This bill raises serious questions about the priorities of the Legislature.

Coffee farmers in West Hawaii are in a dire emergency because of the recent introduction of coffee berry borer (CBB). The future of Hawaii's premier specialty agriculture crop (Kona coffee) is uncertain because of this pest. Yet in more than one and one-half years since CBB was discovered here, the HDOA has been unable to come up with the relatively small amount of money to hire and assign an entomologist to Kona to focus on developing a program for mitigation of CBB. The HDOA repeatedly cites lack of resources from the State Legislature as the reason.

Actually, the proposed bonds will benefit a privately-owned foreign corporation, the present owners of Kauai Coffee operations.

In January 2012, Alexander & Baldwin sold its coffee operations to global coffee giant Massimo Zanetti ("MZ"). MZ is the world's largest privately owned coffee group comprised of 40 companies operating in over 35 countries. In addition to Kauai Coffee, their brands include Hills Bros, MJB, Chock-Full-Of-Nuts, Chase & Banborn and others.

Why does MZ need HI state-guaranteed bonds? Is this just cheap money, or were the bonds part of an A & amp; B promisory note in the sale?

In any case, it's unintelligible for Hawaii to underwrite bonds floated for the benefit of a huge, privately-owned foreign corporation, while ignoring the economic needs of local farmers.

This bill is an outrageous abuse of legislation to benefit the wealthy.
