HOUSE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES TO IMPROVE THE ACCURACY OF EYEWITNESS IDENTIFICATIONS.

1 WHEREAS, mistaken eyewitness identification has been shown 2 to have contributed to the wrongful conviction in approximately seventy-five percent of the nation's exonerations; and 3 4 WHEREAS, over the past thirty years, a large body of peer-5 reviewed, scientific research and practice have emerged showing 6 that simple systemic changes in administering eyewitness 7 identification procedures can greatly improve the accuracy of 8 those identifications; and 9 10 WHEREAS, policies and procedures to improve the accuracy of 11 12 eyewitness identifications, such as those recommended by the U.S. National Institute of Justice, the American Bar 13 Association, the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General, the 14 Wisconsin Office of the Attorney General, the California 15 Commission on the Fair Administration of Justice, the 16 International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the North 17 Carolina Actual Innocence Commission, are readily available; and 18 19 WHEREAS, more accurate eyewitness identifications increase 20 the ability of police and prosecutors to convict the quilty and 21 protect the innocent; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the integrity of Hawaii's criminal justice process 24 25 is enhanced by adherence to best practices in evidence gathering; and 26 27 WHEREAS, uniformity in practice and protocols among all 28 29 counties is important for consistency of justice; and 30 WHEREAS, Hawaii will benefit from the improvement of the 31 accuracy of eyewitness identifications; and 32 33 WHEREAS, best practices in cases where there are multiple 34 eyewitnesses include each eyewitness viewing photograph or live 35



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lineups separately or sequentially; the suspect being placed in 1 a different position in the live lineup and/or photograph lineup 2 for each eyewitness; the eyewitnesses not being permitted to 3 4 communicate with each other until all identification procedures 5 have been completed; and the filing of confidence statements by 6 each eyewitness; now, therefore, 7 8 BE IT RESOLVED by the House of Representatives of the 9 Twenty-seventh Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2013, that in order to prevent the injustice of a 10 11 wrongful conviction caused by mistaken eyewitness identification; to improve lineup procedures during criminal 12 investigations; and to further improve the enforcement of 13 justice within Hawaii, this body requests the formation of a 14 task force to identify and recommend policies and procedures to 15 16 the Legislature to improve the accuracy of eyewitness identifications; and 17 18 19 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force comprise the 20 following individuals or their designees: 21 22 (1) Attorney General; 23 24 (2) Public Defender; 25 (3) All four county Chiefs of Police; 26 27 (4) All four county prosecutors; 28 29 (5) Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian 30 Affairs; 31 32 33 (6) A representative of the Hawaii Innocence Project; 34 35 (7)Two representatives with expertise in the relevant social sciences as demonstrated by teaching, 36 publication, and other scholarly applications, to be 37 appointed by the Senate President and one to be 38 appointed by the Speaker of the House of 39 40 Representatives; and 41 (8) Executive Director of the Hawaii Civil Rights 42 Commission; and 43 44



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BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force submit a report 1 of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed 2 3 legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014; and 4 5

BUT IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force cease to exist 6 7 on June 30, 2014; and

9 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 10 Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General; Office of the 11 Public Defender; Police Chiefs of the City and County of Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; 12 Prosecutors of the City and County of Honolulu, County of 13 Hawaii, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; Mayors of the City 14 and County of Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Kauai, and 15 County of Maui; Chief Executive Officer of the Office of 16 17 Hawaiian Affairs; Hawaii Innocence Project; Executive Director of the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission; Chair of the Senate 18 19 Judiciary and Labor Committee; and Chair of the House Judiciary Committee. 20
