	something requested only by a parent, but like the language in Section

something requested only by a parent, but like the language in Section 302A-1132, a guardian or other adult may have legal responsibility to send the child to school and should be entitled to request a geographic exception as well. We suggest that exception (2) be written as follows: (2) A geographic exception to attend a school in another district is requested and granted at the discretion of the department.
