The Department of Transportation (DOT) supports the intent of this bill to establish a preference for iron, steel, and manufactured goods produced in the United States.

However, this bill is not necessary for the DOT because:

- The DOT already applies the federal Buy America provisions for steel and iron materials prescribed under 23 CFR Subpart 635.410 and 49 CFR 661, for all federal-aid projects. Current DOT federal-aid projects penalize bidders by 25% of the total bid when not in compliance with the federal Buy America provisions.
- The DOT also uses Hawaii Products Preference provisions for Statefunded projects.

The DOT also has concerns about the delays that provisions in this bill will add to the current project development process. In projects utilizing concrete, Hawaii concrete manufacturers use foreign-made cement and have those cement products in stock. The proposed process for waiver of the bill's Buy American requirements would add many months to our existing process to bid our projects. These proposed waiver requirements include publication, and a lengthy comment, evaluation, and notice of finding period.

Subject: Senate Bill No. 2201, Relating to Public Works

The Department of Design and Construction (DDC) respectfully opposes SB2201. The bill proposes to require that contracts "...for the construction, reconstruction, alteration, repair, improvement, or maintenance of a public building or public work entered into by a public agency shall contain a provision that the iron, steel, and manufactured goods used or supplied in the performance of the contract or any subcontract thereto shall be manufactured in the United States."

DDC strongly supports the apparent intent of the bill, which is to increase demand for specific American-made products and thus to provide economic stimulus to those sectors of the American economy. However, implementation of this bill would conflict with the City's goal of executing its many capital improvement projects as expeditiously and efficiently as possible, thus providing the greatest value for taxpayer dollars.

The proposed requirement would negatively impact the City's capital improvement projects by increasing project costs, paperwork requirements, and the duration of time required to execute projects. The City employs numerous processes, including project specifications, shop drawing review, and construction inspection, to ensure quality products are used on City construction projects. American-made products often provide the best value in terms of quality and availability, but this is not true in all instances.

Although section ___-3(b) of the bill provides for a waiver of the requirement under specific conditions, the process of obtaining the waiver will significantly increase the time and associated staff costs required to procure construction contracts for City projects. Specifically, publishing a public notice and justification for the waiver, providing 15-day public comment period, and considering all comments, will be detrimental to timely and efficient procurement of City construction projects.

For these reasons DDC respectfully **opposes** SB 2201.

STATEMENT OF THE ILWU LOCAL 142 ON S.B. 2201 RELATING TO PUBLIC WORKS

The ILWU Local 142 supports S.B. 2201, which establishes a preference for the use of American iron, steel, and manufactured goods in the construction, alteration, or repair of public works.

The steel industry in the U.S. has suffered from a proliferation of imports from other countries. Lower cost is usually the reason for the shift towards imports. However, the lowest cost does not necessarily mean the best quality or the best investment. Low-cost products from foreign countries may be the result of exploitation due to lower wage, labor, safety, and environmental standards--certainly not what we should support.

Public works projects using taxpayer dollars must be concerned not only about cost but about quality and the bigger picture. If Hawaii's public works projects use American-made materials, Hawaii will be supporting American industry and the American economy.

While the State's purchase and use of steel manufactured in the U.S. may have little impact in the global economy, enactment of this bill demonstrates Hawaii's public policy towards goods manufactured in the U.S. and good-paying jobs that support our economy and the American people.
