- 1 **EOA's Position:** The Executive Office on Aging (EOA) strongly supports this measure.
- 2 SB2779, SD2 is part of Governor Abercrombie's Administrative Bill Package and supports the
- 3 New Day agenda of "empowering aging at home and in communities."
- 4 Purpose and Justification:

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- Ensure ADRCs are fully functioning. All of the Aging and Disability Resource Center

 (ADRC) expansion funds requested will be used to ensure that Hawaii's ADRCs are fully

 functioning and statewide by 2015, in accordance with our State Plan on Aging. The

 statewide ADRC sites are operated through Hawaii's four Area Agencies on Aging

 (AAAs), namely the Kauai Agency on Elderly Affairs, Maui County Office on Aging,

 Hawaii County Office of Aging, and the City and County of Honolulu, Elderly Affairs

 Division.
 - Develop infrastructure and streamline access. \$298,585 of the \$1.4 million appropriation
 request will go toward expenses to develop infrastructure to streamline access to services
 and supports by ensuring that all intake and assessment protocols are enhanced.

- standardized, dementia-capable, participant-centered, and automated into the ADRC's

 management information system and information technology. This will require purchasing

 software licenses, developing information technology tools and protocols, and project

 management.
 - Personnel, office space, equipment, supplies. The remainder of the funds requested, or \$1,101,415, will go towards personnel costs at the ADRC sites so that they can provide the coordinated, consistent, and higher quality level of service required of a fully functioning ADRC. Additionally, these funds will be used to lease space, equipment, furniture, and supplies for the increased personnel. EOA and AAAs identified the costs that are associated with transforming business operations within each AAA so that they can meet the definition of the full-functional ADRC. Because each county has structured its current operations in very different ways, the degree of change necessary to meet these requirements, and the cost associated with these changes, varies substantially.

- Sustainability Federal funds. We will pursue a wide variety of funding options that the
 Administration on Aging (AoA) identified as potential sources of funding for sustaining
 ADRC activity. In FY 13, EOA and the AAAs will receive additional federal funds as
 follows:
 - Source of Federal Amount Funding Medicaid The administrative match rate is 50% for time spent conducting Administrative Medicaid activities for outreach and enrollment through the ADRCs. Finally, adoption of a single assessment tool will enable the state to develop quality measures to ensure high quality care for all aged and disabled populations, including following those who have transitioned from institutionalized settings. Community Based \$300,000 for Maui County Office on Aging for administration and Care Transitions operations (\$100,000) and direct service delivery (\$200,000). Program
- *Recurring funds through agreements between EOA/ADRC and the federal government.
- An initial investment in the ADRC will enable us to be "fully functional" as defined
 by the AoA. In being fully functional, we will be able to then leverage additional federal
 dollars and respond to the Affordable Care Act. EOA strongly supports this measure and

Honorable Chairs and Members of the Committee:

S.B. 2779, SD2 is critical for the continuation of our demonstration project to enable full development and implementation of the programmatic aspects of Hawaii County's Aging and Disability Resource Center Project.

The County of Hawaii has invested heavily in the development of a physical site and has been depending on federal grants that are due to expire at the end of this year to develop the programmatic aspects (nuts and bolts - how things will work and integrate into our existing service network) to improve access to needed information and services.

The Hilo ADRC is co-located by nine major service providers and programs serving the elderly and people with disabilities. The \$240,000 for Hawaii County contained in S.B. 2779 covers personnel costs for four critical positions that are demonstrating our ACCESS model developed to improve our intake, assessment, and care coordination functions of the pilot project that is still being demonstrated and evaluated. HCOA urges passage of S.B. 2779, SD1.

POSITION: The Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs, supports SB

2779 SD 2 which creates Aging and Disability Resource Centers

(ADRC's) in each country to streamline access to long-term supports and services for older adults, persons with disabilities, and family caregivers.

Makes appropriation.

RATIONALE:

The Policy Board for Elder Affairs has a statutory obligation to advocate on behalf of the senior citizens of Hawaii. While we advise the Executive Office on Aging, we do not speak on behalf of the Executive Office of Aging.

The Executive Office on Aging has been working with the County offices on aging in implementing a five-year plan to develop fully functioning ADRC's which will serve as single entry centers for accessing services for the disabled and frail elderly.

- These centers will reduce redundancy, increase coordination in services, and greatly improve the public's ability to access needed services as well as bring greater efficiency to long-term care services.
- As they meet Federal standards for ADRC's, EOA will become eligible to draw down Federal funds from several different sources to support the program.

The requested appropriation will greatly assist in continued implementation of the fiveyear plan to develop these Centers.

The Long-Term Commission also strongly recommended that the state devote additional resources towards the development of the ADRC's as important to restructuring long-term care services

Comments:

I am testifying today on the half of the Policy Advisory Board for Elder Affairs. The board advises the executive office on aging, and also serves as an advocate for Hawaii's older people. My testimony today reflects only the views of the board.

Senate Bill 2779 calls for the establishment of a system of Adult Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs) in each county as part of a statewide network to improve long-term care services for people of all ages and with all types of disabilities. At present, people needing long-term care face a bewildering variety of questions, for which there is no one source of answers. These include such questions as: where can I obtain a given service? What services do I really need? How much will this cost? Are there any ways that I can get help in paying the cost of care? The list of questions is endless and answers are a few.

The ADRC system will make it possible for people to go to a single source for information about public and private long-term care programs and services and financial assistance. This information will be available to all, regardless of age income or disability. And persons eligible for public programs will be helped to apply for assistance.

The policy advisory Board for Elder affairs regards the ADRC program as critical step in improving Hawaii's fragmented long-term care system. We urge you to support this bill.

SB 2779, Relating to the Aging & Disability Resource Centers (ADRC)

Good afternoon, Chair Mizuno & Chair Yamane, Vice Chair Jordan and Vice Chair Morikawa, and Members of the House Human Services & Health Committees,

Lanakila Pacific strongly supports SB 2779 to create fully functioning ADRC's throughout the state. This would significantly improve services for seniors, persons with disabilities and their caregivers by eliminating duplication, providing a single point of entry, streamlining data collection and improving case management services.

However, if this Measure were to be passed without also appropriating funds for Kupuna Care, the ADRC would become a single-entry-point to the network of services, yet lack viable services to which to refer eligible clients. Therefore, it is imperative that the funding appropriated in SB 2320 Relating to Aging also be passed.

As a Kupuna Care service provider, Lanakila Meals on Wheels, a program of Lanakila Pacific, serves more than 250,000 meals to seniors each year. Our staff and volunteers deliver more than a nutritious meal, as they may be the only person that the senior will spend time with each day. Our average meal recipient is a woman of Asian or Pacific Island descent, 83 years old with an income of less than \$1,000 per month.

As a Kupuna Care program, we also provide nutritional education and counseling, monitor health and welfare, and serve as an important bridge to support services, helping seniors remain in their homes rather than more costly premature institutionalization.

Unfortunately, the Kupuna Care appropriation in the base budget has remained flat at \$4.8 million since 2002, despite our rapidly aging population's even more urgent need for these critical services. Because of this, Kupuna Care programs including Lanakila Meals on Wheels are faced with heartbreaking waiting lists.

Lanakila Meals on Wheels alone is already facing a waiting list of over 250 seniors that will continue to grow. Seniors like 93 year old Mr. R who was diagnosed with terminal cancer two years ago and never imagined being in need of services.

The passage of this Measure is vital as it will provide a single point of entry for seniors and their caregivers who depend upon Kupuna Care. However, aging network providers cannot meet the current and growing demand for services when faced by years of flat or reduced State and Federal funding.

We urge you to support both SB 2779 and SB 2320 to provide critically needed services for the most isolated and vulnerable seniors in Hawaii.

Chair Mizuno, Chair Yamane and Committee Members:

AARP is a membership organization of people 50 and older with nearly 150,000 members in Hawaii. We are committed to championing access to affordable, quality health care for all generations, providing the tools needed to save for retirement, and serving as a reliable information source on issues critical to Americans age 50+.

AARP **strongly supports** SB2779, SD2 which creates Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRC) in each county to streamline access to long-term supports and services for older adults, persons with disabilities and caregivers; and appropriates funds for its establishment.

However, the ADRCs need to be properly resourced and funded to make ADRCs an effective single point of entry for individuals seeking information on their long-term care (LTC) options. The ADRC is a navigational tool that connects individuals to appropriate long-term care options. Critical to the success of an ADRC is ensuring the availability of services (e.g., Kupuna Care) when individuals are directed to them.

Hawaii's ADRC program is in various stages of development in each county, needs to be expanded statewide, and needs improvement. AARP's recently published State Long-Term Services and Support Scorecard ranks Hawaii 41st in ability to access LTC through an ADRC or other single entry point.

This bill appropriates funds out of general revenues for fiscal year 2012-2013 for ADRCs. The Executive Office on Aging (EOA) should be consulted as to the appropriate amount of funds.

ADRCs will address consumer frustration when trying to determine how to obtain long-term supports and services, if appropriately resourced, funded, and services are available. Otherwise, this frustration will be magnified with the increasing demand for service due to a rapidly aging population:

- Approximately one out of every five (20%) Hawaii residents are over 60 years old.
- Hawaii's population over age 65 is increasing rapidly and projected to increase by 71% between 2010 and 2030.
- Approximately 247,000 family caregivers are the backbone of Hawaii's long-term care system and currently provide nearly \$2 billion a year of unpaid caregiving services.

• The number of family caregivers is declining. The primary family caregiver group is 50-64 years old. This group will decline by 10% by 2030, and cause further strain on seniors and remaining caregivers.

We believe a resource like this on every island will be invaluable to family caregivers who may not have the time or energy to research programs for their parents while holding down full-time jobs.

Thank you for the opportunity to submit written testimony in <u>Strong Support</u> of SB2779, SD2 pertaining to the Aging and Disability Resource Centers. My name is Elaine C. Goldberg and I live in Kapolei. For more than 30 years, I have worked as a Diagnostic Radiologic Technologist with 14 years at Tripler Army Medical Center, Valley Forge Army Hospital, VA Hospitals/outpatients centers and also on the mainland at noteworthy medical facilities such as Children's Hospital of Philadelphia and Medical College of Pennsylvania.

Healthcare for the elders is near and dear to my heart. My family took care of my grandmothers at home (deceased), took care of my father (now deceased), and continue to take care of my aged mother at home. My mother fortunately has a fantastic physician and office staff who do everything possible to assist her with billing and correcting problems with insurance issues. Her monthly income is minimal. I have provided financial contributions for the past 14 years.

November 2009, I took an early retirement from position at Tripler because of two young managers' poor treatment. I am fortunately, not disabled at this time, but cannot find a position, experiencing age discrimination. My monthly pension from the Army was reduced by WEP, CSCR Offset, and hazards of 25% COLA, which was money never going into retirement fund. I only discovered this after processing my papers for early retirement (which was the only way I could maintain my Fed. BC/BS) as agency withheld my documents for more than 30 days, resulting in BC/BS sending me a letter informing me that my policy was canceled, and I could buy a personal policy but pre-existing conditions wouldn't be cover.

I am now considered a senior citizen who has experienced all the dilemmas you read about. I have seen situations as in Michael Moore's movie **SICKO**. There was no one stop "shopping" agency that could or would assist me. Fortunately, because of my medical background, college education, and research abilities, it literally took me more than two months of phone calls, e-mails to officials in DC (could not use state agencies as I was a federal employee), and persistence. As I contacted agencies, I was told, "let me give you another number-this office doesn't handle these matters."

I think everyone in Washington would recognize my name. However, I did get my health insurance resolved and other matters kept from Federal Civil Servants, I consider as additional degrees from "The College of Hardknocks."

The moral of my story is that the ADRC is a most necessary and vital part of quality of life for the elders in our state who cannot fend for themselves and the disabled. Residents of Hawaii do give unlimited assistance to their family members, performing duties of nurses, physical therapists, cleaning duties,

transportation, etc., etc. Please make certain that adequate funding is provided for services of the ADRC and see to it that ADRC services are expanded here in the State of Hawaii.

Please support our seniors in our beautiful state by voting yes on SB2779, SD2.
