The YWCA of O'ahu (YWCA) opens up opportunities for women and girls to succeed. As the economy improves, women in Hawai'i are uniquely qualified to take advantage of growth and diversification. Women are graduating from college at higher rates than men, are involved in industries that are growing, and are more likely to self-fund start-up enterprises.

Funding is requested to support Phase II of capital renovations to Laniākea, our historic headquarters in Downtown Honolulu, at a proposed cost of \$10.6M. Phase II will establish The Patsy T. Mink Center for Business & Leadership at Laniākea. It is fitting for the YWCA to honor the legacy of Congresswoman Mink, as the very issues she stood for are those of our mission: empowerment of women and elimination of racism.

In Phase I the YWCA completed \$6.1M in renovations to Fuller Hall, a corporate conferencing hall for up to 200 people and Café Julia, a teaching restaurant specializing in business lunches and catered events.

2. The goals and objectives related to the request;

Constructed in 1927, Laniākea was the first major building in Hawai'i to be designed by a woman. Julia Morgan, best known for Hearst Castle at San Simeon, designed over 700 buildings during her 47-year career and ranked the Honolulu YWCA as one of her top ten favorite projects.

The name Laniākea literally translates, "open skies" or "wide horizons." The building holds true to this title with its open and spacious layout. However, the design has also exposed Laniākea to the rigors of this tropical climate. Constructed with very little wood, Laniākea is structurally sound, but erosion and deterioration now detract from the visual detail that once distinguished this building.

The goal and objectives of this project are as follows:

Goal #1: Preserve and renovate historic elements of Laniākea.

Objectives:

- 1. Address structural, safety and security issues throughout the building.
- 2. Repair or replace historically and culturally significant elements.
- 3. Improve landscaping and open common areas.

Goal #2: Establish the Patsy T. Mink Center for Business & Leadership at Laniākea.

Objectives:

- 1. Convert existing office space into a state-of-the art center for women.
- 2. Convert basement into a Career Center with computer workroom, mock-interview office, and mobile classroom.
- 3. Add modern amenities and technology improvements for better functionality and improved service delivery.
- 3. The public purpose and need to be served;

The YWCA addresses the needs of women – a stable home, a career, and financial security – through innovative programs that engage each woman in her own success. The YWCA helps women achieve their goals.

Economic self-sufficiency is the number one priority of the Hawai'i State Commission on the Status of Women. This is largely because low-income women have been the hardest hit by the economic downturn. Honolulu is the second-most expensive city in the nation after New York City, at about 165 percent of the national average. The adjusted average income is just \$22,107, if wages, unemployment, cost of living and the state tax rate are considered, making Hawaii the most difficult place to earn a living of all 50 states.

In addition to support low-income women, the YWCA supports entrepreneurship and leadership at a time when the economy is poised for growth and diversification. Throughout the state, various industries are expected to grow, including construction, eco-tourism and technology. Women are uniquely qualified to take advantage of growth opportunities. Research predicts that by 2018 women entrepreneurs will be responsible for up to 5.5 million new jobs.

The YWCA offers a host of programs to address these issues:

- The Patsy T. Mink Center for Business and Leadership, providing business services to women entrepreneurs, both nascent and established, many of whom are socially and economically disadvantaged. This program is supported by the Office of Women's Business Ownership of the U.S. Small Business Administration.
- Dress for Success[®] Honolulu, which helps low-income women find and keep good jobs and move up in the workforce. Since 2002, more than 3,500 women have been "suited" for job interviews at Dress for Success[®].

- YWCA Advocacy and policy work as part of a national platform focused on economic advancement, health and safety of women, and racial justice/civil rights. Our youngest leaders, teen girls from local schools, are integrally involved in these efforts.
- Transitional Housing and support to women in crisis, including female veterans and domestic violence survivors. In 2012, 497 women and 59 children stayed at the **YWCA Fernhurst Residence**.
- Wahine Moving Forward, a collaborative project among five community agencies to train and match financial literacy mentors with survivors of domestic violence to help them build economic readiness and self-sufficiency.
- Wahine Forum, a business networking group for business owners, professionals and non-profit community leaders. This networking group draws about 500 women each year.
 - 4. Describe the target population to be served; and

The primary target population for YWCA programs is low-income women and families. These women may be female immigrants, including many for whom English is a second language, survivors of domestic abuse and/or female veterans. Two-thirds of program participants are between 31-50 years of age and about one-third are of Native Hawaiian ethnicity. Many of them are single parents.

Women may be seeking economic stability after a lifetime of welfare dependency. Some are building professional skills to move up and leave the stress of working multiple low wage jobs. Some intend to start a new business.

Income is the most basic building block of economic security for women and children. Even as the economy improves in Hawai'i, half of single women live in poverty and thirty percent of children have parents who lack full-time employment. Landing a job is just the first step, and the YWCA provides additional support to help women manage the lifestyle, financial and personal challenges of new employment. To borrow a phrase from the Half in Ten Campaign, the YWCA seeks to replace poverty with opportunity, and help each woman achieve success.

5. Describe the geographic coverage.

Laniākea is in the Honolulu Capitol and Cultural District and is listed on both the State and National Historic Registers. The renovation of Laniākea is necessary to due to the historical and architectural distinction of this district. As recognized by Historic Hawai'i Foundation, through Laniākea, "...the YWCA reaches out to a broad cross-section of the community who might not otherwise come to experience downtown Honolulu and its history."

The strategic location of Laniākea, in the seat of both the business and government districts, enables the YWCA to address community challenges from the heart of activity on Oʻahu. This is

truly "the place to be" for women's issues. Readily accessible by bus, the YWCA supports women and families in the urban core, in surrounding areas, and throughout the island.

II. Service Summary and Outcomes

The scope of work includes:

Exterior Walls: One of Hawaii's first buildings to utilize modern construction techniques, Laniākea was built of poured-in-place concrete and a clay tile roof. Exterior walls must be stabilized to prevent further cracking and settling. Throughout Laniākea are original decorative elements, including column capitals, plaster moldings and balusters. Many are in disrepair due to cracking and deterioration. These elements require repair or replacement to ensure that further cracking doesn't cause them to fall apart.

Exterior Windows and Balconies: The exterior façade has over 140 custom designed steel windows. Many windows are missing hardware and the window putty has deteriorated, causing water intrusion and staining on the walls below. Window and hardware must be repaired or replaced. The second- and third-story balconies, made almost entirely of intricate ironwork, are rusted and rotted. Several balconies are unusable, but they could be replaced or re-anchored to preserve the building.

<u>Entryway Teak Doors:</u> The entryway's teak doors feature Julia Morgan's original wooden carved rosettes, inspired by the beloved flowers of Hawaii - plumeria, hibiscus, and orchid. Severely weathered, the doors must be completing refurbishing by a specialist in antique woodworking.

<u>Interior Restoration:</u> Much of the flooring is ceramic tile, which must be restored, cleaned and professionally maintained. The interior walls should be patched and repainted. Dropped ceilings will be eliminated to restore original vaulted ceilings whenever possible.

Plans call for rewiring of electrical work throughout the building and grounds, improved security and technology features, improved sound insulation, upgraded air conditioning and improvements to grounds and landscaping.

The lead architectural firm for the project is Ferraro Choi and Associates, known for award-winning rehabilitation projects including Honolulu Academy of Arts and Hawai'i Theatre Center. The YWCA is building a committee to oversee plans and construction and to ensure adherence to the original architectural intent of the property.

The YWCA proposed project will result in numerous benefits to the community. The anticipated outcomes are: 1) <u>improved economic environment</u>, through added jobs, leadership development opportunities, career exploration and training, networking, and support services for small businesses; 2) <u>enhanced services for women and families</u>, including financial literacy training, fitness and enrichment classes and cultural programs; and 3) <u>increased civic vitality</u>, as Honolulu gains a convenient, affordable and quality site where people can come together.

These outcomes are evaluated using predetermined outputs and indicator data, which are tracked electronically in a central database. Program managers work with executive staff to monitor activities and make adjustments as needed to ensure quality delivery of services. The Board of Directors monitors overall activities for program quality, fiscal integrity and adherence to the YWCA mission.

To evaluate the effectiveness of the physical construction project, the YWCA measures success by the ability to complete projects safely, on-time, and within budget. These measures will be provided to the State upon request.

The YWCA Laniakea is a beautiful 70,000 square foot facility located on Richards Street in downtown Honolulu. Built in 1927, Laniakea was designed by Julia Morgan, best known as the architect of San Simeon, Hearst Castle. Laniakea's distinct design features include over 140 custom designed steel windows, carved teak entryway doors and a clay tile roof.

The landscaping was also designed by a woman, Catherine Jones Richards, who worked on the Honolulu Academy of Arts and Punchbowl National Memorial Cemetery. The open-air corridors and lush courtyard provide a Hawaiian sense of respite and care in the bustling business district of downtown Honolulu. Laniakea is listed on both the National and State of Hawaii Registers of Historic Places. The facility is easily accessible by city bus, and offers

ample street and nearby garage parking. Laniākea has a handicap accessible entryway and many ADA amenities. All areas affecting programs are fully ADA-accessible.

Over the years, the YWCA renovated portions of the facility including Café Julia, Elizabeth Fuller Hall and the Fitness Center. Ongoing improvements have resulted in vibrant income-producing spaces that are accessed by the local business community while supporting the member services and mission of the YWCA. The next phase of renovations will retain the original character and architectural details of Laniākea, while updating amenities and improving safety and security.

Ms. Boritzer earned her Bachelor of Science Degree in Management, with a minor in Accounting and Computer Programming from Woodbury University in Burbank, California.

Noriko Namiki, Chief Communications Officer, is responsible for communications strategy related to this project, including fund development, program development, event promotion and marketing. Ms. Namiki worked for more than ten years as a television producer and has also worked as a communications consultant with corporate clients in Hong Kong, Singapore, Tokyo and Seoul. Ms. Namiki also worked as a social worker, assisting crime victims with the District Attorney's Office in Brooklyn. She has a Master's Degree in Social Work from Columbia University and a Bachelor's Degree in Communications from Chaminade University in Honolulu.
