SB 2582 Relating to the Hawaii Public Procurement Code

Chair Espero, Vice Chair Kidani and Committee Members

Our chapter of 400 retired and currently serving officers of the Uniformed Services supports SB 2582 that establishes a procurement "setaside," of 3% of the current 20% of the small business set-aside for veteran-owned small businesses and service-disabled veterans-owned small businesses. We do have some concerns with several aspects of the bill as introduced:

<u>Small Business Set-Aside</u>: Current Hawaii procurement policy provides for "set-asides" for small business and they "may" use the same size standards as the federal government (Section 103D-901, HRS). Setasides limit a particular purchase to only firms meeting set-aside criteria.

Size standards used by federal agencies are set by the Small Business Administration. There are about 1200 different industry classifications and the definition of "small" varies considerably: from 500 employees for manufacturing for instance, to 1500 for oil refineries. Service industries, construction contractors and retailers are sized by annual revenue ranging from \$7.0M for some service industries and retailers to \$33.5M for construction. It is a complex system with as many as 50 changes every year, very difficult for state procurement staff to monitor. A good aspect is that businesses must be accepted into the Central Contractor Registration data base and local buyers can find those who qualify. Based on our procurement experience we recommend that the Hawaii Small Business Size Standard be set at 50 employees and not use any hard to verify annual revenue standard

as many other states do.

<u>Veteran-Owned Businesses:</u> A member of the Hawaii National Guard may not be a "veteran" as defined for federal purposes. Only those who have been deployed under federal criteria (Title 10) for a specified period of time are considered federal veterans. For the purposes of this procurement set-aside, businesses owned by National Guard members who are not considered "veterans" under federal criteria could still be eligible for the set-aside if this bill so provides.

We will be pleased to work with the Committee to make amendments to the bill to reflect our concerns and hope it will move forward.
