RELATING TO THE ISSUANCE OF SPECIAL PURPOSE REVENUE BONDS FOR LE JARDIN ACADEMY

House Bill No. 2816 authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds to assist the Le Jardin Academy, a private not-for-profit elementary and secondary school, in financing and refinancing the construction, improvement and equipping of its educational facilities pursuant to Part VIII, Chapter 39A, Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

The Department has a technical comment on this bill. Under Section 39A-257, HRS, bonds may be issued for a single project, multiple projects, a single-project party, or multiple-project parties pursuant to the authority of one, or the combined authority of more than one, separate act of the legislature. We recommend adding the following section to the bill to allow Le Jardin Academy additional flexibility to take advantage of economies of scale achievable by consolidating small bond issues into a single large transaction with potential multiple-project parties as provided under Section 39A-257, HRS:

SECTION . The special purpose revenue bonds issued under this Act may be issued in one or more series for a single project, multiple projects, a single-project party, or multiple-project parties pursuant to the authority of this Act or the combined authority of this Act and any one or more other separate acts of the legislature

pursuant to the part VIII, chapter 39A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and the department of budget and finance may combine into a single issue of special purpose revenue bonds, in one more series, two or more proposed issues of special purpose revenue bonds to be issued pursuant to part VIII, chapter 39A, Hawaii Revised Statutes, separately authorized, in the total amount not to exceed the aggregate of the proposed separate issues of special purpose revenue bonds.

My name is Robert Witt, executive director of the Hawaii Association of Independent Schools (HAIS), which represents 99 private and independent schools in Hawaii and educates over 33,000 students statewide.

HAIS is in strong support of this measure, introduced by one of our member schools, Le Jardin Academy. HB 2816 authorizes the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds for Le Jardin Academy for the construction, improvement, and equipping of its educational facilities.

The legislature deemed, and voters reinforced, that the issuance of special purpose revenue bonds to private schools is in the public interest. Private schools in Hawaii serve everyday families from all walks of life. Many of our students are the beneficiaries of robust financial aid programs that defray the cost of tuition and more importantly, broaden our reach. We have serious issues, KC's school's bathroom next to the cafeteria >seems to be always closed because the UPW told the school that they cannot assign a public worker > there to open the bathroom because of the " furlough ". In addition, this particular bathroom and others had > no toilet paper and no soap to wash student's hands. One last thing, KC also mentioned these bathroom's doors > were not secured, meant you literarily have to hold those bathroom doors while peeing because the locks were broke.

>Here's what I did, I spoke to KC's school Assistant Principal and mentioned this bathroom issue.

>Just so you know, both Kapolei Middle and Kapolei High School have the same issue of bathrooms next to cafeteria > must be closed instructed by the UPW.

> I hope they will fix it within a week.... I hope so.

Debra Bringman: We have to do something about the repair and maintenace of our public schools before using precious Hawaii state taxpayer funds to fund schools that most of us can't afford to send our kids to. That would be in the best interest, heatlh, safety, and welfare of the general public.
