A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO AGRICULTURE.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- The legislature finds that modern conveniences 1 SECTION 1. provide Hawaii residents with a variety of inexpensive food 2 choices but diminish residents' appreciation for the natural 3 environment responsible for Hawaii's food supply and contribute 4 to residents' poor diets. 5 A report made to the twenty-sixth legislature in response 6 to Senate Concurrent Resolution No. 121, S.D. 1, H.D. 1, adopted 7 during the regular session of 2009, by a collaboration of 8 private, public, and nonprofit entities identified food 10 insecurity and growing obesity as severe challenges facing Hawaii. One in every three children born in the year 2000 is 11 expected to develop diabetes and the 2003 food security task 12 force report found that over nineteen per cent of Hawaii 13 14 residents live in food insecure households. Supporting local 15 agriculture through initiatives like a farm-to-school program can serve to combat these problems. 16
- Increasing the consumption of locally grown foods will
 ensure that fresh, high quality produce is available for healthy

- 1 meals in schools, hospitals, and correctional facilities
- 2 throughout the State. The increased revenue for local farmers
- 3 will assist struggling farmers and will ensure agriculture is a
- 4 driving economic force in Hawaii providing job creation and food
- 5 security for our State. Furthermore, the availability of local
- 6 produce will ensure that Hawaii's children eat the highest
- 7 quality food that will nourish their bodies, enhance their
- 8 educational experience, and cultivate long-term healthy habits.
- The purpose of this Act is to establish a policy to buy
- 10 local produce and support local agriculture and codify that
- 11 policy in chapter 226, Hawaii Revised Statutes, the Hawaii State
- 12 Planning Act.
- 13 SECTION 2. Section 226-7, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 14 amended by amending subsection (b) to read as follows:
- 15 "(b) To achieve the agriculture objectives, it shall be
- 16 the policy of this State to:
- 17 (1) Establish a clear direction for Hawaii's agriculture
- 18 through stakeholder commitment and advocacy.
- 19 (2) Encourage agriculture by making best use of natural

4	(4)	Establish strong relationships between the

9		major sector of Hawaii's economy.
10	(6)	Seek the enactment and retention of federal and state
11	•	legislation that benefits Hawaii's agricultural
12		industries.
13	(7)	Strengthen diversified agriculture by developing an
14		effective promotion, marketing, and distribution
15		system between Hawaii's <u>food</u> producers and [eonsumer
16		markets locally, on the continental United States, and
17		internationally.] consumers in the State, nation, and
18		world.
19	(8)	Support research and development activities that
20		strengthen economic productivity in agriculture,

10	(12)	[Expand] In addition to the State's priority on food,
11		expand Hawaii's agricultural base by promoting growth

15	(13)	Promote economically competitive activities that
16		increase Hawaii's agricultural self-sufficiency[+]_
17		including the increased purchase and use of Hawaii-
18		grown food and food products by residents, businesses,

21	. (14)	Promote and assist in the establishment of sound
22		financial programs for diversified agriculture

2		assist the entry of displaced agricultural workers
3		into alternative agricultural or other employment.

5	•	economically nonfeasible agricultural production to

7	SECT	ION 3. Section 226-103, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
8	amended by	y amending subsection (d) to read as follows:
9	" (d)	Priority guidelines to promote the growth and
10	developme	nt of diversified agriculture and aquaculture:
11	(1)	Identify, conserve, and protect agricultural and
12		aquacultural lands of importance and initiate
13		affirmative and comprehensive programs to promote
14	÷.	economically productive agricultural and aquacultural
15		uses of such lands.
16	(2)	Assist in providing adequate, reasonably priced water
17		for agricultural activities.
18	(3)	Encourage public and private investment to increase
19		water supply and to improve transmission, storage, and
20		irrigation facilities in support of diversified
21		agriculture and aquaculture.

1	(4)	Assist in the formation and operation of production
2		and marketing associations and cooperatives to reduce
3		production and marketing costs.
4	(5)	Encourage and assist with the development of a
5		waterborne and airborne freight and cargo system
6		capable of meeting the needs of Hawaii's agricultural
7		community.
8 .	(6)	Seek favorable freight rates for Hawaii's agricultural
9		products from interisland and overseas transportation
10		operators.
11	(7)	Encourage the development and expansion of
12		agricultural and aquacultural activities which offer
13		long-term economic growth potential and employment
14		opportunities.
15	(8)	Continue the development of agricultural parks and
16		other programs to assist small independent farmers in
17		securing agricultural lands and loans.
18	(9)	Require agricultural uses in agricultural subdivisions
19		and closely monitor the uses in these subdivisions.

(10) Support the continuation of land currently in use for

diversified agriculture.

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L	(11) Encourage residents and visitors to support Hawaii's
2	farmers by purchasing locally grown food and food
3	products."
4	SECTION 4. Statutory material to be repealed is bracketed
5	and stricken. New statutory material is underscored.
6	SECTION 5. This Act shall take effect upon its approval.
