## SENATE RESOLUTION

REQUESTING THE CONVENING OF A TASK FORCE TO STUDY AND MAKE RECOMMENDATIONS REGARDING POLICIES AND PROCEDURES TO IMPROVE THE ACCURACY OF EYEWITNESS IDENTIFICATIONS.

WHEREAS, mistaken eyewitness identification has been shown 1 2 to have contributed to the wrongful conviction in approximately seventy-five percent of the nation's exonerations; and 3 4 5 WHEREAS, over the past thirty years, a large body of peerreviewed, scientific research and practice have emerged showing 6 that simple systemic changes in administering eyewitness 7 identification procedures can greatly improve the accuracy of 8 those identifications; and 9 10 WHEREAS, policies and procedures to improve the accuracy of 11 evewitness identifications, such as those recommended by the 12 U.S. National Institute of Justice, the American Bar 13 Association, the New Jersey Office of the Attorney General, the 14 15 Wisconsin Office of the Attorney General, the California Commission on the Fair Administration of Justice, the 16 International Association of Chiefs of Police, and the North 17 Carolina Actual Innocence Commission, are readily available; and 18 1 . 1 . MA. 19 WHEREAS, more accurate eyewitness identifications increase 20 the ability of police and prosecutors to convict the quilty and 21 protect the innocent; and 22 23 WHEREAS, the integrity of Hawaii's criminal justice process 24 is enhanced by adherence to best practices in evidence 25 gathering; and 26 27 WHEREAS, uniformity in practice and protocols among all 28 counties is important for consistency of justice; and 29 30 WHEREAS, Hawaii will benefit from the improvement of the 31 accuracy of eyewitness identifications; and 32 33 WHEREAS, best practices in cases where there are multiple 34 eyewitnesses include each eyewitness viewing photograph or live 35

1 lineups separately or sequentially; the suspect being placed in 2 a different position in the live lineup and/or photograph lineup 3 for each eyewitness; the eyewitnesses not being permitted to 4 communicate with each other until all identification procedures 5 have been completed; and the filing of confidence statements by 6 each eyewitness; now, therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED by the Senate of the Twenty-seventh 8 Legislature of the State of Hawaii, Regular Session of 2013, 9 that in order to prevent the injustice of a wrongful conviction 10 caused by mistaken eyewitness identification; to improve lineup 11 procedures during criminal investigations; and to further 12 improve the enforcement of justice within Hawaii, this body 13 requests the formation of a task force to identify and recommend 14 15 policies and procedures to the Legislature to improve the accuracy of eyewitness identifications; and 16

18 BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force comprise the 19 following individuals or their designees:

- 21 (1) Attorney General;
- 23 (2) Public Defender;
- 25 (3) All four county Chiefs of Police;
  - (4) All four county prosecutors;
- 29 (5) Chief Executive Officer of the Office of Hawaiian30 Affairs;
  - (6) A representative of the Hawaii Innocence Project;
  - (7) Two representatives with expertise in the relevant social sciences as demonstrated by teaching, publication, and other scholarly applications, to be appointed by the Senate President and one to be appointed by the Speaker of the House of Representatives; and
    - (8) Executive Director of the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force submit a report
of its findings and recommendations, including any proposed
legislation, to the Legislature no later than twenty days prior
to the convening of the Regular Session of 2014; and

BUT IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the task force cease to exist on June 30, 2014; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that certified copies of this 9 10 Resolution be transmitted to the Attorney General; Office of the Public Defender; Police Chiefs of the City and County of 11 Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; 12 Prosecutors of the City and County of Honolulu, County of 13 Hawaii, County of Kauai, and County of Maui; Mayors of the City 14 and County of Honolulu, County of Hawaii, County of Kauai, and 15 County of Maui; Chief Executive Officer of the Office of 16 Hawaiian Affairs; Hawaii Innocence Project; Executive Director 17 18 of the Hawaii Civil Rights Commission; Chair of the Senate 19 Judiciary and Labor Committee; and Chair of the House Judiciary Committee. 20
