A BILL FOR AN ACT

RELATING TO THE PUBLIC UTILITIES COMMISSION.

BE IT ENACTED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF HAWAII:

- 1 SECTION 1. The purpose of this Act is to update codified
- 2 position descriptions for public utilities commission staff.
- 3 This Act amends existing position service types specifically
- 4 provided for under section 269-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, and
- 5 position descriptions under Act 177, Session Laws of Hawaii
- 6 2007, to allow the commission to recruit and hire employees with
- 7 the right combination of skills and experience demanded by the
- 8 commission's evolving set of responsibilities.
- 9 SECTION 2. Section 269-3, Hawaii Revised Statutes, is
- 10 amended by amending subsection (a) to read as follows:
- 11 "(a) The chairperson of the public utilities commission
- 12 may appoint and employ [clerks, stenographers, agents,
- 13 engineers, accountants, professional staff and other assistants
- 14 for the public utilities commission as the chairperson finds
- 15 necessary for the performance of the commission's functions and
- 16 define their powers and duties. The chairperson may appoint
- 17 and, at pleasure, dismiss a chief administrator and [hearings

1	exempt from chapter 76. [Notwithstanding section 103D-209, the
2	chairperson-shall appoint one or more attorneys independent of
3	the attorney general who shall act as attorneys for the
4	commission and define their powers and duties and fix their
5	compensation. The chief administrator, chief of policy and
6	research, chief of administrative support, chief of consumer
7	affairs and compliance, utility analysts, and attorneys shall be
8	exempt from chapter 76. Research assistants, economists, legal
9	secretaries, legal assistants, and enforcement officers may be
10	appointed with or without regard to chapter 76. Other employees
11	shall be appointed as may be needed by the chairperson in
12	accordance with chapter 76. The chairperson may also appoint
13	other staff with or without regard to chapter 76."
14	SECTION 3. Act 177, Session Laws of Hawaii 2007, section
15	1, is amended by amending subsection (c) to read as follows:
16	"(c) The purpose of this Act is to enhance the ability of
17	the public utilities commission to carry out its duties and
18	responsibilities by:

15		section. The chief of policy and research shall
16		manage the utility analysts, research assistants,

18		regulated-industry-related matters-and-government
19		policy; and oversee legislative initiatives,
20		media relations, and special projects;
21	(D)	The chief engineer shall be increased from level
22		V-to level VI to enable the commission to recruit

1		for the position at a higher level and to allow
2		staff level engineers to move to level V;
3	(E)	The existing legal stenographer shall be
4		redescribed as a legal assistant to update this
5		position-since stenographers are no longer
6		recruited due to outdated position descriptions;
7	-(F)-	The existing clerk typist III position shall be
8		redescribed as a legal clerk to elevate the
9		qualifications of the position-and to help meet
10		new functional requirements, including
11		maintenance-of-a new document and docket
12		management systems—and—increased citation
13		activity;
14	(C)	An existing research assistant position shall be
15		redescribed as an investigator V to accurately
16		reflect senior-level responsibilities of the
17		position; and
18	(H)	Five-existing research assistants shall be
19		redescribed as utility analysts to allow for
20		increased industry expertise and focus necessary
21		for the new policy-making function of the policy
22		and-research-section;

1	(6)	The following temporary positions, relating to gas cap
2		and petroleum monitoring, shall be converted to
3		permanent positions to promote successful recruitment
4		and retention of qualified individuals:
5		(A) Public utilities commission economist;
6		(B) Public utilities commission attorney;
7		(C) Two utility analysts (previously research
8		assistants);
9		(D) Clerk-typist-II;
10		(E) Enforcement officer; and
11		(F) Secretary I; and
12	(7)	Additional office space shall be leased and the office
13		relocated.

15	other sta	te and county agencies shall assist the public
16	utilities	commission in carrying out the provisions of this Act.
17	The depar	tment of human resources development shall work
18	cooperati	vely with the public utilities commission in renaming
19	or re-des	cribing job descriptions as is deemed necessary by the
20	public ut	ilities commission."
