# Re: HB 2023 - Relating to the Center for Nursing

The Workforce Development Council ("WDC") <u>strongly supports</u> the amendment to make permanent the assessment and deposit of the UH Center for Nursing fees into the compliance resolution fund and distribution of those funds to the credit of the UH Center for Nursing special fund. This legislation is greatly needed to continue addressing workforce issues related to nursing.

The WDC is an attached agency to the DLIR and is responsible for advising the Governor and Legislature on workforce development to support economic development and employment opportunities for all. The WDC is also the State Workforce Investment Board for purposes of the federal Workforce Investment Act ("WIA") of 1998. The WDC assists the Governor in developing and updating comprehensive five-year strategic workforce investment plans and oversees workforce (public) investment activities in the state.

In response to Governor Neil Abercrombie's New Day Plan goal to develop and implement a comprehensive strategy to address Hawaii's aging population and ever increasing healthcare needs, the WDC has recently completed a Healthcare Workforce Development Plan and Report published in December 2011, which documents Hawaii's severe healthcare workforce shortages. Without support of legislation like this, the WDC anticipates significant labor shortages for skilled nurses, especially on the neighbor islands and rural areas, which will have an estimated statewide shortfall of primary care professionals of 20% by the year 2020. Registered nurses rank in the top ten (10) High Demand Occupations across all industries and is number one (1) for needed occupation for the healthcare industry. The funding to the Center for Nursing will assist in addressing major issues such as new nurses not having the skills required for success or employment.

Some of the center's plans have proven especially helpful in developing a healthy nursing workforce. For instance, the center's focus on removing scope of practice barriers has provided industry-driven recommendations that will increase the workforce of skilled nurses. The center's implementation of the Nurse Residency Program has been monumental in improving the quality of new nurses entering the workforce to better meet the needs of employers. The center's focus on increasing the number of nurses with Baccalaureate and Doctorate degrees has also brought this need to the attention of educators statewide who have often focused on graduating Associate degree level nurses, which in turn is producing an abundance of low-skilled workers who are displacing lower level healthcare professionals and earning lower than their expected pay grade. Additionally, the center's nursing surveys have proven immensely valuable when calculating future workforce needs, and have become an example of how future workforce surveys should be implemented to track the workforce gaps of other high needs healthcare professionals.

Overall, the WDC supports the amendment to make permanent the assessment and deposit of the UH Center for Nursing fees into the compliance resolution fund and distribution of those funds to the credit of the UH Center for Nursing special fund in order to continue the excellent work of the UH Center for Nursing which has become the standard of what the future of healthcare workforce development in Hawaii should reflect.



Thank you for this opportunity to provide testimony regarding HB 2023 which amends Act 198, Session Laws of Hawaii 2003, as amended by section 2 of Act 173, Sessions Laws of Hawaii 2008.

This amendment will make permanent the specific charge on new and renewing RN and LPN licenses to fund the work of the Center in meeting its mission to address nursing workforce issues. The Center's major functions are:

- 1. Collect and analyze nursing workforce data
- 2. Conduct research on best practices and quality outcomes
- 3. Develop a plan for implementing strategies to recruit and retain nurses
- Research analyze and report data related to the retention of the nursing workforce

Since becoming operational in April, 2005, the work of the Center for Nursing has benefited a diverse number of nurses inclusive of those at the bedside, in management, educators and advanced practice nurses by their involvement in projects such as leadership training, evidence based practice, preceptor training, Partners in Nursing Conference, and access to data collected on supply and nursing programs, The Center also impacts nurses, policy makers and the wider healthcare community through its functions as a catalyst, innovator and resource. The Center leads the way in the following areas:

 Partnering with nurses from throughout the state along with business, philanthropy and government to generate collaborative solutions on workforce and quality issues

- Engaging and involving nurses from all islands and all sectors of healthcare in guiding the work of the Center
- Providing Hawai'i specific data on the nursing
- Focusing on expanding educational capacity which has increased by 30%, owing to the support and resource allocation from the Legislature
- Establishing innovative programs to improve and support retention of nurses in both acute and long term care (leadership training programs for acute care and preceptor development in long term care)
- Obtaining external grant funding to support additional initiatives (Robert Wood Johnson Partners in Nursing grant with HMSA Foundation, \$375,000; HRSA to Support the Retention of Associate Nursing Students on the Neighbor Island \$900,000; HMSA Foundation funds to extend the Partners in Nursing project to the neighbor islands, \$100,000)
- Providing small grants to maximize local and regional solutions in quality of care, education and workforce issues

In light of ongoing nursing issues in the state and the nation, it is imperative that the Center for Nursing continue its work to support nurses who are generating Hawai'i specific solutions. Nurses working in partnership can build a strong nursing workforce for the future. The passage of HB 2023 will permit the valuable and beneficial work of the Center to continue.
