 The Hawaiian Islands Land Trust is a 501(c)3 organization whose mission is to
 "protect the lands that sustain us for current and future generations." The land
 trust was formed on January 1, 2011 from four land trusts across the state (the
 Kaua'i Public Land Trust, the O'ahu Land Trust, the Maui Coastal Land Trust
 and the Hawai'i Island Land Trust). Our service area spans the entire state, and
 we have currently protected over 17,500 acres through both fee ownership as well
 as perpetual conservation easements.
- 2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

 The funding we are requesting in this project is to conduct due diligence on the feasibility of the land trust acquire and appropriately steward the 280 acres around Honolua Bay and Lipoa Point on Maui. We intend to work closely with the local community in order to ensure appropriate and sustainable stewardship upon fee acquisition. Honolua/Lipoa Point is currently owned by Maui Land and Pineapple Company. Once the property is owned in fee we intend to ensure the land is managed and stewarded appropriately and that a perpetual Conservation Easement is eventually retained on the land.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;
 In order to protect the lands at Honolua and Lipoa Point the Hawaiian Islands
 Land Trust must ensure we are capable of perpetually steward this land in a way
 that is consistent with both the environmental needs of the land, its cultural and
 historical significance, and the needs and desires of the community. Once this
 process is conducted we can move forward on acquiring this land with the
 intention of making it a perpetual asset to the community.
- 4. Describe the target population to be served; and Because conducting a comprehensive due diligence and feasibility study is vital to the Hawaiian Islands Land Trust's ability to appropriately manage this parcel, the beneficiary of this funding is anyone who visits or spends time in this area.

Honolua Bay and Lipoa Point are popular recreational spots, with visitor numbers in the tens of thousands annually.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

The scope of this feasibility study will include Both portions of Honolua Bay and Lipoa Point, approximately 280 acres of land in the Ka'anapali district of west Maui. However this land is an incredibly iconic site on Maui which annually attracts thousands of visitors from around the world. Protecting this land for the benefit of both residents and visitors is vital to perpetuating the character of this special place.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

 This project is a standard due diligence assessment the Hawaiian Islands Land
 Trust conducts on all of its fee acquisition projects. This will include a number of
 specific tasks. Because of the large number of stakeholders we are committed to
 ensuring we do the most comprehensive and high quality job we can. These tasks
 include: 1) Appraisal Report 2) Phase I environmental review 3) Title
 examination; 4) Class I boundary survey; 5) Conservation value baseline; 6)
 Public input through community and individual meetings. Tasks four (5) and (6)
 will have a summary report detailing our findings, providing suggestions and
 recommending the role the Hawaiian Lands Trust should play in this process.
- 2. Provide a projected annual timeline for accomplishing the results or outcomes of the service;

 Our goal is to have all aspects of this project completed within one year. The Phase I environmental review, title examination and the boundary survey will be done concurrently and will be completed within six months (depending on the availability of the sub-contractors who will be conducting this work). The conservation value baseline will begin as soon as the funding is made available and will be completed in several phases. These phases will be determined by the presence of key species we presume inhabit the property (for example, some species of seabird are only on site between April and December).
- 3. Describe its quality assurance and evaluation plans for the request. Specify how the applicant plans to monitor, evaluate, and improve their results; and As an accredited land trust, the Hawaiian Islands Land Trust is obligated to follow the standards and practices prescribed by the Land Trust Alliance. This project falls into the practice of due diligence for fee acquisition. Since we will be sub-contracting on several of these tasks we will utilize only industry endorsed

companies. In our experience, using the highest caliber sub-contractors has proven very effective. The data we are seeking will be compiled into a report which will evaluate the overall feasibility of the acquisition of this parcel.

There are no additional organizations, aside from sub-contractors who will be reviewed by Dr. Fisher and hired by Mr. Clement.
