Aloha Senator Solomon,

I hope mid-session finds you well.

I am writing about a House Bill of interest that I have been following, which has been referred to your Committee on Water and Land.

If you read it as I do, HB111 HD 2 would add another tool in the county's tool box, help spur innovative sustainable development, promote affordable housing, allow flexibility in the building code on agricultural lands under the county's jurisdiction and move towards our common goals of water conservation and grey water adoption.

I have been told that the Sustainable Living Research concept proposed would provide an alternative to the expense and length of the special-use permit process, which has caused frustration for individuals pursuing this type of development. The bill would still give the County of Hawai'i Planning Dept and Planning Commissions as well as the Department of Health sufficient oversight to safeguard the public health and protect consumers through the Sustainable Living Research permitting process.

Rep. Hanohano introduced this, and I believe it would benefit our constituents in North Kohala and South Kohala.

I have attached testimony I made to the House Committee on Finance on this proposal in my capacity as Chair of the Agriculture, Water and Energy Sustainability Committee for your reference.

Aloha Chair Luke, Vice Chair Nishimoto and Members of the Committee,

My name is Maragret Wille, Chair of the Hawai'i County Council Committee on Agriculture, Water and Energy Sustainability, testifying in SUPPORT WITH AMENDMENTS of HB111 HD2: Relating to a Sustainable Alternative Building Code.

DESCRIPTION:

The measure permits the development of sustainable living research sites on land parcels between 1 to 15 acres in size that shall be exempt from certain state and county regulations but shall remain subject to county approval and oversight in order to stimulate research and development of sustainable living ideas, concepts, and innovations testing.

COMMENTS:

This bill is a measured approach that seeks to foster a climate of mutual respect and compliance between public health and zoning regulators and sustainability pioneers. HB111 HD2 enables innovators to practice and test ways of living that are ecological, sustainable and affordable, but currently outside of existing codes, while working in close coordination and approval of county planning departments and state department of health to ensure the public safety. The intent is to spur new research and development in sustainable affordable living research.

I suggest amending HB111 HD2 to clarify that lands eligible for permitting as sustainable living research sites are ONLY those under the jurisdiction of the respective county planning departments and not the state land use commission:

- "Sustainable living research site" means an area that is:
- (1) Between one and fifteen acres in size; in the agricultural, rural and urban districts;

Of particular concern to the Finance Committee: Rulemaking by the county planning departments under HRS Chapter 91 can and should address the retroactive permitting of currently non-compliant properties that would qualify as sustainable living research sites, which are numerous in Hawai'i County. Legal compliance via HB111 HD2 will then allow for increased conveyance and bank financing of said properties as well as eligibility for certain R&D grantmaking which require properties to be fully permitted.

I am writing today to express my support of HB111, the "Sustainable Living Research Bill."

As a single mother of six children (four of which are still living at home with me), life is both a great joy and an occasional challenge. One of the daunting tasks that I face is properly providing a home for my family with the resources that I currently have.

I am incredibly fortunate and grateful to have made a home within an artistic ecovillage, located in lower Puna on the Big Island of Hawaii. I live in a quaint cottage, which is nestled amid several other such modest living structures. There are currently a total of about 20 adults and 10 children living together on our land.

My children walk to school every day (which is located onsite) and safely play within the boundaries of our land, knowing that there is always someone there for them nearby.

Our ecovillage is based on a desire to live interdependently, rather than independently. It's about caring and sharing, giving and receiving, thriving not just surviving. This revolutionary community structure provides me with invaluable support that I could never duplicate in a traditional neighborhood setting.

The problem is that our homes are threatened because what we have created here is so innovative and advanced that our current archaic laws have not caught up with us. This is where we need YOUR help!

Please know that we are not alone. There are dozens of such intentional communities sprinkled throughout Hawaii. Most are too fearful of condemnation and retaliation to advocate for themselves.

In these times of ecological and political distress and uncertainty, we have a strong need for sustainability pioneers. We are stepping forward into that role. We need support from our local and state government so that we can continue to experiment and innovate vital community building dynamics in order to provide valuable solutions for our future...a sustainable future.
