Application for Grants and Subsidies

I. Background and Summary

A brief description of the applicant's background:

The Hawaii Symphony Orchestra (hereinafter "Orchestra"), a Hawaii nonprofit corporation, is the successor to the Honolulu Symphony Society, founded in 1902, that ceased operations and filed for bankruptcy in 2009 and was liquidated in 2010. The Orchestra was founded by a group of community leaders in 2011.

The Orchestra presented a 16-week series of classical and pops concerts between March and July 2012. This season, constrained by a lack of resources, was considerably shorter than seasons previously presented by the Honolulu Symphony Society.

The goals and objectives related to the request:

The 2012 symphonic season was an artistic success, but resulted in an operating deficit that was minimized by extraordinary contributions from directors, other individuals, and foundations, and was covered by loans from directors. The Orchestra's business objectives are to rebuild the base of private contributions to a level that can support a symphony orchestra that can in turn offer professional musicians sufficient income to allow them to accept positions within the Orchestra as core income source. Typically, many of the musicians would then participate in other performance and teaching opportunities, providing the serendipitous benefit of a pool of professional musicians in residence in Hawaii and the opportunity for the musicians to augment the modest income provided by the Orchestra. If the business objectives are achieved, the artistic objective of providing access to great symphonic music and music education to Hawaii's students, adult residents, and visitors will also be achievable. The requested grant funds would enable the Orchestra to accomplish these objectives.

3. The public purpose and need to be served:

The public benefits of a resident professional orchestra are:

- a) It presents music concerts that inspire audiences and satisfy their souls.
- b) It brings to Hawaii nationally- and internationally-known guest artists whom most Hawaii residents would not otherwise have the opportunity to experience live.
- c) It is part of Hawaii's cultural landscape that enhances the quality of life and attracts business executives, university personnel, and others to live and work in Hawaii.
- d) It is an attraction to and an activity for visitors.
- e) It employs professional musicians, who are the backbone of the teaching of music for students in grades K-12 and in colleges and universities, and for individual adults pursuing music studies, and who otherwise would not be in residence in Hawaii.
- f) Its musicians, as part of their jobs with the Orchestra, go to schools to perform for and educate students about music and music instruments.
- g) It also employs a professional staff, stagehands, and security personnel.
- Its musicians are essential to the continued success of ballet, opera, and chamber music companies in Hawaii.
- i) "Without music, life would be a mistake."
 - 19th century German philosopher Fredrich Nietzsche.

4. Describe the target population to be served:

A resident professional orchestra will serve the target populations:

- (a) residents and business visitors and tourists who would attend concerts if concerts were performed;
- (b) students in schools that are visited and educated by musicians as part of their employment by the Orchestra;
- (c) students at all grade levels and adults who attend music classes or take music lessons from resident professional musicians whose teaching is done outside of their employment by the Orchestra.

5. Describe the geographic coverage:

Primarily the island of Oahu. The Orchestra also serves the neighbor islands through its radio broadcasts throughout the islands in collaboration with Hawaii Public Radio. It would also perform on the neighbor islands, including schools and colleges, if sponsors were found to fund the cost of inter-island travel. Additional opportunities for expanding presence on the neighbor islands lie in other delivery systems, including in-state telecasts of concerts to performance sites on neighbor islands.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

1. Describe the scope of work, tasks and responsibilities:

The requested grant funds would provide the resources to expand the Orchestra's activities to include education and outreach activities during the 2013-14 season beyond the Masterworks and Pops concerts performed in the Blaisdell Concert Hall and the Waikiki Shell.

 Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service:

The requested grant funds would be expended in the fall of 2013 and the spring of 2014 (a) to include free community concerts throughout its season (b) to provide free tickets to students and members of the Hawaii Youth Symphony (anticipate average 100 - 300 students per performance) to attend regular concerts at the Blaisdell Concert Hall, and (c) to cover a portion of the costs of (i) the regular 16-week season that will be presented at the Blaisdell Concert Hall in the fall of 2013 and the spring of 2014 and (ii) providing musicians to schools.

3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results:

High quality concert performances are the result of the coming together of talented musicians with adequate rehearsal time in a venue that that is aesthetically pleasing and acoustically excellent, and the Hawaii Symphony will hire the most talented musicians available, which will be determined in large part by the grant requested in this application, to maximize the opportunities to present great concerts. In order to be successful, all performances require infrastructure to support the musical product, including marketing and promotional material, ticketing systems and other "back room" responsibilities, and an inviting and contemporary concert experience enabled by the comfort and amenities available in the facility in which performances are presented, the convenience of parking, and the welcoming demeanor of the personal working "front-of-house" during the performances. The Orchestra will provide training for its employees and volunteers, and will work with other vendors to maximize the enjoyment of the total concert experience. Annual subscription renewal rates are an indication of how well the public feels it has been served. In addition to the reviews of professional music critics that are published in the local press, the Hawaii Symphony will conduct surveys of concertgoers to assess their experiences and to improve.

The Orchestra will also work closely with the administrators and teachers in schools in which education programs and partnerships are developed, as well as with the "presenters" of our outreach concerts in throughout Oahu and the neighbor islands to evaluate the degree to which the Orchestra has met their expectations and how, together, we can improve both the expectations and their achievement. Again, invitations to return are also an effective way by which to evaluate our success.

High quality education in the schools is the result of enthusiastic musicians using a curriculum aligned with the Hawaii Content and Performance Standards. The previous Honolulu Symphony Society and the very successful Chamber Music Hawaii both have had such programs, and the Orchestra will utilize the relationships developed and experience gathered by both organizations.

The Orchestra will follow all the measures closely and will adjust its marketing plans, programming, and fund-raising plans as appropriate.

As stated above, the Orchestra is successor to the Honolulu Symphony Society, organized in 1902, that presented orchestral concerts for more than 100 years until its demise in 2010.

The current president of the Orchestra is the former president of the Cincinnati Symphony Orchestra who retired in 2008 after a highly successful 37-year career at the Cincinnati Orchestra, 31 of them in the top leadership position.

The Hawaii Symphony Orchestra, with little lead time, produced an artistically successful abbreviated season in the spring of 2012.

The Orchestra will collaborate with Chamber Music Hawaii (CMH) in its music-inthe schools program. CMH has a multi-year history of success with its program.

B. Facilities



The other positions are currently performed by volunteers pending the hiring of a permanent staff.

The undersigned authorized representative of the applicant certifies the following:
