Friends of Challenger Center Hawaii (FCCH) is a 501(c) (3) non-profit organization established to provide financial assistance to the DOE's Challenger Center Hawaii (CCH). FCCH was incorporated in June 2011. CCH is an interactive facility at Barbers' Point Elementary School which conducts space flight simulations for students in grades 6-8. CCH has been in operation for almost 20 years.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

FCCH is requesting funding for a matching grant to fund a portion of CCH's operational expenses for the 2013-14 school year. The objective is to assure that at least 4,000 students in grades 6-8 experience one of two spacemission scenarios where students work in cooperative teams to solve real-life science, technology, and mathematics problems.

3. The public purpose and need to be served;

Research indicates that the United States is losing its worldwide dominance in the critical areas of science and innovation. The National Science Foundation finds that there is a decrease in the number of students enrolling in the undergraduate and graduate studies in engineering, physical sciences and mathematics. Sadly the Hawaii State Assessment (HSA) test data for 2012 revealed that only 31% of students in grade 8 were proficient in science.

Students are organized into one of eight disciplines requiring communication between ground control and a space station or orbiter. In conducting hands-on experiments while facing unforeseen emergencies, students must employ critical thinking skills, step out of social and gender barriers, and gain the self-confidence needed to mature at this important stage in their personal development.

4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The CCH target population is middle schools students and teachers in grades 6-8.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Although CCH is located on the campus of Barbers Point Elementary and operated by the Leeward District, the Center provides services to middle schools state—wide.

- During the mission, Challenger Center staff members evaluate student performance by completing the Hawaii Content and Performance Standards III and the General Learner Outcomes Assessment.

- During the mission, teachers evaluate student performance by completing the General Learner Outcomes Teacher Evaluation.
- As a NASA Regional Educator Resource Center, Challenger Center staff members provide supplemental NASA curriculum materials and conduct teacher in-service training.
- Feedback from the students themselves.

The FCCH Board is comprised of 13 education, business, government, and community leaders, including a former Governor. Officers include a former Superintendent of the Hawaii Department of Education, a Trustee of the Estate of James Campbell, and a former Deputy Superintendent of the Hawaii Department of Education. The group is knowledgeable about applying for and receiving grant monies and is dedicated to supporting Challenger Center Hawaii with its emphasis on teaching science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) in an environment that promotes problem-solving and teamwork.

CCH opened its doors in April 1993 with the adaptive re-use of three former classrooms at Barbers' Point Elementary School. The Center's facility houses a realistic space station with many of the same elements found on an actual spacecraft and a mission control room modeled after NASA's Johnson Space Center. In the SS, "astronauts" gather data, conduct experiments, and guide the SS to its destination. Mission controllers monitor the work of the SS crewmembers, record and analyze data, and ensure all conditions are safe. ADA accommodations are made for students on a case-by-case basis when necessary. The facility has functioned for almost 20 years without security, ADA, or related concerns.

## V. Personnel: Project Organization and Staffing

### A. Proposed Staffing, Staff Qualifications, Supervision and Training

CCH's Executive Director has 26 years of teaching experience with the DOE Hawaii and 21 years as CCH founding teacher and director. The two full-time teachers bring over 52 years with DOE Hawaii in Science Elementary Education, and each has 10 years as a teacher in the CCH program. Two part-time teachers provide the Center with over 60 years with the DOE Hawaii in Elementary and Special Education. They have 8 years and 19 years experience respectively as teachers/educational assistants at CCH.
