Chair Hee and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Attorney General supports the H.D. 2 of the bill, but strongly opposes the proposed S.D. 1.

The purpose of the H.D. 2 of the bill is to clarify the gambling laws to provide that gambling activities offered incident to the purchase of good or services constitute gambling. This clarification is in response to a recent trend, referred by some as "electronic sweepstakes" in which participants make purchases of goods or services that entitle the purchaser to participate in gaming activities on machines that offer payouts and otherwise constitute gambling. The clarification adds to the definition of "something of value" to address this gambling conduct.

The proposed S.D. 1, however, appears to create an exception to our gambling laws that would allow the very same gambling conduct intended to be addressed by the H.D. 2. The proposed S.D. 1 labels this conduct as a "bona fide business game promotion," and then expressly excludes it from "gambling." This creates an inconsistency with the proposed amendment, contained in both the H.D. 2 and the S.D. 1, redefining "something of value" by adding the following to money or property: (c)

- Any purchase of an item or service that entitles a person to participate in a gambling scheme or use a gambling device; or
- Any entries, credits or play points that extend or permit the privilege of playing (d) a game of chance without charge.

A business conducting bona fide business transactions valid under the law of contracts is already excluded under section 712-1220(4) of the Hawaii Revised Statutes (HRS).

The proposed "bona fide business game promotions" exclusion appears to be based on the premise that any bona fide activities or conduct tied to promoting a company's product justifies gambling conduct.

Gambling is illegal in Hawaii. Any criminal offense and especially its exceptions within the penal code need to be clear and concise to afford proper notice to the public and also to be effective for enforcement. Creating exceptions, absent a compelling reason, compromises the law and may lead to various interpretations or conduct to get around criminal culpability. This is especially true for gambling laws, as people contrive various schemes to get around the gambling laws. Ultimately, however, law enforcement and the courts usually find that the schemes violate the laws.

Accordingly, the Department of the Attorney General respectfully opposes the proposed S.D. 1, and request that the bill in its current form be passed.

I am Gregory T. Lefcourt, Assistant Chief of the Honolulu Police Department, City and County of Honolulu.

The Honolulu Police Department opposes House Bill No. 343, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, Proposed, Relating to Gambling Offenses.

The additional language added to House Bill 343, H.D. 2, S.D.1, Proposed, is not in line with the original intent of the bill, which is to clarify Hawaii's already strong gambling laws. This draft contradicts the original bill by creating an exception to the statute that would legalize the very machines the bill was intended to address.

Furthermore, House Bill No. 343, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, Proposed, Relating to Gambling Offenses, is almost verbatim from the testimony provided by Matthew Matsunaga, Esq., for previous drafts of this bill. Mr. Matsunaga represents PJY Enterprises, a distributor of sweepstakes machines, which is involved in an ongoing Federal Court case being heard by United States District Court Judge Leslie Kobayashi. Judge Kobayashi has already stated that these machines appear to be gambling devices. The passage of House Bill No. 343, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, Proposed, Relating to Gambling Offenses, will undermine Hawaii's gambling laws and further confuse innocent parties regarding the legality of these activities.

The Honolulu Police Department strongly urges you to oppose House Bill No. 343, H.D. 2, S.D. 1, Proposed, Relating to Gambling Offenses.

Chair Hee, Vice-Chair Shimabukuro, and members of the Senate Committee on Judiciary and Labor, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu ("Department") submits the following testimony in opposition to H.B. 343, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1.

The Proposed S.D. 1 would basically legalize gambling, by allowing "business game promotions" that use "gambling schemes" and "gambling devices." Such schemes and devices have already been found to be gambling in other states, and it is very likely that our own courts will soon find the same. The Department is strongly opposed to legalized gambling in Hawai'i.

While the proposed changes—and the gambling schemes they address—may seem innocuous, H.B. 343, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1, would present a complete shift in policy on gambling, and essentially open Hawai'i to the attentions and influences of the gambling industry at large. Today's gambling industry is more sophisticated than ever, and continues to look for ways to chip away at Hawai'i's gambling laws. The proposed language could essentially nullify our current gambling prohibitions as they relate to all types of gambling devices, and expose Hawai'i to all forms of "vice" that come with legalized gambling.

Numerous studies and examples from other states have shown that legalized gambling leads to significant increases in crime and "vice" activity. Such a change would not only be contrary to the "family-friendly" image that Hawai'i portrays to the world, but—more importantly—contrary to our overall public safety and welfare.

As the Committee is likely aware, the Department is currently involved in litigation regarding specific forms of "gambling." Just recently, on February 28, 2013, United States

District Court Judge Leslie E. Kobayashi issued a preliminary decision, ruling that the subject devices are illegal gambling devices. Because the Proposed S.D. 1 attempts to carve out exceptions specifically related to the pending federal court litigation, the Department respectfully asks that the Committee allow the court process to move forward, and decline to make any changes to the gambling laws at this time.

The Department strongly believes that Hawai'i's current gambling laws provide a good balance between protecting the interests and safety of the public, while at the same time providing reasonable and sufficient exceptions. The gambling laws do not require any further amendments, and certainly not prior to the court's ruling on these legal matters.

Although the Department supports the expansion of Hawai'i's economy, the changes proposed in H.B. 343, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1, simply pose too great a risk to public safety and welfare; the benefits would not be worth the ultimate "cost" to our communities. The proposed changes would be a drastic shift in policy, by legalizing gambling in Hawai'i.

For all of the foregoing reasons, the Department of the Prosecuting Attorney of the City and County of Honolulu strongly opposes H.B. 343, H.D. 2, Proposed S.D. 1. Thank you for the opportunity to testify on this matter.

Chair Hee, Vice Chair Shimabukuro and Members of the Committee:

The Department of the Prosecuting Attorney, County of Maui, OPPOSES the passage of HB 343, HD 2, Proposed SD 1, Relating to Gambling Offenses.

HB 343, HD 2, Proposed SD 1 proposes to except "bona fide business game promotions from gambling." We oppose this attempt to circumvent the gambling law. When the perceived proponent of the Proposed SD 1 testified before the House Committee on Judiciary on this bill, the proponent suggested the amendments as set forth in the Proposed SD 1. The proponent referred to "Publishers Clearing House, Reader's Digest Sweepstakes, Pepsi Billion Dollar Sweepstakes and McDonalds Monopoly." However, those games allow the customer to risk what the customer won, i.e., get more money or a better prize at the risk of losing the money/prize put at stake for the opportunity for the "upgrade." This is exactly what the proponent's machines allow the "customers" to do, which is actually gambling - "stakes or risks something of value upon the outcome of a contest of chance or a future contingent event not under [the player's] control or influence, upon an agreement or understanding that [the player] or someone else will receive something of value in the event of a certain outcome."

Chairperson Hee, Vice Chair Shimabukuro and Committee Members:

The League of Women Voters supports HB343, HD2. This bill effectively clarifies the definition of sweepstakes gambling.

Many incidents across the state have demonstrated the willingness of vendors to circumvent the law, a law which clearly indicates that any form of gambling is illegal in Hawai`i. The resulting situation creates a challenge for law enforcement and an enticement to the public, particularly to young people, to engage in illegal activity. HB343, HD2 addresses these problems.

At the same time, the League of Women Voters opposes HB343, HD2, SD1. The description of HB343 reads: Amends a definition in the gambling law to provide that gambling activities offered incident to the purchase of goods or devices or any entries, credits, or play points that extend or permit the privilege of playing a game of chance without charge, constitute gambling. The proposed SD1 provides a loophole which negates the effects of HD2. In effect, SD1 contradicts the intent of HB343 by presenting an exception for certain types of sweepstakes gambling claiming to be bona fide business promotions. There should be no exceptions.

If HB343, HD2,SD1 goes into effect, law enforcement will face even greater challenges, and Hawai'i will see the proliferation of illegal sweepstake operations.

We urge you to support HB343, HD2, and vote against HB343, HD2, SD1.

I am Walter Yoshimitsu, <u>representing the Hawaii Catholic Conference</u>. The Hawaii Catholic Conference is the public policy voice for the Roman Catholic Church in the State of Hawaii under the leadership of Bishop Larry Silva. We support HD2 that clearly amends definitions in the gambling laws to address gambling activities offered incident to the purchase of goods or services.

Unfortunately, there are establishments right here in Hawaii that allow gameplay on machines that offer some form of payout and then make the claim that this is not a form of electronic gambling. These seemingly innocent machines, we believe, are a stepping stone to legalized gambling in Hawaii. Increasing the penalties for using them will help protect our community from the social problems that stem from legalized gaming. HD2 did just that!

In sharing the Catholic theological perspective on gambling, we are very concerned about all aspects of the issue that would make specific pieces of gambling legislation acceptable. We believe that the promotion of the common good of society and the protection of individual rights should always be the primary goal of public policy. Accordingly, the potential negative consequences of an expanded "culture of gambling" needs to be carefully evaluated.

Having said that, we support HD2 because we want to make clear that utilizing any form of electronic means, including a computer for sweepstakes, is illegal and remains so. The proposed SD1 does the complete opposite and therefore we do not support the new version (SD1).

I represent PJY Enterprises, LLC, a local small business that distributes the Products Direct Sweepstakes terminals. These are legitimate promotions for legitimate products (similar to Publishers Clearing House, Reader's Digest Sweepstakes, Pepsi Billion Dollar Sweepstakes and McDonalds Monopoly), and are designed to generate enthusiasm and entice customers to enter games of chance that are tied to creating awareness of and purchasing Hawaii products, such as coffee, sunglasses, t-shirts, etc. HB 343 HD2 actually criminalizes any business promotion that involves free entry into a game of chance with the purchase of an item or service. This would likely criminalize well known and well established promotions, such as McDonalds Monopoly, Publishers Clearing House, Reader's Digest Sweepstakes, Times Supermarket Sweepstakes (see attached), Zippy's and FHB's Sweepstakes (see attached) and other local contests. HB343 HD2 is a misguided attempt to eliminate alleged "gambling" activities — akin to trying to kill cockroaches with a shotgun.

I applaud the Committee for proposing SD1, which is a thoughtful approach to provide law enforcement the statutory tools to target illegal gambling activities masquerading as sweepstakes promotions, while giving a safe harbor to legitimate business promotions. Specifically SD1 seeks to criminalize those promotions that are not connected with legitimate products or services and do NOT comply with the following requirements:

(a) The game promotion is conducted or offered in connection with the sale, promotion, or advertisement of a bona fide product or service, or to enhance the brand or image of a

No substitution of prizes is offered and no transfer of the prize to a third party is permitted.
- 3) HOW TO ENTER: NO PURCHASE NECESSARY. The Sweepstakes begins at 12:01 a.m. on Saturday September 1, 2012 and ends at midnight on Sunday September 30, 2012 (the "Sweepstakes Period"). You will be automatically entered in the Sweepstakes when you make an approved withdrawal or cash advance at any participating FHB ATM located in a Zippy's Restaurant during the Sweepstakes Period. Account adjustment transactions / returns, ATM withdrawal fees, over-limit or over-draft fees, return check fees, check re-order fees, and/or other fees assessed on your account are not considered eligible transactions for automatic Sweepstakes entry. Entries may also be submitted by mail. To enter by mail, send a handwritten 3 x 5" card with your full name, address, phone number, and email address (if available) to FHB & Zippy's Sweepstakes Promo Attn: First Hawaiian Bank - ATM Management, PO Box 1959, Honolulu, HI 96805. 

My name is Dennis Kim, and I am the Hawaii Multi-Stake Director of Public Affairs for the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter-Day Saints. In Hawaii, the church has fifteen stakes with congregations on every island and a membership of 70,000. I apologize that I am not able to be present to give my testimony in person as I have other scheduled commitments.

We are in favor of HB343, HD2 and opposed to the proposed SD1.

We are concerned of the consequences that gambling will have on our members and society. HB343, HD2 will give a clearer definition of what can be construed as gambling and will help both the public and law enforcement officials.

Even though gambling is outlawed in Hawaii, we see some addicted gamblers in our congregations. One that I am close to has lost his job over ten years ago and has not been able to find another one. He has disappeared from home many times staying away for days at a time. Items from the home mysteriously disappeared. Needed food is not purchased. Now he and his wife are being evicted from their rental home for non-payment. Luckily, his wife tries to keep things together, but the stress takes a heavy toll.

If gambling were legal in Hawaii imagine the cost should more citizens who are not brazen enough to defy current laws become addicted. If they want to gamble now they fly to Vegas, but they always have a return ticket which limits their gambling time. Should any form of gambling be allowed here in Hawaii, their gambling time is anytime, or all the time.

The proposed SD1 seems to be a "foot in the door" for gambling and will make it harder for law enforcement to determine what is legal and what is not.

It is my hope that the Committee on Judiciary and Labor will consider the above comments and pass out HB343, HD2 and hold HB343, HD2, SD1.

We decided to use sweepstakes machines because of prior legal precedence set in South Carolina and reliance upon the Honolulu Liquor Commissions approval. Sweepstakes machines provide us greatly needed revenue during this recession. Legal sweepstakes machines help us to be competitive with other options in our industry. Legal Sweepstakes also provide a safe entertainment venue for our customers.

I oppose any bill that attempts to criminalize any business promotion that involves free entry into a game of chance with the purchase of an item or service. This would likely criminalize well known and well established promotions, such as McDonalds Monopoly, Publishers Clearing House, Reader's Digest Sweepstakes and other contests.

Instead of targeting legitimate business promotions, perhaps you should criminalize those promotions that are not connected with legitimate products. I respectfully ask that, if you pass this measure, you revise it to only criminalize promotions that do NOT comply with the following requirements:

- (a) The game promotion is conducted or offered in connection with the sale, promotion, or advertisement of a bona fide product or service, or to enhance the brand or image of a supplier of bona fide consumer products or services. An item is not bona fide if it is offered at a price that is disproportionate to the value of the item purchased.
- (b) No purchase payment, entry fee, or proof of purchase is required as a condition of entering the game promotion or receiving something of value;

- (c) The chance to win by free play must be offered from the same pool from which the chance to win via purchase is drawn.
- (d) All materials advertising the game promotion clearly disclose that no purchase or payment is necessary to enter and provide details on the free method of participation;
- (e) In cases where electronic devices are used as the revealing mechanism, they should not be connected to a server (such as in the case of the devices used by internet sweepstakes cafes), which allows the possibility of manipulating the outcomes of the games of chance, and/or the payouts, while a customer is playing the games of chance. (There are systems currently being operated in this State, and elsewhere that have this capability.); and
- (f) In cases where a "service" or usage time is being sold or promoted, any usage time, privilege to use and/or operate or credits accumulated by the customers must be allowed to be transferred or sold to any other person. (There are several sweepstakes devices being operated which sell enormous amounts of usage time, privilege to use and/or operate or credits that are allowed to be accumulated, but they do not provide any means for the customer to retain any excess; meaning there is NO data base that either the customer or the seller can use to retain or account for their purchases.)

I respectfully oppose any bill that attempts to criminalize any business promotion that involves free entry into a game of chance with the purchase of an item or service or alternatively ask that this Committee consider the above amendments. Thank you for the opportunity to testify.

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
