults with the means to better their station in life.

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to testify in support of HB 2012 and thank you for your continued support for the community schools and the adult and community education program. The appropriations made by the legislature will ensure the continuation of the adult and community education program in Hawai'i and will allow our community schools to continue to service our communities.
